# **USAID Safe Water** Background

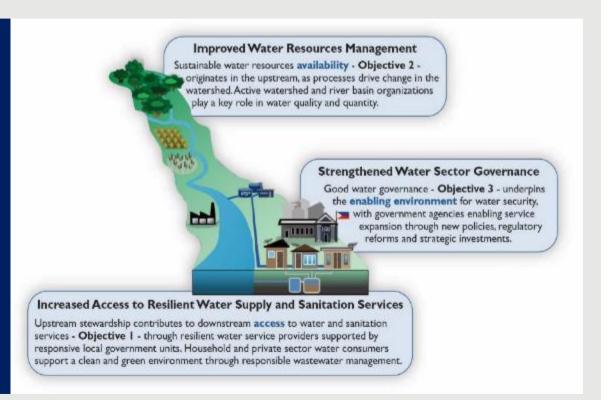
USAID's flagship project for the water sector (\$16M, 2019-2024)

**Scope:** WSS expansion and improvement, water resource management and strengthening of governance in the sector

**Focus areas:** Negros Occidental, Palawan and Sarangani Province and General Santos City

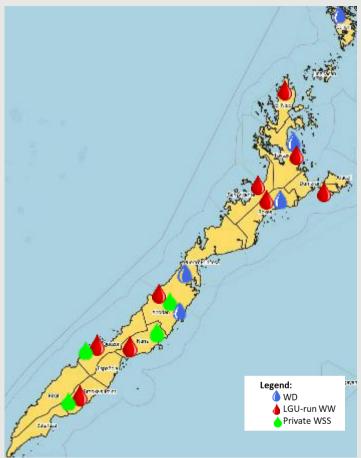

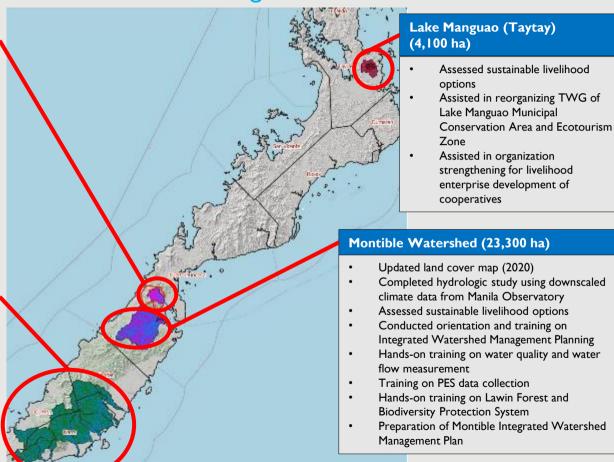

- Collaborated with Water.org and its MFI WSP Partners to scale efforts to finance household access to improved WSS services

#### I. BASELINE SURVEY AND ASSESSMENT OF WSPs

- Conduct baseline survey for the rest of the LGUs in the province
- Assess capacity of WSPs using the project WSP Assessment Tool
- Gather available plans, studies, as-built drawings to analyze the water systems

# 2.TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE ON PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

- Hydraulic analysis of PPCWD system to assess capacity to accommodate additional big water source at Montible and preparation of Program of Work (POW) if necessary
- Monitoring of implementation of Water Safety Plan of PPCWD (follow-on activity to SURGE)
- Updating of previously prepared POWs for unserved areas in Puerto Princesa City which are mostly inaccessible, and help identify and confirm water sources

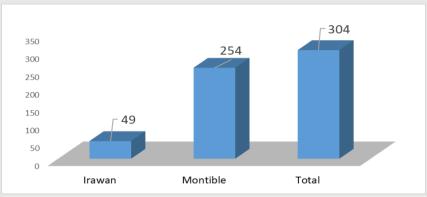
