II. PROCEEDINGS/HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MEETING:

- The meeting started at 10:00 AM with the invocation, acknowledgement of the participants by Mr. Efril Maranan followed by welcome remarks by Ms. Nieves L. Bonifacio, Assistant Regional Director, OCD MIMAROPA and RD Ruben L Carandang called the meeting to order. This was followed by the presentation of the proposed agenda by Mr Efril Maranan.

A. PRESENTATION OF THE PDNA REPORT BY THE LEAD SECTOR AGENCIES

○ Productive Sector

- Mr Randy Pernia express gratitude to the agencies comprising the Productive sector: DTI, DOT, MGB-DENR, BFAR who assessed the needs of Palawan. Mr Pernia presented the summary of damages, losses, and needs of the Productive sector wherein crops sub-sector showed the highest amount of needs followed by the fisheries sub-sector and tourism sub-sector while mining sub-sector recorded the least amount of needs. HVCC Fruits particularly banana have the highest amount of losses excluding the permanent crops: rubber, coconut and abaca. For livestock and poultry, large ruminant, mostly cows and carabao, have the highest losses amounting to 26 million.
- Regarding the summary of recovery and reconstruction needs in the agriculture sub-sector, 2-3 seasons are needed for the estimated total restoration and duration of crops. For the area of high value crops particularly the fruit trees, cash crops are best desired for its restoration. Seeds and other planting materials are also required for those plants that can bear within one to two seasons. Largest needed amount of assistance in the agriculture sub-sector are for planting materials. These are for the high value crops like banana, cashew and mango. Next recorded highest amount of needs is for the organic micronutrient fertilizer in which restoration promotes balance fertilization strategy that increases the use of organic micronutrients to protect the environment, to lessen waste and to protect the health of our farmers. The proposed source of funds is mainly from the National Disaster Risk Reduction Management Fund (NDRRMF). Roxas, Palawan has the highest recorded damages for rubber trees which needs production intervention amounting to 19 million. For livestock, Mr Pernia mentioned that they are planning to target giving a one time restocking for the damages incurred. For the medium-term, besides the additional pasture support, he mentioned supporting drugs and biologics for



the health of the animals. Recovery needs for the agriculture sub-sector amounts to Php 959,098,777.00. Irrigation facilities needs comprises of dams and irrigation canals including the solar power irrigation canals amounting to Php 41,510,500.00. Recovery program recommended the usual primary intervention of high-quality seeds of rice, corn and vegetables followed by the fertilizer micro-nutrients. Categorized to secondary intervention are farm animal reproduction targeting to give out high breed animals for breeding purposes. Coconut, rubber and abaca areas have been programmed for two-year rehabilitation because these perennial crops which are adapted to depleted environment generally don't need intensive management and can cope up from calamity easily in a shorter period of time. Reconstruction need allocation shall fund restoration of irrigation facilities and machineries and infrastructures particularly coffee processing center in Roxas, Palawan. Essential also is the rehabilitation of a training post maintained by DA's marketing division in fostering affordable and healthy agri-commodities. Huge allocation was intended for the re-establishment of commercial poultry business particularly in Roxas, Palawan. The recovery interventions have been aligned with the provision of various production inputs for crops, livestock and poultry, and fisheries; repair of production, post-production and small-scale irrigation facilities and provision of other assistance in the form of cash for culled live animals or other necessary tools and supplies.

- Mr Pernia presented the summary of damages, losses and needs for the fishery sub-sector. The reconstruction and recovery framework of this sub-sector is aligned to its mandate of a "Food Secure Philippines with Prosperous Farmers and Fisherfolk" such as distribution of boats, gears and distribution of fingerlings and seaweed seedlings. The highest amount for the proposed project is for the cash for work followed by the distribution of boats and gears with estimated needs amounting to Php 748,491,250.00. The following reconstruction and recovery strategies are recommended for the fisheries sub-sector: 1) The Survival and Recovery Aid by the Agricultural Credit and Policy Council must be coordinated with qualified farmers and fisherfolk to access loan which BFAR already started; 2) To address the climate change with the use of climate resilient seaweed, seedlings, plants and breeds of animals; and 3) To lessen the burden on rehabilitation of typhoon-related damages of fisheries projects on the government and for LGUs to impose availment of insurance for all the farmers and fisherfolks.
- For the tourism sub-sector, a total of Php 342,458,694.00 damages was incurred and the needed amount for recovery and rehabilitation amounts to Php 464,219,806.87. Largest damages and needs were reported in Puerto Princesa City followed by Roxas, San Vicente and Taytay. Repairs, reconstruction and rehabilitation of partially and totally damaged tourism establishment and facilities were one of the short-term projects proposed under tourism sub-sector.
- Mr Pernia also reiterated the summary of damages, losses and needs in industry, trade and services sub-sector where San Vicente has the highest amount of needs. The proposed rehabilitation and recovery projects under the industry, trade and services sub-sector includes the repair or replacement of equipment and machinery, procurement of vital supplies, cleaning operations and replacement or reconstruction of affected structures.



- For the mining sub-sector, no recorded damages in the large-scale mining operations while all the damages were incurred in the quarrying operations amounting to Php 3,695,000.00. For the recovery needs, the urgent repair/ replacement of equipment and machinery and clearing operations amounts to Php 4,718,750.00. Policy and program recommendations for mining sub-sector are the following: 1) Establishment of efficient and effective policies and scheme on the data collection of mining related reports; 2) Strengthening the relations between mining permit holders and concerned LGUs; 3) Strict enforcement of the provisions of the laws, rules and regulations concerning mining operations and 4) Conduct capacity building and training activities on DRR.
- Dir Carandang inquired if all the damages and losses were accounted for during the conduct of the PDNA in Palawan and Mr Pernia assured that all the reports were included for the Productive sector.
- Mr Rino Labay shared the experience in the Province of Marinduque that all the figures reported in the PDNA must be supported by the complete list of individual names. Mr Pernia agreed that the reports have the corresponding list of beneficiaries. Mr Pernia already coordinated with the Palawan Provincial Agricultural Office and all the Municipal Agricultural Offices during the Sure Aid briefing and reiterated that they have to submit the list of names with the required format of the Department of Agriculture and the insurance company. As of February 16, 2022, they are completing the distribution list particularly in the livestock but reassured that they have the listing for HVCCs.
- Ms Nieves Bonifacio also raised the funding source for PPAs proposed by DA and suggested that the projects with lower amount of needs can be sourced thru DA funds and NDRRMF. Mr Pernia will coordinate with their regional and central office regarding the proposed PPAs' funding source. Dir Carandang also manifested how do they separate and monitor the computation of damages incurred by one typhoon to another typhoon. Mr Pernia mentioned that they have a record of areas affected by the different typhoons, there is separate list of affected beneficiaries and budget tranche.

○ SOCIAL SECTOR

- Ms Azeneth Trasmonte presented the final output for social sector which consists of Housing, Health and Education sub-sector. The damages for social amounts to Php 2,257,131,557.92, losses recorded amounts to Php 2,026,205,559.80 with a total amount of Php 20,933,876,511.10 for the needs. For housing sub-sector, there are 89,782 total reported total damaged houses in Puerto Princesa City and Palawan with Php 1,522,952,856.97 cost of damages. Ms Azeneth also presented the PPAs under the reconstruction and recovery needs for the housing sub-sector amounting to Php 19,655,577,500.00. Policy and program recommendations for the housing sub-sector includes identification and provision of possible relocation/ resettlement sites, preparation and submission of RRP to NGAs, enforcement of legislations and intensify awareness/ advocacy campaign activities regarding disaster-resilient construction of houses.



- There were 8 district hospitals/ facilities, 57 BHS/ BHC/ RHU, 11 isolation facilities, laboratories and 198 medical equipment/ supplies damaged with a total of Php 39,938,478.77. For all the damaged units mentioned, there are a total loss of Php 864,818.55. Reconstruction and recovery needs for the health sub-sector amounts to Php 54,841,760.07. To intensify health workers relationship with the community, conducting regular visit of health personnel to areas affected particularly those hard-to-reach areas, to intensify health educational campaigns, strengthening the coordination and collaboration among concerned government and private stakeholders, to enhance/ update on emergency preparedness and response plans and continuous inventory and replenishment of medicine are the policy and program recommendations under the health sub-sector.
- For the education sub-sector, there were 1,686 damaged infrastructures while 9,283,915 damaged non-infrastructure amounting to Php 241,866,767.18 with loss of Php 4,737,500.00. Ms Trasmonte presented the reconstruction and recovery needs under the education sub-sector amounting to Php 1,223,457,251.03. Some of the policy and programs recommendations are the following: 1) Relocation of schools from the hazard-prone area with secured building establishment clearance from DENR-MGB; 2) To review the quality standards of the construction materials and consider revision of the building design for the resilient type buildings; and 3) Provide capacity building for teachers and learners regarding DRRM, CCAM, EIE in schools.
- Dir Carandang manifested if all the damages and losses were accounted for under the social sector wherein Ms Trasmonte responded that they recomputed the data based on the latest submission of the Palawan Province and Puerto Princesa City.
- Engr Oliver Mauleon of DPWH MIMAROPA presented the summary of damages, losses and needs of the infrastructure sector. Transportation sub-sector consists of roads, bridges, flood control, irrigation facilities and ports. A total of Php 35,397,228.00 worth of damages for the water sub-sector, losses of Php 48,955,280.03 and needs amounting to Php 51,573,265.92 were presented. Under the power sub-sector, a total of Php 115,642,994.87 is needed for the rehabilitation and repair of distribution line and storm guying activities. For the irrigation, the estimated cost for the damages is at Php 28,225,682.76 while the needed amount for the reconstruction and rehabilitation of irrigation structure amounts to Php 35,161,738.79. A total of 161 proposed PPAs are included in the infrastructure sector amounting to Php 1,160,104,101.96.
- Dir Carandang manifested again if all of the reports were included in the PDNA report. Engr Mauleon mentioned that the recent reports they received was from telecommunications which was owned usually by the private sectors. Also, he added that all the reports were gathered from their local counterparts and all national infrastructures were included. He also reiterated that the dredging of local bodies of water is not part of the mandate of DPWH but the involved dredging under the agency are the part of rivers affecting the national structures like roads or bridges.

○ **CROSS-SECTORAL**



- Ms Riznette Kath Sales presented the data under the cross-sector which includes governance, environment, livelihood and employment, and the macroeconomic impact. In summary, a total of Php 285,742,314.59 worth of damage, loss amounting to Php 24,792,723.87 and needs amounting to Php 569,488,745.65 were reported under the cross-sector. Under the governance sub-sector, the cost of damage amounts to Php 188,531,206.75 wherein Roxas, Araceli and Puerto Princesa have the highest recorded worth of damages. Ms Sales also presented the reconstruction and recovery framework and policy and program recommendation under the governance sub-sector. For employment and livelihood, the total amount of estimated loss of income is Php 6,847,360.00 with 1,663 affected workers under 121 establishments wherein the recommended funding amounts to Php 20,547,360.00 for the proposed PPAs. Under the environment sector, Php 116,653,329.41 is the amount needed for the funding of the proposed PPAs.
- Dir Carandang manifested if all the damages and losses were accounted for under the cross-sector wherein Ms Sales mentioned that the reports were all coordinated with the concerned offices and agencies.
- Mr Felizardo Cayatoc of PENRO Palawan informed the body that they conducted the aerial inspection with the support of the TOW-WEST, with the Palawan PDRMO Mr Jerry Alili and CENRO Roxas with the jurisdiction of Araceli, Roxas and San Vicente. They have seen lots of fallen trees and logs and even the affected mangroves on the eastern side of Palawan and the reported damages, losses and needs will increase once they finish the assessment until March 2022. Dir Carandang manifested if PENRO Palawan has an existing or proposed program to remove the logs and fallen trees in some mountainous area of Palawan to prevent damages. Mr Cayatoc mentioned that they are panning out to concerned municipality/ barangay to create access for carabao logging to lessen threats to our forest ecosystem.

B. PRESENTATION OF THE RRP BY NEDA MIMAROPA

- Dir Agustin C Mendoza of NEDA MIMAROPA presented the Palawan Rehabilitation and Recovery Program for Areas affected by Typhoon Odette. Dir Mendoza started with a brief background and description of Palawan Province including its socioeconomic profile. Dir Mendoza also explained the track and strength of Typhoon Odette affecting 8 of 23 municipalities of Palawan needing a Rehabilitation and Recovery Program to achieve build back better resiliency.
- Among the four major sectors, social sector recorded the largest damages amounting to Php 2.25 billion or 51.31% of the total damages. In terms of losses, a total estimated losses of Php 4.24 billion were recorded in the region wherein productive sector reported the largest losses amounting to Php 2.09 billion or 49.33% of the total losses.
- Based on the 2020 regional accounts released by PSA, the region's economy contracted from 4.3% in 2019 to -7.6% in 2020. This was the first time that the regional economy has plunged since 2001, when PSA revised and rebased the regional accounts. Among the five MIMAROPA provinces, Palawan including Puerto Princesa City, was the biggest contributor to the region's economy with 48.2% share in 2020, higher than its 47.9% share in 2019. This was followed by Oriental Mindoro and Occidental Mindoro with 26.5% and 12.7% share, respectively. Romblon was the least



contributor to the region's economy with 7.2%. Further, Palawan recorded the highest share in all major sectors. All major sectors contracted except for agriculture, forestry, and fishing – which still managed to increase at a slower pace of 1.9% in 2020 from 7.8% in 2019. Services recorded the lowest contraction of -11.8%, while industry sector declined by -6.2%. The reversal in growth in the industry and services sectors weighed heavily on Palawan's economy. Based on the rebased Consumer Price Index (CPI) released by PSA, MIMAROPA's average inflation rate decreased to 2.9% in October to December 2021 from previous year's 4.6%. This was lower than the previous quarter's 4.0%. All provinces registered lower inflation rates. Romblon registered the highest inflation rate at 7.3%. This was followed by Occidental Mindoro and Oriental Mindoro with 5.0% and 2.5%, respectively. Palawan recorded the lowest inflation rate with 1.5%. In terms of labor force situation, the region's working age population increased by 0.97% from 2,055,000 in October 2020 to 2,075,000 in October 2021. Employment rate decreased by 2.11 percentage points from 92.1% in October 2020 to 90.0% in October 2021. The region's employment rate was also lower by 2.59 percentage points compared to the national average employment rate of 92.6%. Out of the 1,152 affected MSMEs in the province, 667 or 57.90% are from the services sector, this includes wholesale, retail, and repair enterprises with 583 MSMEs. 67 MSMEs are engaged in accommodation and food activities, and 17 MSMEs are engaged in transportation and storage. Assuming that all proposed PPAs for 2022 will be funded and implemented in Palawan, MIMAROPA's economy is still expected to grow by as much as 4.7% in 2022 despite losses from Typhoon Odette. This exceeds the revised GRDP target growth rate which was set at 3.6%-4.5% in 2022. Palawan's economy is also expected to grow by as much as 4.5% in 2022 despite losses from Typhoon Odette.

- Dir Mendoza also presented the summary of actions taken by various regional line agencies and local government units to ensure that affected individuals and families were provided with immediate assistance before and during typhoon Odette. In order to monitor and assess the implementation result of rehabilitation and recovery PPAs, the RRP for Typhoon Odette will be guided by existing Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) frameworks and policies of the Government. A quick summary of the status of RRP projects will be made available on the NEDA/RDC MIMAROPA website through a dashboard linked to the ProyekTanglaw System.
- Dir Carandang applauded that the MIMAROPA region is on time and complied to the requirements of the NDRRMC. Mr Emmanuel Perez of BFAR MIMAROPA manifested that he submitted the corrected revised computations for the losses under the fisheries sub-sector. Dir Mendoza explained that there are discrepancies with the RRP and PDNA presented as their team did some calibrations.

C. APPROVAL OF THE RDRRMC RESOLUTION RE APPROVAL OF PDNA REPORT AND SUBMISSION TO NDRRMC

- Ms. Allinah Janzen O Magnaye of OCD MIMAROPA presented the RDRRMC Resolution No 001, s. 2022 "A Resolution endorsing to the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council the results of the PDNA conducted for the MIMAROPA region specifically Palawan, on the aftermath of Typhoon Odette 2021 requesting funds therefore in the amount of Php 24,967,124,216.58".
- Dir Carandang manifested that the revisions from BFAR MIMAROPA be included in the final amount of the PDNA. Ms Bonifacio also added that the signatories in the resolution may send the signed resolutions for submission to the NDRRMC. Mr Janssen of DOST MIMAROPA asked for the



corrected copy of the resolution for endorsement and signature of their Regional Director. Mr Rowell Ramil Jacinto of DSWD MIMAROPA also asked if the chair can explain the urgency of the submission of the PDNA and RRP to the NDRRMC in which Dir Carandang obliged and enlightened the body. Dir Carandang also reiterated to send back the signed resolutions until 5:00 pm, 17 February 2022. Ms Bonifacio added that the regions who conducted PDNA and RRP as well are Regions VI, VII, VIII, CARAGA, and MIMAROPA.

- Mr Maranan solicits for motion to adopt and approve the RDRRMC Resolution No 001, s. 2022 which was moved and duly seconded by Dir Agustin Mendoza and Mr Emmanuel Perez, respectively. No objections were made and was approved by the chairperson, Dir Carandang after the revision of the final amount.


IV. ADJOURNMENT:
