The meeting started at 1:35 in the afternoon with the singing of the Philippine National Anthem followed by an invocation and the singing of the MIMAROPA Hymn.

II. BUSINESS PROPER

A. Declaration of Quorum

Ms. Jobelle M. Cruzado of NEDA MIMAROPA called the roll. Of the 34 members, 13 were present and 18 were represented, registering a quorum at 91.18% attendance.

B. Welcome Remarks

EDC Chairperson Rodne R. Galicha welcomed the members and guests present. He encouraged everyone to stay healthy and be

cautious during this time of pandemic, especially with the emergence of the two new Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) variants, Delta and Lambda. He also hoped for a fruitful and productive meeting ahead.

C. Proposed Agenda

On motion duly seconded, the proposed agenda was approved as presented.

D. Approval of the Minutes of the previous EDC meetings

On motion duly seconded, the minutes of the 2nd quarter EDC meeting conducted on May 06 and the EDC Special meeting conducted on July 05 were approved.

E. Secretary's Report

Ms. Cruzado reported the status of agreements during the 2nd quarter and special EDC meetings.

She informed the body that all required data and information pertaining to the 2020 MIMAROPA Regional Development Report (RDR) were submitted on set deadline and were reflected in the write-ups. The RDC, during its 75th full council meeting held on June 04 via Zoom, passed RDC Resolution No. 2021-075-992 approving the 2020 RDR. Copies of the report will be provided to all RDC and sectoral committee members once finalized. She also reported that the CCC presented the salient features of the NDC during the same meeting.

On the proposed Strategic Development Plan for Kalayaan Island Group, Ms. Cruzado reported that the plan was presented to Palawan Provincial Development Council in June. The PCSD submitted the complete list of requirements for review of the Secretariat on May 21, 2021. The RDC during its 75th Full Council Meeting held on June 04, 2021 approved the proposed Plan through RDC Resolution No. 2021-075-994. Copy of the resolution was forwarded to PCSD, copy furnished the Provincial Government of Palawan and municipality of Kalayaan on June 25.

Ms. Cruzado added that a plaque of recognition was awarded to RD Susan A. Sumbeling commending her for all her invaluable contributions and services to all the sectoral committees and the MIMAROPA RDC tungo sa Matatag, Maginhawa, at Panatag na MIMAROPA.

She said that the PCA presented the Coconut Farmers and Industry Development Plan during the EDC Special meeting on July 05. During the said meeting, the PCA was requested to come up with the inventory of indigenous people Farmers engaged in coconut farming, visit the province of Romblon, and collaborate with the NCIP at the operating-unit level.

The EDC recommended RDC endorsement of the CFIDP for MIMAROPA. Due to the urgency of the matter, an ad referendum was conducted by the RDC MIMAROPA Executive Committee (ExeCom) to facilitate the approval of the CFIDP. The materials were submitted to the RDC ExeCom members on July 22, 2021 and favorably casted their votes until July 28, 2021. Copy of MIMAROPA RDC ExeCom Resolution No. 4-38 series of 2021 entitled "Endorsing the MIMAROPA Coconut Farmers and Industry Development Plan to the National Inter-Agency Cluster for Integration to the CFIDP" was transmitted to PCA on July 30.

Also, the committee deferred the proposed presidential action declaring Marinduque as a mining-free zone. Instead, the EDC requested the Technical Working Group (TWG) to address the potential mining disaster in Marinduque to meet during the last week of July to discuss the matter and provide recommendation to the EDC. The topic was tackled during the TWG meeting held on July 29. Among the proposals deliberated by the TWG were: a) removal of Marinduque from the mining priority areas/mining tenement map of the country; b) denial by the Office of the President on mineral production sharing agreement (MPSA) of Marcopper; and c) declaration of Marinduque as a no go zone area for mining. The TWG agreed to further study the proposals to ensure compliance with legal provisions and existing government rules and regulations.

Lastly, Ms. Cruzado informed that the RDC, during its 76th full council meeting on September 03 confirmed NCIP MIMAROPA as additional member of the EDC.

F. Matters for Approval/Review/Endorsement

1. Endorsement of the proposed establishment of Naujan Lake Wetland Center and the Liwasan ng Mamamayan in Oriental Mindoro

Dr. Don Stepherson V. Calda presented the two project proposals of the Provincial Government of Oriental Mindoro requesting for inclusion in the MIMAROPA Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP) 2017-2022.

a. Naujan Lake Wetland Center

Dr. Calda informed the members that the project involves the establishment of a wetland center that will serve as a recreational and educational center where local residents and tourists raise awareness on the importance of wetlands while experiencing unique nature activities. Estimated cost of the project is ₱20 million which include the following: (1) an information center and exhibit area, (2) a view deck, and (3) an amphitheater.

Assistant Regional Director Donna Mayor Gordove of DENR MIMAROPA expressed her support to the proposed wetland center. However, she said that the project must be endorsed first by the Protected Area Management Board (PAMB), the policy making and decision making body with regard to the Naujan Lake National Park. She added that the project cannot be funded by DENR MIMAROPA in FY 2022 since their agency has already submitted its budget proposal for FY 2022. It will be included instead in the FY 2023 to proposed budget subject to compliance the DENR documentary requirements.

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Committee recommended RDC The endorsement οf the proposed establishment of the Naujan Lake Wetland Center in Pasi II. Socorro, Oriental Mindoro for inclusion in the MIMAROPA RDIP 2017-2022 subject to submission of necessary documentary requirements such environmental compliance as: certificate/certificate of non-coverage, project's sustainability plan inclusion of reading room and diorama in the center's architectural design.

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b. <u>Liwasan ng Mamamayan</u>

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Dr. Calda presented the features of the proposed *Liwasan ng Mamamayan* with an estimated project cost of ₱70 million. The project includes the development of public space into a place for special cultural events, tourism activities, and performances. It highlights green infrastructure/facilities such as stage for performances, bleachers for the audience, and restrooms. It will also construct stalls that can be rented out by local producers to promote local food products/delicacies to tourists and local residents.

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The components of the project include the following: a) development of 5,000 sqm area; b) construction of green infrastructure for stalls; c) installation of water fountains; and d) construction of stage, bleachers, and restrooms. Project partners include DOT, Tourism Infrastructure and Enterprise Zone Authority (TIEZA), PGOM, and the City Government of Calapan.

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The EDC recommended RDC endorsement of the construction of Liwasan ng Mamamayan: Oriental Mindoro People's Park and Public Plaza in Camilmil, Calapan City for inclusion in the Regional Development Investment Program 2017-2022.

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2. Endorsement of the proposed farm-to-market roads in the municipality of Corcuera in Romblon

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In lieu of the proponent from Corquera, Romblon, EDC Chairperson Rodne R. Galicha presented the Construction/Concreting of Farmto-Market Road from Barangay San Agustin to Barangay Ambulong in Corcuera and Rehabilitation/Concreting of Farm-to-Market Road

in Barangay San Roque in Corcuera, Romblon with the estimated project costs of ₱10 million each.

The Municipal Government of Corcuera in Romblon submitted the proposals for inclusion in the MIMAROPA RDIP 2017-2022 and for inclusion of the Department of Agriculture (DA) MIMAROPA in its FY 2022 agency investment program.

The proposed FMRs aim to provide farmers and fisherfolk in the area with better access to the market and Poblacion Port for their products, induce higher agricultural productivity, and complement the tourism developments strategy of the municipality by providing access to some of the local tourism sites. The following were the details of the projects as presented during the meeting:

Dir. Mendoza of NEDA MIMAROPA suggested that the road influence area of the said farm-to-market roads be included in the protected area of the municipality in its comprehensive land use plan and zoning ordinance to deter illegal or premature land conversion.

Dr. Nex D. Basi of DA MIMAROPA manifested his support to the proposed projects but advised LGU Corcuera to revise the project details as stipulated under Administrative Order No. 16 s. 2020 entitled Revised General Guidelines on the Implementation of the Department of Agriculture Farm-to-Market Roads Development Program.

The EDC recommended RDC endorsement of the proposed farm-to-market roads subject to revision of project details based on Administrative Order No. 16 s. 2020.

3. Philippine Fisheries and Coastal Resiliency (FishCoRe) Project Mr. Rene B. Parreño of BFAR MIMAROPA presented the FishCoRe Project. He informed that during a World Bank (WB) Pre-project Identification mission conducted on September 09, 2019, WB shared that there was an on-going initiative from BFAR to access a grant technical assistance (TA) or the *ProBlue* TA that will be

executed by WB on the coastal resiliency efforts of the Bureau. WB also updated that beyond the TA, it can also provide investment loans/explore additional opportunities in the implementation of coastal resiliency and coastal resource management. Thus, BFAR drafted a concept paper for the project.

Mr. Parreño presented the Philippine fisheries situationer, which include the contribution of fisheries in the gross domestic product (GDP), the total fisheries production in the country, trade values, employment generated from fisheries sector, and average fish consumption in the country. He also added that the fisheries sector was also affected by the current COVID-19 pandemic particularly on the livelihood aspect. The hampered movement of agri-fishery inputs and marketable produce from production areas to markets and consumers during the imposition of community quarantine has resulted in the loss income of the fisherfolk.

The FishCoRe project focuses on the two fisheries management areas (FMAs), established by BFAR, namely FMA 6 (including the provinces of Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, La Union, Pangasinan, Bataan, Bulacan, Pampanga, Zambales, Batangas, Cavite, Occidental Mindoro, Metro Manila, and Abra) and FMA 9 (including the provinces of Agusan del Norte, Bohol, Camiguin, Lanao del Norte, Misamis Occidental, Misamis Oriental, Siquijor, Southern Leyte, Surigao del Norte, Zamboanga del Norte, and Zamboanga del Sur). It is composed of three components such as:

Component 1: Improved Fisheries and Coastal Resilient Resource Planning and Management (FishCRRM). The main output of FishCRRM is to create an enabling environment for the fisheries resources to recover and build the resiliency of ecosystems. This will be through the development of a FMA framework plan and strengthening FMA governance system.

Component 2: Modern and Resilient Livelihood Investments (MARLIN). The main objective of MARLIN is to strengthen key fishery value chains by developing and enhancing fishery livelihood and enterprises, and by investing in key infrastructure and facilities.

Component 3: Support to Project Implementation and Management (SuPrIM). The main output of this component is the establishment of an operational and effective multi-level, interdisciplinary, and institutionalization-oriented project management system.

The EDC recommended RDC endorsement to the NEDA Investment Coordination Committee and the World Bank of the MIMAROPA Region components of the FishCoRe Project subject to submission of the following documents that were not included in the Feasibility Study and its attachments: a) Sangguniang Panlalawigan endorsement from concerned LGUs; b) project sustainability and fish landing area network plans; c) detailed project component costs for the municipalities of Lubang and Looc; d) rationale on the selection

of Milkfish and Shellfish as the primary commodities for Lubang and Looc; and e) baseline data of the target indicators.

4. Inclusion of the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples as additional member of the EDC

Chairperson Galicha informed the Committee that during the EDC special meeting conducted on July 05, he proposed the inclusion of NCIP MIMAROPA as a regular member of the EDC. He added that the membership of the NCIP MIMAROPA in the EDC will strengthen formulation of policies and government interventions to ensure that programs, projects, and activities are culturally sensitive and responsive to recognize, protect, and promote the rights of the Indigenous Cultural Communities (ICCs) and Indigenous Peoples and to ensure the optimization of potential of ancestral lands for the development of the region.

NCIP MIMAROPA Regional Director Marie Grace T. Pascua manifested support to the proposal for the inclusion of the agency as regular member of the Committee and as development partner of the MIMAROPA region.

On motion duly seconded, the Committee approved the recommendation for RDC confirmation of NCIP MIMAROPA as a regular member of the EDC.

G. Matters for Information

Land grants from the Department of Agrarian Reform to Agriculture Graduates

Atty. Marvin V. Bernal of DAR MIMAROPA informed the members on DAR Administrative Order No. 3, s. 2020 entitled "Awarding Agricultural Lands to Qualified Graduates of Four Year Degrees in Agriculture or Related Fields for their Economic Empowerment and the Growth of the Nation." He said that qualified agriculture graduates of agricultural schools who are landless will be assisted by the government, through DAR, in their desire to own and till unused government-owned lands devoted and suitable for agriculture.

The program aims to optimize unused government land to encourage young farmers that are willing to utilize science-based and modern ways of farming. He cited the report of the Department of Agriculture that the country may face a shortage of farmers as most Filipino farmers today are old with an average age of 57. The report also showed that the number of students in agricultural courses is declining yearly by 1.5%. Thus, the land grants would serve as 'farm laboratories' to students on which they could apply the theories and best practices they learned from school.

As many as 200,000 hectares of unused government-owned land in 390 CALABARZON and MIMAROPA (mostly in the province of Palawan) 391 regions shall be distributed for free. 392 A total of 14 agriculture graduates from the Western Philippines 393 University (WPU) Busuanga Campus were awarded Certificate of 394 Land Ownership Award (CLOA) in February 2021. 395 396 On the inquiry of ownership of the awardees, the farmer-student can 397 sell the lands to other individual after certain number of years. 398 399 III. The RDC, during its 76th full council meetina held September 03 virtually through Zoom, passed RDC Resolution 2021-076-1004 "Approving No. the inclusion of the Proposed Establishment of Liwasan Mamamayan: Oriental Mindoro People's Park and Public Plaza in the MIMAROPA RDIP 2017-2022."

Copy of the resolution was provided to the office of the Provincial Governor of Oriental Mindoro, copy furnished regional directors of DENR MIMAROPA, DOT-TIEZA, DOT MIMAROPA, and DPWH MIMAROPA on September 23.

The project was included in the FY 2023 AIP of DOT MIMAROPA.

The Secretariat provided LGU with Corcuera а copy Department Agriculture of Administrative Order No. 16, s. 2020 entitled "Revised General Guidelines on the Implementation of the Department of Agriculture Farm-to-Market Roads Development Program (DA-FMRDP) on August 09, 2021.

The Farm-to-Market Road project from Barangay San Agustin to Barangay Ambulong was dropped due to difficulty in acquiring Right of Way (ROW) by LGU Corcuera.

The rehabilitation/concreting of FMR from Barangay Mangansag to Barangay San Roque was retained. LGU Corcuera also complied with the guidelines of DA AO No. 16, s. 2020. The revised

project brief reflecting revised project details and cost (changed to P25 million) was submitted by LGU Corcuera to the Secretariat on August 20.

The RDC, during its 76th full council meeting conducted on September 03, passed **RDC** Resolution No. 2021-076-1006 "Favorably endorsing the and Proposed Rehabilitation Concreting of the Farm-to-Market Road Project of the Municipality of Corcuera, Romblon."

Copy of the resolution was provided to the office of the Municipal Mayor of Corcuera in Romblon, copy furnished DA MIMAROPA and the Provincial Government of Romblon on September 23.

The project was included in the AIP of DA MIMAROPA.

BFAR MIMAROPA submitted all the required documents on August 27 to the secretariat.

The RDC, during its 76th full council meeting conducted on September 03, passed RDC Resolution No. 2021-076-1005 "Endorsing **MIMAROPA** the Region Component of the Fisheries and Coastal Resiliency (FishCoRe) Project of the Department of Agriculture."

Copy of the resolution was provided to office of the DA Secretary, copy furnished regional director of BFAR MIMAROPA on September 23.

On September 20, a kick-off meeting hosted by the World Bank Task Team was conducted to: a) review and confirm the project

finalize details; b) the procurement plan for the first 18 months of the project; c) confirm that all aspects of the project are consistent with all World Bank operations requirements: finalize public disclosure of the Environmental and Social documents for the project; e) assess the project's readiness for implementation; f) review the main legal terms and conditions of the Bank Loan, and its disbursement arrangements. In a bilateral meeting conducted NEDA and BFAR central offices, outstanding issues on the project such as the determination of exact sites of livelihood under Component Marlin accounts for 68% of the total project cost. were discussed. Issues raised should be acted upon with substantial responses and inputs. BFAR will also send an official communication on response and compliance to the comments and issues raised. Per updates of NEDA ANRES, the RDCs of regions 1, 9, CAR, and MIMAROPA already issued their favorable endorsement of the respective regional components of the project. - 1. The Regional Development Council (RDC) prepares and regularly updates the regional development investment program (RDIP) to reflect changes in investment requirements and to include new projects proposed by the local government units (LGUS), regional line agencies (RLAs), and state universities and colleges (SUCs) for funding/financing under the General Appropriations Act or through Official Development Assistance.
- 2. In an email dated September 23, the Palawan Council for Sustainable Development (PCSD) requested RDC endorsement of the Environment and Natural Resources Information System (ENRIS) Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region.
- 3. The project aims to contribute to efficient land use, enhanced ecosystem condition and services, water and food security, and climate change resilience under the Environmentally Critical Areas Network (ECAN) of the Strategic Environmental Plan (SEP) for the Palawan Island Ecoregion by the establishment of a web-based ENRIS.
- 4. The Project Concept Paper of the ENRIS: Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region was submitted by the PCSD Executive Director Teodoro Jose S. Matta for NEDA's technical review and evaluation, and subsequent endorsement and financing to the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA). Financing details of the project are as follows:

A. Project Background




Figure 1. Project location map showing the ECAN.

The Palawan Council for Sustainable Development (PCSD) is mandated to implement the Strategic Environmental Plan (SEP) created under Republic Act 7611. The SEP establishes a graded system of protection and development control over the lands, forests, mines, agricultural areas, settlement areas, small islands, mangroves, coral reefs, seagrass beds and surrounding sea. This is known as the Environmentally Critical Areas Network (ECAN), the main strategy of the SEP (Figure 1).

To improve the delivery of its services, the PCSD formulated a project proposal entitled, "The development of an Environment and Natural Resources Information System (ENRIS) Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region". The proposal was initiated to address the environmental degradation observed in the area as well as the adverse degradation affecting economic and social-cultural impact development of the communities in Palawan. The adverse impacts of environmental degradation includes the insufficiency of water supply for agricultural, domestic, and industrial use; encroachment of settlements into forest and agricultural lands; poor soil condition; and relative low crop yield compared to national average.

The proposed project shall provide support to PCSD in achieving sustainable development in Palawan as a complementary tool in implementing the Environmentally Critical Areas Network (ECAN) Program. In addition, the project aims to enhance the condition of agriculture and environment sector and increase its contribution to Palawan's economy, resiliency, food security, and reduce poverty in the countryside.

B. Project Objectives and Description:

The project involves the establishment of a web-based Environment and Natural Resources Information System (ENRIS) that will contribute to efficient land-use, enhanced ecosystem condition and services, water and food security, and climate change resilience aligned with the ECAN Management Program of the Strategic Environmental Plan (SEP) for the Palawan Island Eco-region.

The specific objectives of the project are: a) to systematize land resources data and information; b) to retrieve existing analog data and build up-to-date database; c) to integrate all data on biophysical, social and land-uses supporting a decision support system for rational land-use planning and development, land productivity, natural resources management; and development of regulatory policies.

C. Project Cost and Financing:

The total project cost is estimated at USD 8.80 million wherein USD 8.00 million or 91% is being proposed for funding under the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) grant, while USD 0.80 million or 9% of the total project cost represents the PCSD counterpart funding.

Executing and Implementing Entity:

The project is proposed to be implemented over a 36-month period. The Palawan Council for Sustainable Development (PCSD) as the project implementing organization, shall provide the overall strategy and policy guidance to the project. The PCSD through its technical support staff, the Palawan Council for Sustainable Development Staff (PCSDS) serving as the Implementing Staff (IS), will administer the project activities and facilitate coordination between the project and KOICA.

A Project Management Unit (PMU) will be established at PCSDS consisting of PCSDS Project Director, Provincial LGU Coordinator and


Project Consultants. A Project Steering Committee (PSC) shall be created to serve as the oversight body for the project.

Comments:

- 1. The project proposal is consistent with the ten point socioeconomic agenda of President Duterte particularly on promoting rural and value chain development toward increasing agricultural and rural enterprise productivity and rural tourism; supportive with the goals and objectives stipulated in the MIMAROPA Regional Development Plan 2017-2022 under Chapter 20: Ensuring Integrity, Clean and Healthy Environment; and conforms to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Nos. 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth), 9 (Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure), and 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities), among others.
- 2. The project will be able to address the challenges faced by the region specifically on the access of updated and accurate data for development planning and project formulation. The project will aid in the formulation/preparation of a more responsive and data driven plans and projects for the region.
- 3. The project can also be replicated in other provinces in the region to have similar data in all provinces for future development and landuse planning.

Recommendations:

- Include discussion on the alignment of the proposed project with the Palawan Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan (PDPFP) 2014-2023.
- Among the identified beneficiaries include indigenous community in the potential catchment areas. With this, it is suggested for the proponent to coordinate with the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) for consultation and consequently, processing of FPIC if needed to ensure that negative impacts resulting from the project are mitigated.
- 3. To ensure effective and efficient project implementation, a sustainability plan and communication plan must be developed for the project.
- 4. As provided on the project location map, particular areas from eleven municipalities and a highly urbanized city were identified as potential catchment areas for the project and monitoring stations will be established (Figure 1). We suggest including a thorough discussion on the selection criteria or prioritization process for these areas.

- 5. To further support the answers provided on Annex 6. Gender and Development Checklist, it is suggested for the proponent to include discussion on the project's relevance to gender equity and effective gender mainstreaming.
- 6. On project implementation, a monitoring and evaluation system must be instituted indicating the deliverables and timeframe including periodic financial and physical accomplishment. The implementing organization must submit quarterly monitoring and evaluation reports (based on Regional Project Monitoring and Evaluation System in place) including specific gender performance and qualitative indicators to gauge/measure the outputs/outcomes of the project relative to the target beneficiaries.
- 7. Sustainability and operation of the project can be expanded to other sectors and areas through involving the state universities and college (SUC) from the province in the Project Steering Committee. SUCs may explore partnership with PCSD through the project to enhance their Research and Development function.
- 8. The proponent may consider integrating a real-time project monitoring of programs, activities, and projects under the ECAN Program on the ENRIS to maximize the use of the project. It is also

- suggested that to utilize or involve the Regional Project Monitoring Committee in the activities of the Project Steering Committee.
- 9. On Annex 4 (Estimated Budget Sheet), the presented cost breakdown only accounts for USD 8.00 million. The coverage of the counterpart fund amounting to USD 0.80 million was not included in the cost breakdown. It is suggested for the proponent to include the cost details of the counterpart fund to provide a better illustration of the project costs.
- 10. The secretariat is recommending EDC endorsement of the Environment and Natural Resources Information System (ENRIS) Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region subject to submission of necessary documentary documents such as local endorsements and FPIC.

BRIEF FROM THE EDC SECRETARIAT

Subject: Integrated Water Resource Management Framework

- 1. During the World Summit on Sustainable Development held in September 2002 in Johannesburg, countries including the Philippines agreed to formulate and implement respective Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM) and Water Efficiency Plans by 2005.
- 2. IWRM is a collaborative process that promotes the coordinated development and management of water, land, and related resources within hydrological boundaries in order to maximize the resultant economic and social welfare in an equitable manner without compromising the sustainability of vital ecosystems. The Philippine IWRM Plan Framework is a directional plan intended to guide different stakeholders involved in water resources management, at different levels, to either prepare their respective IWRM plans, update or enhance their existing IWRM related plans, or make IWRM an integral part of their development plans and programs. It
- 3. The increasing water demand together with insufficient water infrastructure threaten to outstrip sustainable levels of supply. Over extraction of groundwater due to increase in water demand resulted to a decline in groundwater levels or drying up of wells or springs; and the contamination of wells by salt water intrusion in coastal areas. There are also threats on groundwater and surface water caused by: a) domestic, agricultural, and industrial wastes; b) watershed degradation including deforestation and denudation of forests; and c) climate change and global warming.
- 4. To respond to these challenges and ensure that demand does not overrun supply, there should be a balancing mechanism to ensure that the economic growth and development does not jeopardize the viability and integrity of the ecosystems both in the present and in the future.
- 5. The TWG on Water Resources Management of the EDC chaired by DENR MIMAROPA RD Ma. Lourdes G. Ferrer initiated the formulation of an IWRM Framework for MIMAROPA region. A representative from DENR MIMAROPA will present the IWRM Framework for MIMAROPA and the status of approved master plans on IWRM for discussion of the members.

Subject: Updated MIMAROPA RDIP 2017-2022 and FY 2023 AIP

- 1. The MIMAROPA Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP) 2017-2022 is updated annually to revalidate and enhance the investment programs, activities, and projects (PAPs) of agency regional offices (AROs), state universities and colleges (SUCs) and government owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs) in the region. It ensures that PAPs remain consistent with the goals and strategies identified in the Philippine Development Plan (PDP), Regional Development Plan (RDP), Regional Physical Framework Plan (RPFP), and local development plans (Provincial and City/Municipal Development Plans) and are given the appropriate funding to generate the intended results/outcome. Moreover, the FY 2023 Annual Investment Program (AIP) is included to serve as the basis in the review of agency budget proposals for FY 2023.
- 2. The updating of the RDIP is expected to: (1) include priority or pipeline PAPs for NEDA Investment Coordination Committee (ICC) approval for FY 2023 budget and implementation; (2) identify priority PAPs for FY 2023 to be funded from General Appropriations Act (GAA), Official Development Assistance (ODA), or through Public Private Partnership (PPP) or other funding sources; (3) update the investment cost of PAPs for years 2020, 2021 and 2022 of the current RDIP; and (4) identify unfunded PAPs that are included in the current RDIP which can be re-proposed in the succeeding medium-term investment program or can be proposed to be dropped in the RDIP.
- 3. On October 14, the Regional Development Council (RDC) MIMAROPA conducted a consultation workshop for the updating of the MIMAROPA RDIP and the preparation of the FY 2023 AIP through zoom videoconference. The activity was participated in by the representatives from different RLAs, LGUs, GOCCs, SUCs, and the RDC private sector representatives. Four workshop groups/sectoral committees validated and reviewed the submitted agency investment programs for FYs 2021, 2021, and 2022 including PAPs for FY 2023 funding and implementation. The sectoral workshops discussed the next steps in the RDIP updating and FY 2023 AIP preparation. The main outputs of the workshop were the validated sectoral investment programs to include the priority projects of the sector and the region.
- 4. The Secretariat will present the validated sectoral investment programs including the FY 2023 AIP. These sectoral investment programs shall form part of the updated RDIP that will be presented to the RDC for approval and adoption during the 4th quarter full council meeting on December 03.
- 5. Action requested: For endorsement to the RDC.

BRIEF FROM THE EDC SECRETARIAT

Subject: Proposed Declaration of the Province of Marinduque as a Mining-Free Zone

- 1. The Marinduque Council for Environmental Concerns (MACEC), a church based non-governmental organization appealed to all government agencies, civil society organizations (CSOs), religious organizations and the academe to manifest opposition to Executive Order No. 130, s. 2021: Amending Section 4 of EO No. 79, s. 2012, Institutionalizing and Implementing Reforms in the Philippine Mining Sector, Providing Policies and Guidelines to Ensure Environmental Protection and Responsible Mining in the Utilization of Mineral Resources.
- 2. The MACEC provided copies of resolutions and statements from six municipalities and 218 barangays of its local government unit (LGU), CSOs, religious organizations, Sangguniang Kabataan, and other youth organizations requesting to: a) deny with finality the mineral production sharing agreement (MPSA) application of Marcopper and 38 other mining applications; b) delist Marinduque from the mining tenement area; and c) declare the province of Marinduque as a mining-free zone. The MACEC also reported the presence of unidentified nuclear materials and 100 barrels of hazardous waste found in the Marcopper mining site.
- 3. The RDC-TWG initiated the conduct of an online meeting on July 29 to discuss the following: a) proposed Presidential action to declare Marinduque as a mining-free zone; b) presence of radioactive materials and 100 barrels of hazardous wastes in the Marcopper mining site; and c) updates on the construction of flood/sediment control structure in Mogpog River in Marinduque. The meeting served as a venue for the stakeholders to raise their concerns regarding the status of mining in Marinduque.
- 4. An Aide Memoire on the proposed declaration of the Province of Marinduque as a mining-free zone was prepared and will be presented to members for discussion. The document includes assessment of the mining industry, impacts of mining in the province, alternative industries for economic growth of Marinduque, and some recommendations. Among the recommendations include: (1) a proposed framework that can be adopted by the Provincial Government as an alternate strategy for economic recovery anchored on good governance through participatory approach with the development partners, (2) development of a recovery action plan anchored on this framework, and (3) updating of the land use plans and zoning ordinances.
- 5. Action requested: For endorsement to the RDC.

AIDE-MEMOIRE

Background

- 1. The issuance of Executive Order (EO) 130 s. 2021: Amending Section 4 of EO No. 79, s. 2012, Institutionalizing and Implementing Reforms in the Philippine Mining Sector, Providing Policies and Guidelines to Ensure Environmental Protection and Responsible Mining in the Utilization of Mineral Resources lifts the nine-year moratorium on mineral agreements to spur economic growth and support projects and programs of the government. The said EO mentioned that the country has tapped less than 5 percent of its mineral endowment. Thus, this EO was issued to usher significant economic benefits to the country as the mining industry is expected to provide raw materials for the Build Build Build Program and increase employment opportunities in rural areas for the Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa (BP²) Program to stimulate countryside development.
- 2. The issuance EO 130 triggered the concerns of several local government units, non-government organizations, civil society groups, and residents of Marinduque as the Mines and Geosciences Bureau (MGB) is expected to accept new mining applications and process the 39 pending applications including the mineral production sharing agreement (MPSA) of Marcopper for the continuation of San Antonio Copper Project in the province. Due to the mining disaster that happened in 1996 that brought irreparable damage to the people and the environment, the people of Marinduque strongly oppose any mining activities in the province as stipulated in the 75 resolutions and statements from various local government units (LGUs), civil society organizations, religious organizations, Sangguniang Kabataan, and other youth organizations.
- 3. In a letter dated June 22, 2021 the Marinduque Council for Environmental Concerns (MACEC) furnished Regional Development Council (RDC) MIMAROPA a copy of MACEC Resolution entitled "Resolution Earnestly Requesting His Excellency President Rodrigo Roa Duterte to Undertake a Reconsideration on the Lifting of Mining Moratorium, to Delist the Entire Province of Marinduque on the Mining Tenement Map and Declare it as a "No Go Zone" for Mining and requested for the RDC resolution recommending to support the said resolution.
- 4. Similarly, House Bill No. 9019 principally authored by now House Speaker and Marinduque Representative Lord Allan Jay Velasco seeks to declare the Province of Marinduque a mining-free zone and to prohibit all forms of mining operations and activity in the province.
- 5. On July 29, the RDC-TWG on Mining convened and agreed to study the proposal and ensure its compliance with legal provisions and existing rules and regulations particularly on EO 79: Institutionalizing and implementing Reforms in the Philippine Mining Sector, and to come up with strategic recommendations for the RDC MIMAROPA to act on.

Contribution of Mining Industry in the Philippine Economy

6. The Philippines has high deposits of gold, copper, nickel, and other minerals. It is considered as the 5th most mineral-rich country in the world with 30% (around 9 million hectares) of its territory

identified as having high mineral potential based from the MGB. The total gross production value in mining from 2018-2022 averaged PhP187.2 billion wherein large scale metallic mining accounts the biggest share of aggregate production value (Table 1).

7. The mining industry produces primarily for the world market. It contributed 7.87% to the country's total exports in 2020 amounting US\$5.20 billion. Copper, gold, and nickel are the country's top mineral exports with Japan, Australia, Canada, and China as the major countries of destination. It was also observed that contribution of mining to export values increased from 2018-2020 (Table 2).

8. The number of operating metallic mines in the country was maintained to 50 in 2020. More than half of said mines are operating to produce nickel. (Table 3). Hundreds of applications are currently being processed, reaching 1,316 in 2020. Majority of the applications are for exploration permits, mineral product share agreement, and industrial sand and gravel permit.

9. Despite the high income that the industry generates, the average contribution of mining to the Gross Domestic Product (2018 constant prices) from 2018 to 2020 was only 0.53% while the average contribution of mining industry to the total employment was 0.46% only (Table 4).

Marinduque Mining Industry: The Case of Marcopper

10. Marinduque is one among the five island provinces of the MIMAROPA region, a lone district consists of six municipalities, namely Boac, Gasan, Buenavista, Torrijos, Santa Cruz, and Mogpog and with 218 barangays (Figure 1). Popularly known as the Heart of the Philippine Islands due to its shape and geographical location, Marinduque plays a significant role in the Philippines' history. The Luzon Datum of 1911, a stone marker was placed on top of Mt. Mataas, Brgy. Hinanggayon in Mogpog is the primary geodetic reference or origin of all geodetical surveying and mapping. The province is famous for its colorful Moriones festival which is one of the oldest religious festivals in the country as it first appeared in 1807 at the town of Mogpog. This tradition is observed during Holy week where morion masks and visors are used to depict Roman soldiers in the Passion of Christ, specifically Longinus who received miracle and was convinced that Jesus was truly the Son of God and had converted to Christianity.




Figure 2. Mineral Resources in Marinduque

11. Its total land area of 95,295 hectares is not only blessed with rich culture and traditional practices, hypnotic sceneries from plain lands to mountaintops down to the waters, and picturesque natural destinations, but also with mineral deposits of copper, iron, manganese, limestone, gold, and silver (Figure 2). This paved the way for the island exploration in 1956 which led to the discovery of its potential for mining and eventually Marinduque engaged into large-scale mining. Moreover, there are also quarry sites in the province

12. Marcopper Mining Corporation (MMC) and Placer Development Limited (Placer Dome) began its mining operations in 1969 on what was known as the Mt. Tapian ore deposit, an open pit mining which was used to produce copper concentrates (Figure 3). The company used to dispose of its waste on land until a blanket permit was given to Marcopper in 1975 which allowed them to dump mine tailings into the Calanacan Bay at the rate of 2.5 tons per second. From 1975 to mid-1991, about 200 million tons of mine tailings were dumped via surface disposal into Calanacan Bay which according to some fishermen affected their livelihood. (MGB MIMAROPA)



13. Marinduque hosted the operations of MMC from 1969 to 1996. It was one of the world's largest copper mines, employing 1,000 to 1,500 workers. In the company's final 10 years of operation alone, the MMC generated foreign exchange earnings of US\$ 431 billion, paid income taxes amounting to P317 million, and excise taxes of P435 million. MMC also claimed to have contributed P347 million in the form of community assistance projects and subsidized electricity.

However, the province of Marinduque was not able to maximize these benefits as the province is still a fourth-class province in terms of income.

14. Population and Poverty Reduction. The spatial analysis of population showed that majority of the areas in the province manifested increase of population density to the south-western portion of the province toward its capital municipality of Boac. Population trends and dynamics have an enormous effect on prospects for poverty reduction and sustainable development. High population densities demand high resources which can pose threats to the environment due to overexploitation and habitat/environmental degradation which can aggravate poverty.

Seven years after the mining disaster in the province occurred, Marinduque has experienced high poverty incidence among families. However, it can be observed that the poverty incidence in the province continued to decrease from 2003-2011 (Figure 4). It can also be noted that in 2011, the province has started to promote tourism to drive their economy.



- 15. Lindon et. al (2014, page 182) stated that an aspect of the economy of Marinduque is the overreliance of the provincial government on the internal revenue allotment (IRA). After the operations of the MMC, there has been a steady decrease in the proportion of the budget generated from local sources of income while the proportion of budget from IRA dramatically increased. In 1992, the proportion of the budget covered by locally sourced income was 28.2%, but by 2009, the proportion decreased to 6.3%. While overreliance to IRA is a common thing among poor provinces, this only showed that Marinduque has experienced problems in generating income locally since the closure of MMC in 1996.
- 16. In terms of tax collection, the Provincial Government of Marinduque estimated that the MMC has an unpaid real property income taxes amounting to P1.048 billion. This was a big loss of income from the provincial government, which can be used for the delivery of public services. Moreover, the MMC was also able to obtain regular income tax deferments or tax holidays resulting to no income tax payments to the national government in 1981, 1982, 1984-1987, 1993-1996 (Lindon et. al, 2014).
- 17. Aside from the loss of income from unpaid taxes, the major environmental disaster that happened in the Province of Marinduque such as the collapse of Maguila-guila dam in 1993 and the bursting of the tunnel at the bottom of Mt. Tapian which flowed directly into the Makulapnit waterways and Boac River System in 1996 that resulted to river pollution, loss of livelihood and property, and threat to human health.

18. The case of Marcopper showed that large-scale mining, which was perceived as a possible driver of economic development in Marinduque, appeared to have had little or no impact in the local economy. Until now, the residents of Marinduque are suffering from the health, economic, and environmental consequences brought by the greatest environmental disaster that occurred in the country. Thus, the province should continue venturing on other industries to drive the local economy other than mining. Analysis of the competitive advantages of the province can provide a picture of industries that can be pushed as economic growth drivers for Marinduque.

Analysis of Competitive Advantages and Potentials of Marinduque




Figure 5. Location Quotient Analysis of Industries in Marinduque

19. A location quotient analysis was conducted to determine the competitive industries in the province (Figure 5). Results showed that there are as stars (strong and growing) and emerging industries. These are (1) agriculture, forestry, and fishing; (2) water supply, sewerage, waste management, and remediation activities; and (3) arts, entertainment, and recreation. These industries showed increase in the fraction of employment over the period relative to the nation. On the other hand, the following are the emerging industries in the province or those whose fraction of employment is currently less than that in the nation but whose fraction of employment has increased over the period relative to the nation: (1) manufacturing; (2) information communication; (3) transport and storage; and (4) financial and insurance activities. These opportunities are discussed below.

20. **Agriculture, Forestry, and Fisheries**. The total crop production of the province increased by 75.28 percent from 5,892.37 metric tons of 2019 to 10,327.89 metric tons in 2020. There had been an increase in production specifically in root crops (cassava and arrowroot) despite being hit by Typhoons Quinta, Rolly and Ulysses in the last quarter of 2020.

The total fish production of the province recorded a decrease of 12.40 percent from 3,075.90 metric tons in 2019 to 2,694.48 in 2020. The decrease in fish production may be partly attributed to the ill effects of the mining disaster to its marine and aquatic resources which affected the livelihood of the fisherfolks as well as to the global decrease in capture fisheries brought by

climate change. However, several fishery development programs e.g. livelihood support, project establishment, extension services and law enforcement, were provided.

Based on the production land use, coconut industry is the province's major agricultural industry. Agri-business offers great potential as an investment opportunity. Copra trading has always been the dominant feature of the province's coconut industry. With the development of value adding for agriculture products, various coco-based products are introduced in the industries that can provide additional income for rural farmers. These include the virgin coconut oil (VCO), coco sugar, coco wine, coco coir and coco geonet made of coco fiber.

The province also produces the best quality of starch from arrowroot. Intercropping coconut plantations with other crops such as arrowroot will ensure continuous supply of raw materials for its arrowroot starch and other by-products and will complement the proposed establishment of integrated agri-processing centers in Boac. The province can also produce high value commercial crops in some areas with climate and temperature similar to provinces that are capable of producing strawberry, lettuce, repolyo, carrots, and sayote. Based on the soil classification of Marinduque, the province's soil is suitable for other crop production such as banana and mango.

With Marinduque being chosen as the pilot province of MIMAROPA in the implementation of Provincial-led Agriculture and Fishery Extension Systems (PAFES), strengthened collaboration between the Department of Agriculture, local government units, academe, and private sector was institutionalized to bring extension services to the grassroots level amid the challenges of devolution. With PAFES, the province of Marinduque shall serve as an extension hub that will synchronize agricultural plans and programs as well as orchestrate the activities of various stakeholders as it aims to increase the production and income for the agriculture and fisheries sector.

21. Tourism Potentials. Marinduque is an island province naturally blessed with clear blue water and gorgeous shoreline. The province retains its pristine beaches because it has yet to attract more domestic and foreign visitors. Being surrounded by small group of islands, island hopping is popular in the province. Farm tourism is becoming prominent in the country and Marinduque is one of the provinces with great potential in farm tourism. Rural farms in the province are becoming attractive tourist destinations because they offer travelers a richer and unique experience. Travelers also get to see unspoiled nature and the fresh environment at the farms as well as get to know the local culture and traditions of the province.

Another advantage of the province is its rich culture and tradition. Ancestral houses that depict influences of Spanish colonial time as well as the native Filipino house "bahay kubo" are still present along the streets of Marinduque. Marinduque is an archaeological site as it provided vital archaeological finds about Philippines pre-Spanish era.

With reference to RA 8022, the municipalities of Boac, Buenavista and Torrijos, were declared as Tourist Zones had it not lapsed into law in 1995. Also, Marinduque Wildlife Sanctuary covering more than 900 hectares in the municipalities of Boac, Buenavista, Torrijos, Gasan, and Sta.Cruz, ecotourism is now being viewed as potentially economy booster of the province.

22. **Manufacturing, Processing, and MSME Development**. According to the PSA 2020 data, a total 2,852 establishments was registered in the province of Marinduque. About 2,745 or 96.23% were micro enterprises under wholesale and retail trade, repair of motor vehicles and motorcycles followed by manufacturing (Table 5).

Processing of agricultural products will stimulate agricultural development. It will encourage increase food supply, provides employment opportunities, raise the degree of self-reliance of the province, thereby accelerating economic growth especially in rural areas. Abundant raw materials available in the province include arrowroot, coconut, turmeric, corn, and fruits. These raw materials are significant inputs in the improvement of the processing industry in the province.

23. **Environmental Management**. Forest cover in Marinduque significantly decreased by 52.01% from 28,971.95 hectares in 2003 to 13,904.39 hectares in 2015 (Figure 5). Thus, the province may implement several reforestation activities and plant more trees especially in the mining

affected areas to prevent further soil erosion and landslide. The implementation of enhanced National Greening Program is one of the primary programs that may directly address the decreasing forest cover in the province.




Figure 6. Forest Cover in Marinduque

24. Physical Connectivity and Infrastructure Requirements. Being an island province, improving the island's connectivity within and outside the region should be prioritized in order to maximize the benefits in agriculture, tourism, and trading activities. Marinduque can be accessed through water and air transportation. Sea route transportation from Lucena is available daily. Air transportation is from Manila to Marinduque airport on selected schedules (Figure 6). With the proposed Laguna Lakeshore Road project which aims to build 376-kilometer (km) primary roads along with viaducts and the Quezon-Bicol Expressway (QUBEX) as an integrated transport and economic development strategy for the Bicol Region, it is foreseen to ease traffic for those traveling to Laguna, Rizal, Batangas, Quezon, and ultimately going to Marinduque.

To further encourage investments, energy and water services shall be pursued to supply the present and future requirements of the population and economic demands at affordable and high quality standards.

Issues and Concerns

25. The local government and the people of Marinduque share the same position of protecting their province against large scale mining activities that threaten their environment, livelihood and health. The RDC-TWG conducted a meeting on July 29 to discuss the residents' opposition to large scale mining in the Province of Marinduque and recognized the vital role of the local government units (LGUs) and the community in pursuing sustainable development.




Figure 8. Land Classification and Mining Tenement Map in Marinduque

The recommendations and strategies that can be pursued to negate large scale mining are prohibition on the application for exploration permits on areas within the protected forestland, watershed forest reserve, alienable and disposable areas including residential and tourism development areas. Based on the initial information on the mining tenement map of the province, there were some applications that cover areas that are classified as part of protected areas, tourism areas, and forestlands (Figure 8).

Updating the comprehensive land use plans (CLUPs), forest land use plans, provincial development and physical framework plan, and zoning ordinances (ZOs) to contain policy of prohibiting large scale mining would be vital in controlling mining applications in the province. Once applications for mining permit are submitted to the LGU, the LGU shall automatically disapprove the application based on these plans. Thus, all municipalities in Marinduque shall be enjoined to update their CLUPs and ZOs to declare their metallic mineral areas under strict protection zone and be closed to all human activities except for scientific studies and/or ceremonial or religious use by indigenous communities.

26. Given the potentials of the province of Marinduque on agriculture and tourism, large scale mining may no longer be the necessary industry to depend on. Economic growth can be focused on a wider spatial scale and community inclusion. Agriculture and tourism can be pursued with food production, agri-processing, and MSME promotions and be supported with infrastructure and environmental management. The Department of Agriculture, Department of Tourism, Department of Trade and Industry, and local government units of Marinduque, among others, shall be enjoined to develop agriculture and tourism in the province to spur livelihood and employment opportunities and improve the local economy.




Figure 9. Butterfly Model Strategic Framework

The Provincial Government of Marinduque may also adopt below proposed framework (Figure 9) as an alternate strategy for economic recovery. The butterfly model framework seeks to depict the interactions of the four major sectors namely tourism, agriculture, environment, and infrastructure which is anchored on good governance through participatory approach of all its development partners. This framework maybe a basis of a plan containing programs, activities, and projects to be funded under various sources.

- 27. Based on the CY 2019 monitoring activities conducted by the Mines and Geosciences Bureau, the status of MMC Critical structures were as follows:
 - a. North Dam. It served as the tailings storage of MMC during the mining operation of the Tapian Pit. In 1988, MMC pumped the tailings into Calancan Bay to make way for the San Antonio ore body exploration and mining development. Since the shutdown of MMC's mining operation in March 1996, the company has failed to maintain the North Dam. Lack of maintenance and exposure to various erosional processes allowed its unstable section to loosen gradually, and may result to possible dam failure.
 - b. Maguila-Guila Siltation Dam. Based on the assessment of the MGB MIMAROPA, one of the mine structures of MMC was in a rapidly deteriorating condition. The function of the dam was to prevent soil, sediments, and large debris from the Maguila-guila waste dump from being transported and deposited in the downstream reaches of the Mogpog River. However, the creek continuously erodes during rainy season, and the wastes dumped generates acid and the toxic materials continue to flow to the downstream of Mogpog River causing harmful effect to the community nearby.
 - c. Four pieces of radioactive materials tor RAMs (1 unit Ra-226 and 1 unit Cs-137 check sources, 2 units Cs-137 sources for level gauging) were found in a storage vault in the mine site. However, there was no strict inventory and security controls, the RAMs could be stolen and be tampered and may cause radiation exposure or contamination. Thus, the Philippine Nuclear Research Institute is recommending the issuance of order to take custody of these RAMs to avoid possible damages.

Given the reported condition of the above critical structures, the recovery and rehabilitation efforts to address the impacts of the MMC mining waste structures and the acid and toxic chemicals it generate in the rivers, conduct of researches, tree planting activities, among others, shall be sustained by the DENR, MGB, local government units, civil society organizations, among others. This include the preparation of recovery action plan and immediate approval of the Gabion Dam for implementation.

The rehabilitation and recovery from the MMC disaster may take decades to realize its results, the province shall disallow large-scale metallic mining activities that could potentially cause impact similar to what they have experienced from the MMC. However, the province may allow non-metallic mining activities such as sand and gravel subject to approval of the MGB and LGUs.

28. The request for RDC support to declare the Province of Marinduque as a no-go zone for mining emanated from the traumatic experience of the people of Marinduque as well as the irreparable damage of the mining disaster to the environment, livelihood, and health of the people. After MMC left the province in 1996, Marinduque has improved its economy better than the period when there was large scale mining and has reduced its poverty down to 10% in 2018. In this case, the people of Marinduque may need to assert their right to revitalize their economy without large scale mining.

Recommendations

- 29. As such, it is recommended to favorably endorse the initiative to declare the province of Marinduque as a mining-free zone. The parallel activities are also recommended to be undertaken, to wit:
 - All municipalities in Marinduque be enjoined to update their CLUPs and ZOs to declare their metallic mineral areas under strict protection zone and be closed to all human activities except for scientific studies and/or ceremonial or religious use by indigenous communities;
 - b. The Department of Agriculture, Department of Tourism, Department of Trade and Industry, and local government units of Marinduque, among others, shall be enjoined to develop agriculture and tourism in the province to spur livelihood and employment opportunities and improve the local economy; and
 - c. The recovery and rehabilitation efforts to address the impacts of the MMC mining waste structures and the acid and toxic chemicals it generate in the rivers, conduct of researches, tree planting activities, among others, shall be sustained by the DENR, MGB, local government units, civil society organizations, among others. This include the preparation of recovery action plan and immediate approval of the Gabion Dam for implementation.
 - d. The Province of Marinduque may allow non-metallic (sand and gravel) mining activities such be allowed subject to the approval of MGB and the LGUs.

Subject: List of Protected Areas in the Region under the ENIPAS Act

- 1. The National Integrated Protected Areas Management System (NIPAS) was established in 1992 through the Republic Act (RA) No. 7586, as amended by RA No. 11038, otherwise known as the Expanded National Integrated Protected Areas System (ENIPAS) Act of 2018.
- 2. The establishment of the NIPAS as stated under Section 2 of the RA 11038 was brought by the need to protect and conserve the natural, biological, and physical diversities of the environment particularly on areas with biologically unique features to ensure balance between the economic growth and environmental integrity. The established NIPAS shall encompass ecologically rich and unique areas and biologically important public lands that are habitats of rare and threatened species of plants and animals, biographic zones and related ecosystems, whether terrestrial, wetland or marine, all of which shall be designated as "protected areas (PAs)". The System shall recognize conservation areas and the management regimes being implemented by local government units (LGUs), local communities, and indigenous peoples (IPs).
- 3. Pursuant to Section 32 of the ENIPAS Act, the implementing rules and regulations (IRR), incorporating and integrating all existing regulations relevant thereto was promulgated through the issuance of the DENR Administrative Order No. 2019-05. Under the IRR, a Protected Area Management Board (PAMB) was created for each PAs headed by the heads of the regional offices of the DENR based on their respective areas of jurisdiction to serve as an oversight body to ensure the effective and efficient management of the PAs.
- 4. The region has a total of 15 proclaimed PAs: 4 from Occidental Mindoro; 1 from Oriental Mindoro; 2 from Marinduque; 2 from Romblon; and 6 from Palawan.
- 5. During the 3rd quarter joint Regional Ecotourism Committee (REC) and MIMAROPA Regional Tourism Committee (MRTC) meeting on September 28, it was agreed that the list of protected areas in the region under the ENIPAS Act be presented in the 3rd quarter Economic Development Committee meeting.
- 6. The DENR MIMAROPA is requested to present the list of protected areas in the region under the ENIPAS Act, as well as its status, issues and concerns encountered, and the corresponding recommendations.

Subject: Status of MSMEs' COVID-19 recovery efforts in the region

- 1. The COVID-19 pandemic recorded various impact across sectors of the economy. The imposition of lockdown as an intervention to curb the spread of the pandemic greatly affected the micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs). It resulted to the temporary closure of numerous establishments and in turn displaced a number of employees. Non-essential establishments engaged on wholesale and retail trade, recreation and entertainment, tourism-related businesses, hotel and accommodations, restaurants, manufacturing, and service activities on non-food sectors experienced the biggest losses due to pandemic.
- 2. A total of 52,853 MSMEs were affected by COVID-19 in the region as of December 2020. Palawan recorded the highest number of affected MSMEs at 19, 270. This was followed by Oriental Mindoro with 14,046 affected MSMEs, Marinduque with 6,839 affected MSMEs, Occidental Mindoro with 6,673 affected MSMEs, and Romblon with 6,025 affected MSMEs. Out of the 52,853 MSMEs affected by COVID-19 in the region, 42,282 MSMEs are fully operational, 7,924 MSMEs are partially operational, and 2,647 remain closed.
- 3. The concerned agencies continue to provide support for the MSMEs in the region to recover from the adverse effects of the pandemic at the soonest possible time. The MSMEs recovery will be vital in the regional economy to bounce back and adopt to the new normal.
- 4. A representative from DTI MIMAROPA will present the status of MSMEs during the pandemic including the challenges, interventions and ways forward.

Concerned government agencies are also enjoined to pool their support and conduct activities in connection with NRAM as long as these activities are relative to their mandates.
- 4. Representative from DA MIMAROPA will present the highlights of Proclamation No. 524, s. 2004 and planned activities in celebration of the 2021 NRAM at the national and regional levels.
