137 I. PRELIMINARIES

The meeting started at 8:57 in the morning with a welcome message from the Regional Committee on Devolution Chairperson and DBM MIMAROPA Regional Director Ricky L. Sanchez. It was followed by the singing of the Philippine National Anthem, an invocation and the MIMAROPA hymn.

II. BUSINESS PROPER

A. Welcome Remarks and Roll Call

After the preliminaries, Director Sanchez welcomed everyone and called the Secretariat to call the roll.

B. Declaration of Quorum

Ms. Geneva D. Marmeto of DBM MIMAROPA called the roll and declared a quorum. Of the 44 members, 12 were present and 23 were represented registering 79.55% attendance.

C. Proposed Agenda

Dir. Ricky Sanchez presented the Proposed Agenda with two (2) items under Matters for Discussion/Information and two (2) items under Other Matters.

D. Approval of the Proposed Agenda

On motion duly seconded, the proposed agenda was approved as presented.

E. Matters for Discussion/Information

1. Updates on the Devolution Transition Plans (DTPs) of National Government Agencies (NGAs)

Mr. Michael M. Lacsamana of DBM MIMAROPA presented the updates on the status of submissions of Devolution Transition Plans (DTPs) by National Government Agencies (NGAs) concerned, and DBM's evaluation of the same, as directed under Executive Order (EO) No. 138, s. 2021. Pursuant to the said EO, NGAs must prepare and submit their DTPs within 120 days from effectivity of EO No. 138, then DBM shall evaluate and approve the same within 120 days upon receipt of complete DTPs and properly filled out Annexes.

As of March 3, 2022, 18 out of the 20 DTPs were considered official or complete submission. On the other hand, two (2) NGAs are yet to submit their DTPs to the

DBM. Upon initial evaluation, of the 18 submitted DTPs, 7 were awaiting submission of revised DTPs. The breakdown of the status of those 20 NGAs were as follows:

1.2 No Submission

- Department of Energy (DOE)
- Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT)

DBM RO-IVB received a letter from DICT Luzon Cluster 3 specifying that its mandate is not considered as telecommunications services, thus, they have no functions and services to be devolved. The same letter was forwarded to Systems and Productivity Improvement Bureau (SPIB), which evaluate DTPs. As per DBM Central Office, no letter from DICT CO was received yet. DBM CO uploaded the 1st approved DTP of DOH last March 31.

Dir. Sanchez mentioned that DBM CO is still ongoing with the evaluation of submitted DTPs.

2. LGU Devolution Transition Plan

Ms. Cidney Pamela Bejasa from DILG presented the LGU Devolution Transition Plan outlined as follows: Status of LGU DTP Submission and LGU DTP Quality Assessment.

Ms. Bejasa also presented the details of the DTP submissions on a provincial, municipality and barangay level. DILG conducted several Focused Group Discussions (FGD) wherein commitments were solicited. Also, they held face-to-face consultation and coordination meeting with Mayor Amy Alvarez of the Municipality of San Vicente, Palawan, who committed to submit their DTPs the soonest possible time. These were made in order to address the low submission of LGU DTPs.

Lastly, Ms. Bejasa presented the Quality Assessment Tool which aims to evaluate the quality and compliance of the LGU DTPs based on the set standards and guidelines, as well as to provide guidance to improve the DTPs. This tool is consisted of Assessment Forms and Consolidated Report Templates which has three (3) parameters namely: Parameter 1 (Form Completeness), Parameter 2 (Progress and Alignment), and Parameter 3 (Coherence and Completeness). Using the DTP Quality Assessment Tool, each submission was assessed and the results were discussed. She also said that they are yet to transmit the results to LGU as they are awaiting the official guidelines from Central Office but informal feedbacks had already been communicated to the respective LGUs.

Dir. Sanchez asked when will the official guidelines for the assessment tool be issued. Ms. Bejasa answered that the guidelines has already been issued, however, the manner by which the feedbacks should be provided to the LGUs, is yet to be made.

Dir. Sanchez said that it is allowed to update/amend/supplement the DTPs prepared last year. Also, Dir. Sanchez asked Ms. Bejasa what are the usual reasons why the LGUs cannot complete their submission. Ms. Bejasa replied that the usual justification they gathered was the lack of cooperation from the offices and departments concerned.

DTI Director Joel Valera cited that they were not able to submit DTP by regional level but only by national level. He also said that the DBM has already drafted a letter to DAR stating that Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP) is not included in the devolution, because as per the Supreme Court's ruling, the issue involved was the National Tax Allocation (NTA). Director Valera stated further that the CARP is being funded from the agrarian reform fund.

Further, Dir. Valera raised the concern regarding the upcoming elections. He said that it is better to wait until the new administration takes over, because it might be a waste of time preparing all the DTPs if ever the new administration would no longer continue with the Devolution Transition. Also, according to him, they cannot enforce LGU to complete their DTPs as they are still busy with the election campaigns. In response to that, Dir. Sanchez said that he understands that it is election period but there is an existing order, which is E.O. 138, so the LGUs have to comply with the said EO. Likewise, he added that quarterly meeting was also indicated in the existing rules and regulations that is why the Regional ComDev Meeting was conducted.

DENR ARD Donna Mayor-Gordove said that the Assessment Tool for capacity building was presented previously, and upon checking the output provided, there was no identified capacity building needed for the environment. She asked if it will be updated because they have already set aside the budget for that or will they have to realign the budget instead. In response to that, Ms. Bejasa mentioned that our region was selected by the Local Government Academy to pilot test the capacity development framework which looks into capacity development agenda of LGUs which are attached to their Devolution Transition Plan. The pilot testing was done in the province of Marinduque. Results of the initial assessment showed that many of the LGUs need technical assistance on environment and natural resources concerns. The results of the initial analysis which was communicated to the regional agencies and based from the Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG), were different from the pilot test results. The said results revealed that health, social welfare, tourism, infrastructure and environmental management are the primary capacity development requirements. Currently, they cannot share yet the initial results. They are only tasked to present a framework to analyze capacity development needs and the Local Government Academy will issue guidelines based on the pilot testing results.

ARD Gordove asked when will the results be communicated. Ms. Bejasa answered that the schedule they are looking at is after election. Also, she said that for the mean time, they can look into the DTPs of LGU to map out capacity interventions.

EDC Chairperson Rodne R. Galicha agreed to what DTI Director Valera has said, since the EO may be repealed or amended by July after election. He also said that it is important to have contingency plans.

IDC Co-Chairperson Mr. Delfin M. Natal, Jr. asked if DENR and DILG considered the position of Environmental and Natural Resources Officer as permanent, because based on Local Government Code, it is only optional. ARD Gordove answered that they move for the amendment to the LGC to make it a mandatory position similar to Municipal Planning and Development Officer (MPDO), but the discussions on the amendment of the LGC was not yet pushed through.

Mr. Natal wanted to advocate the creation of positions called "eco-aids" or Barangay Environmental Officers, to sustain management of solid waste and at the same time, comply with the law.

Dir. Valera mentioned some of his comments on the devolution in relation to what Mr. Natal has raised. According to him, based on LGC, all functions to be devolved are already included. The problem faced by LGUs is that, they cannot use all IRA/NTA due to PS limitations. He asked how will the salaries of the personnel be, if ever the positions will be devolved. Dir. Sanchez clarified that the main difference between LGC 1991 and E.O. 138, is that, rather than the positions, it is the functions

which will be devolved. He added that per Central Office, of all the NGAs which submitted DTPs, none recommends for abolition of positions, but instead requested for the creation of additional positions. As to the functions to be devolved, it is found in Annex H and I of the Capacity Development Plans of the DTPs of LGUs. They have already considered the positions to be created to fully absorb devolved functions.

Mr. Galicha asked if there is any effort from DILG in collaboration with the DBM, for the amendment of R.A. 7160 for the concerns. Ms. Bejasa answered that she is not yet aware if there is a motion on the national level for the amendment of said R.A. Also, she said that in the absence of a motion to amend, E.O. 138 is in full effect. Dir. Sanchez agreed with Ms. Bejasa.

DAC Chairperson Darius M. Guerrero asked if there is any devolution plan for the newly created Department of Migrant Workers. Ms. Bejasa answered that she is unsure if LGUs included this on their DTPs on the regional level.

F. Other Matters

1. Salient Features of LBC No. 145 Pertaining to Full Devolution of Functions and Services

Mr. Lacsamana mentioned that last year, under LBM No. 82, DBM proposed to waive the enforcement of Personal Services (PS) Limitations. Upon approval of FY 2022 GAA, it was included under Section 93 of General Provision of said GAA. Under the said section, PS limitations indicated in Section 325 (a) and 331 (b) of R.A. 7160 shall be waived to enable LGUs to pay the salaries and other benefits of additional personnel that may be hired to implement the devolved basic services and functions, subject to the guidelines to be issued by the DBM. In relation to the said section, there are certain policy guidelines discussed. The first guideline indicated that the additional positions that may be created by LGUs should be those that are reflected in the approved Annex I (Proposed Additional Positions to the Plantilla of LGU Personnel). In addition to that, the classification of additional positions to be created should be consistent with the CY 2021 Index of Occupational Services, Position Titles, and Salary Grades in Local Government (LBC No. 137). It was also mentioned that the cost of hiring of additional personnel like those in the general administrative, support functions, transport service and other positions performing administrative functions, are not included in the waived PS items. LGUs which were not able to submit DTPs cannot use the PS-waived items, unless they submit the same, and consequently be approved by DILG. These PS-waived items shall only be implemented in FY 2022. The said items for the subsequent years shall be guided by the general provisions of the GAAs.

Dir. Sanchez reiterated that the item discussed was just for this year.

Ms. Bejasa clarified if those positions indicated in the LBC No. 145 for FY 2022 will also cover those for creation or assumption for FY 2023-2024. Dir. Sanchez answered that there is no assurance for this, but it depends on the Congress if they would agree with the proposal of the President once the NEP for 2023-2024 is submitted. He also mentioned that the DBM will try to continuously propose to waive the mentioned PS items and reminded local officials to be prudent in creating positions as NTA will be much lower. Lastly, Ms. Bejasa asked if LBC No. 145 was already widely disseminated to LGUs and Dir. Sanchez confirmed that this was already communicated to LGUs and was posted in the website.

2. List of NGAs who Submitted their Alternate Focal Person

The list was discussed by Ms. Novalyn Asuncion and reminded everyone to send the names of the alternate focal person for DevCom so the directory would be updated.

ARD Gordove asked if they are required to send alternate contact person in addition to the focal person already submitted. Dir. Sanchez confirmed the same.




Quality Assessment Tool

The Quality Assessment Tool (QAT) was developed as an initial assessment of the DTPs. It is composed of two (2) parts:

- (i) the Assessment Forms for the barangays, cities / municipalities, and provinces; and (ii)
- (i) the Consolidated Report Template.

The Assessment Forms evaluate the quality and compliance of the LGU DTPs based on the parameters identified and requirements set in the guidelines, as well as to provide guidance to further improve the DTPs. The Consolidated Report Template


A checklist is provided to verify if all required and corresponding documents are submitted or considered not applicable, and a remarks column for additional requirements, changes or otherwise may also be included in the remarks section. The Consolidated Report Template is used to identify which forms are not submitted and indicate the dates of the initial and final complete submission of the DTPs.

This parameter validates if higher and lower-tier LGUs coordinated/interfaced with each other as well as with NGAs whenever applicable, to ensure DTP vertical alignment of plans across each LGU tier and with the sectoral requirements of concerned NGAs based on NGA DTPs. This parameter also assesses if the LGU DTPs have been approved accordingly by the concerned Sangguniang to ensure the legitimization of the said plan.

This parameter assesses the LGU DTPs as to its logic and consistency. A checklist on completeness verifies if the forms were properly filled out. It should be indicated in the remarks section if the forms submitted have complete or incomplete information and other comments or observations relative to the extent of compliance.



LGU DTP ANALYTICS

Following the conduct of LGU-DTP Quality Assessment, the DILG-BLGD developed the LGU-DTP Data Capture Form (DCF) as a tool to gather data from the LGU-DTPs and process these into information with intent to inform and guide policies and actions of the national government to support LGUs' transition to full devolution within the given timeframe.

Data gathered from using the DCF shall be used for the LGU-DTP Analytics ("Analytics") to produce information on a) the level of LGU absorption of devolved functions and services; b) the readiness of the LGU for full devolution; c) the available information to track LGU performance in the delivery of devolved functions and services.
