

1.0 BACKGROUND

Palawan is one of the provinces of the MIMAROPA region which lies between the South China Sea in the northwest and Sulu Sea in the southeast. The Kalayaan Island Group (KIG) is part of the municipality of Kalayaan of the Province of Palawan. Its main island, Pag-asa, lies approximately 280 nautical miles northwest of Puerto Princesa and 932 kilometers (579nm) south-west of Metro Manila. The municipality has 9 key features namely: Pag-asa Island (~36.0 ha),), Likas (~18.6 ha), Parola Island (~12.7 ha), Lawak (~7.93 ha), Kota (~6.45 ha), Patag Island (~0.57 ha), and Panata Island (~0.44 ha), and submerged reefs composed of Ayungin Shoal and Rizal Reef shown in **Figure 1**.

The Philippines does not lay claim to the entire South China Sea (SCS) but rather to the smaller area of South China Sea referred to by the Philippine Government as the West Philippine Sea (WPS). The area is off to the country's western seaboard where the Kalayaan Island Group (KIG) is situated. The WPS is well within the Philippines' Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) and continental shelf.

The WPS, including those features in the KIG, is home to 20% of the country's fisheries catch. The island's rich coral formations serve as spawning grounds that replenish depleted stocks in waters adjacent to the country including that of the Sulu Sea in the MIMAROPA Region, and also serves as transit area for migratory species. Palawan remains the top producer of commercial fish products contributing 71.03% to the MIMAROPA region's total production (2020 MIMAROPA Regional Development Report). The development of the commercial fishing industry in the West Philippine Sea will be supported by these productive waters to sustainably manage the exploitation of these living marine resources. Currently, these marine resources are under threat from poaching and deliberate use of illegal, destructive and unsustainable fishing practices by fishers of other claimant countries. Local fishermen visiting certain parts of the WPS are also being harassed and chased away by armed troops and paramilitary ships by foreign poachers. Moreover, the area is also believed to contain major oil and gas reserves and is an important international shipping trade route. It also lies along major Philippine trading channels the control of these waters by an unfriendly state could cripple the country's improving economy. With the area's vast economic potentials, there is the need to sustainably manage this important area thru concerted efforts by government instrumentalities for Filipinos of all generations.

Considering that the country is an archipelagic maritime state, the KIG in the WPS is a matter of serious national importance in terms of its strategic location, national security, economic potential, and rich natural resources. With the foregoing premises, an *Ad Hoc* Interagency Task Force-- KIG-TWC was created to safeguard the development and conservation of the area with the end goal of developing a resilient, vibrant, and sustainable communities within the KIG to affirm our rights and secure our precious natural resources.

The Strategic Development Plan for the Kalayaan Group of Islands (SDP-KIG) and its accompanying Action Plan is a result of an intensive multi-agency workshops and consultation meetings of the Inter-Agency Task Force – Kalayaan Island Group Technical Working Committee (IATF-KIG_TWC) (see Annex A for the list of Member Agencies) and its Technical Working Group (TWG) (see Annex B for the list of Member Agencies). The SDP-KIG which serves as the seminal document in pursuit of succeeding related discussions came into fruition during the Strategic Planning Workshop: *Towards Sustainable Development of the Kalayaan Island Group* Rizal Hall, Western Command, San Miguel, Puerto Princesa City, Palawan on 25-26 August 2020.

2.0 RATIONALE

The creation of a composite Inter-Agency Task Force – Kalayaan Island Group Technical Working Committee (IATF-KIG TWC) is an initiative of the Palawan Council for Sustainable Development Staff (PCSDS). PCSDS, a national agency with provincial application in the government of Palawan was created into law by virtue of RA7611 and sits as a member of the IATF-KIG of the of National Task Force West (NTF) chaired by the National Security Adviser of the President of the Republic of the Philippines. The IATF-KIG, was tasked to develop a plan for the sustainable development of the nine Philippine occupied features in KIG utilizing the P10,000,000.00 fund per feature committed by the Provincial Government of Palawan or a total of P90,000,000.00 allocated budget for the KIG development.

Hence, the IATF-KIG-TWC formulated the SDP-KIG comprising the priority activities anchored on a strategic vision, mission, and development objectives to which the allocated budget can be directed. The SDP-KIG contained strategies that will help the fortification of the Philippine sovereign rights over the KIG features and strengthen our claim in the area by enhancing the resilience of communities and their physical environment in the Kalayaan Island Group against threats of adverse weather conditions and climate change as well as creating a vibrant economy in the municipality. The SDP-KIG and its implementation details, shall serve as guide towards our common agenda to develop the KIG and legally claim what is rightfully ours as a nation.

The SDP Action Plan has 4 key components: (1) Develop the KIG to optimize its contribution to Palawan, MIMAROPA Region and national economy; (2) Integrate the KIG into the national consciousness and economy; (3) Secure our national patrimony; and (4) Whole of nation approach in its implementation. The SDP highlights the islands' development advantages and identify possible areas of collaborations among the private and government sectors in the region geared towards the Ambisyon Natin 2040 or the Filipino's collective aspirations for a "matatag, maginhawa, at panatag na buhay para sa lahat".

3.0 METHODOLOGY

The development of SDP-KIG started through a two-day Strategic Planning Workshop organized by PCSDS and the Municipal Government of Kalayaan. Ideas and inputs from various agencies were collected and consolidated into a single document passing through the following processes:

3.1 Goal-Based Strategic Planning

Considering that SDP development participants are representatives from different local and national government agencies bring their own mandates and functions, it was necessary for the group to formulate a unified goal. Thus, the Goal-Based Strategic Planning (GBSP) method was utilized for long-term strategic planning. GBSP works on the development of a common vision, created of action plans for each goal, that are ensured to be SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, realistic, and time-bound). Refer to **Section 4.1** for the developed Vision and Mission statements, and to **Section 5.0** for the Action Plans.

3.2 Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) Analysis

The SWOT method is an assessment tool use for an area or an organization's current position/situation before coming up with strategies and actions. This tool helps in identifying which areas/fields/sectors can be improved. By enumerating, reviewing and understanding the internal factors (strengths and weaknesses) and external factors (opportunities and threats) of an area or a group, issues and concerns can be clearly identified, and appropriate strategies and solutions can be formulated. In this case, the SWOT was used to analyze not only the present situation of the KIG, but also the situation and characteristics of the participating agencies as an inter-agency group. Refer to **Section 4.2** for the results of the SWOT Analysis.

3.3 Objectives and Key Results (OKRs) Framework

Another tool used during the preparation of the SDP is the OKRs Framework, which includes defining the objectives ("what you want to achieve") and key results or indicators ("how you'll measure progress towards your achievements"). Refer to **Section 4.3** for the matrices developed using the said tool.

4.0 THE STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT PLAN (SDP) FOR THE KALAYAAN ISLAND GROUP (KIG), 2020-2030

4.1 Vision and Mission Statement

VISION 2030:

A resilient, vibrant, and sustainable community in KIG, enjoying inclusive economic growth while conserving its patrimony and upholding Philippine sovereignty.

MISSION:

To synchronize plans, programs, and policies and recommend appropriate action to the IATF-KIG on matters related to sustainable development, security, and safety in the KIG in support of Vision 2030.

4.2 Strengths, Weakness, Opportunities, and Threat (SWOT) Analysis

As discussed in **Section 3.2**, the SWOT tool helps in identifying what the internal and external factors for the Kalayaan Islands Group (KIG) and for the inter-agency group. The SWOT analysis was done during the plenary session of the two-day workshop, which was facilitated by PCSDS.

As shown in the table below, most of the strengths identified by the agencies were related to their relationship as a group of various local and national agencies, such lateral coordination, diversity, and clearly defined mandates. Meanwhile, most weaknesses tackle on the lack of resources (e.g., food, freshwater, military force, funding, facilities, infrastructure, transportation) on the KIG and lack of political will (e.g., commitments, confidence, policies) from the local/national government in general.

For the external factors, opportunities identified by the agencies are support/guidance from the national and local governments, from other partners, and even from allied countries. Other opportunities are the availabilities of external funding, knowledge and innovation, and technologies. On the other hand, the primary threats identified were (a) China not recognizing international rules and norms; (b) China's grey zone strategy; and (c) claims of various countries in the West Philippine Sea (WPS). These are coupled with the lack of the following: funding; security coordination; technological capability to deter threats; and knowledge and awareness on the importance of KIG.

4.3.2 Bio-physical Environment Sector

The primary objective of the sector is to attain a balanced and healthy environment in the KIG. To this end, the following specific objectives must be accomplished:

- 1. To develop a physical zoning plan and its adoption by KIG MLGU of Kalayaan and PCSD), in order to ensure that development projects will be placed in their proper zones. This includes the updating of the Environmentally Critical Areas Network (ECAN) Map of Kalayaan for both terrestrial and coastal/marine areas, as well as the integration of said map into the Comprehensive Land and Water Use Plan (CLWUP) of the municipality.
- 2. To strictly implement fishery and environmental laws, policies, rules, and regulations. This objective will focus on the establishment and strengthening of the environmental law enforcement network in the KIG, including the creation of the Kalayaan Bantay Dagat Task Force, strengthening of partnership and capabilities among law enforcement agencies. Another focus of this is also the periodic assessment and monitoring of the environment of KIG.
- To implement coastal adaptation activities / technologies in order to stabilize the islands' coastlines against extreme weather conditions and climate change impacts (scouring, soil erosion, sea-level rise). Stabilization of the area shall be

- attained by assessment of sites suitable for forest enhancement, and the consequential implementation of a mangrove/beach forest afforestation plan.
- 4. To conduct relevant scientific studies for the protection and sustainable utilization and development of the natural resources, specifically on the following: (a) carrying capacity; (b) renewable energy; (c) hydrology; (d) fisheries sustainability; (e) climate change impacts; (f) solid and liquid waste management; and (g) connectivity researches. Thus, academic institutions and scientific experts shall be tapped.
- 5. To strictly implement of the DENR TB 2017-02 in the Lawak Critical Bird Habitat by 2023
- 6. To Strengthen Seascape Governance in the Kalayaan Island Group (KIG)

4.3.3 Infrastructure Sector

This sectoral plan focuses on the construction and/or improvement of infrastructure support facilities and strengthening of the capacities of the personnel to better serve the populace of the municipality.

Among the key activities of this sector, include:

- Improvement of infrastructure-support facilities for easy access to and from the KIG which include construction of sheltered ports, acquisition of steel vessel, improvement of Rancudo airstrip, and installation of roads and walkways
- Construction of infrastructure-support facilities for sustainable alternative livelihood/ employment
- Enhancement of access to Information and Communications Technology through construction of telecommunication facilities
- Construction of social and recreational facilities such as schools, hospital and clinics, waterworks and sewerage system, power plant and distribution facility, evacuation centers, sports facilities, among others

It is important to note that these infrastructure support facilities are necessary to encourage residents to stay in the KIG. Currently, only elementary school is available in the area, thus, parents are obliged to leave the municipality once their children need to study for higher-level education. Further, limited resources such as potable drinking water and limited available livelihood coupled with difficulty in internet connection contributed to the unwillingness of people to stay in the island.

4.3.4 Governance, Safety and Security Sector

To serve as guide for the agencies and government offices to make decisions and achieve rational outcomes, certain policies must be developed and be implemented as a procedure or protocol. The main tasks of the Kalayaan Island Group (KIG) Technical Working Governance – Safety and Security Sector was to develop policies that will provide orderly and safety to civilians visiting the KIG features. The following are the policies to be developed:

- Policy on Navigational Route/requirements in transporting civilians from main cities to KIG. This to ensure safety and security to hose who will be visiting the islands. This is also for the safety of the travelling boats, per the situation in the WPS, thereby establishment of regular route is very important to avoid escalation of tension that may lead to harassment or blockage.
- Policy on using electronic equipment of all civilians visiting KIG features. This is to
 ensure a Zero incident or disclosure of restricted facilities and developments at KIG.
 Conduct of briefing to all incoming island visitors prior to departure from their respective
 point of origin and upon arrival.

Other activities under this sector includes:

- Strict implementation of relevant laws on environmental conservation and upholding Philippine sovereignty. Regular conduct of public information and dissemination and conduct of environmental law training to the enforcers to strengthen their capacity on law enforcement.
- To strive in attaining 3rd class municipality status. The Municipality of Kalayaan is a 5th class municipality. To upgrade their classification from 5th class to 3rd class level since they cannot meet the requirements, a special justification will be submitted and lobbied to the legislators.
- 3. To educate and inculcate to every Filipino, particularly the youth, the relevance and crucial role of KIG to our food security, national economy, and sovereignty. Continuous

information and education campaign in partnership with CHED and DepEd schools and universities on KIG advocacies.
