148 **I. PRELIMINARIES**

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150 Governor Jose R. Riano, RDC Chairperson called the meeting to order at 9:15 a.m., followed
 151 by the singing of the Philippine National Anthem, an invocation, and playing of the
 152 MIMAROPA Hymn.

II. BUSINESS PROPER

A. Declaration of Quorum

RDC Secretary and NEDA MIMAROPA OIC-Assistant Regional Director Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., called the roll, acknowledged the guests, and informed the presence of quorum. Of the 51 regular members, 22 were present and 16 were represented, constituting 74.50 percent attendance. Among the 22 special non-voting members, five were present and 11 were represented, registering 73 percent attendance.

B. Welcome Remarks and Messages

The RDC Chairperson and Romblon Governor Jose R. Riano welcomed and thanked all the members and guests present. In his message Governor Riano emphasized the resiliency showcased by MIMAROPA RDC member agencies as public servants for enduring challenges and setbacks brought about by COVID-19 pandemic. He commended their efforts and initiatives in contributing to the Council's accomplishments for the past quarters.

He also enumerated several major agenda to discuss during the meeting and encouraged everyone to actively participate and have a fruitful and meaningful engagement and turn ideas into action to create a strongly-rooted, comfortable, and secure life for the MIMAROPAns.

Likewise, CORDS TWG Chairperson and DOE Undersecretary Alexander S. Lopez represented MIMAROPA CORDS and Energy Secretary Alfonso G. Cusi. Lopez, read Secretary Cusi's message emphasizing how the government overcame uncertainties and adverse economic impacts of COVID-19 pandemic despite limited resources. He recognized the commitment of RDC member agencies to public service and accomplishments that are geared towards MIMAROPA's sustainable development. He enjoined everyone to continue creating value for the public and ensure that services are translated into meaningful and useful results both on the ground and in policy-making institutions.

C. Awarding of Plaque of Recognition

The RDC MIMAROPA awarded plaque of recognition to the following MIMAROPA regional directors, namely: a) Atty. Joffrey M. Suyao (DOLE); b) Dir. Jose Reuben Q. Alagaran, II (PIA); c) ASec/Dir. Christopher V. Morales (DOT); d) Atty. Michael Drake P. Matias (EMB); and e) Dir. Manuel B. Wong (TESDA), who were all transferred to central office and to other regions.

Meanwhile, NEDA Regional Director and RDC Vice Chairperson Agustin C. Mendoza greeted the RDC members who celebrated their birthdays during the fourth quarter of the year.

D. Proposed Agenda

The RDC Chairperson presented the proposed agenda. On a motion duly seconded, the provisional agenda was approved and adopted.

E. Approval of the Minutes of the 76th RDC Full Council Meeting

Dir. Maria Angelita C. Cells of DBM requested to dispense the reading of the minutes of the previous RDC meeting since copies of the reference folder were transmitted to all the members before the meeting. On a motion duly seconded, the minutes of the previous RDC meeting were approved. The members were encouraged to submit to the RDC secretariat their comments on the minutes of the meeting within five working days.

F. Matters Arising from the Minutes of Previous Meeting

RDC Secretary and NEDA MIMAROPA OIC-Assistant Regional Director Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., referred the members to the reference folder of the RDC and reported the status of 17 resolutions passed and three instructions during the previous meeting. Copy of the resolutions were all transmitted to the concerned national and regional agencies, local government units, and other concerned entities.

Director Cells of DBM MIMAROPA informed the body that the Office of Assistant Secretary Achilles Gerard C. Bravo of DBM, on his letter dated October 13, 2021, and addressed to the RDC Chairperson replied on the request of Governor Velasco regarding possible amendment and review of Section 2.2.5.1, Paragraph 5, Sentence 1 of DBM Local Budget Memorandum No. 82 s. 2021. The said response will be disseminated to all LGUs concerned to closely coordinate with the NGAs concerned with regard to the provision of needed technical or financial assistance for the implementation of the devolved functions and services pursuant to Section 17 (b) of RA No. 7160 and other existing laws.

The matters arising from the minutes of previous meeting were noted. Because of equally important meeting, the RDC Chairperson relinquished the chair to the RDC Vice Chairperson.

Matters for Approval/Endorsement/Confirmation

• **Updated MIMAROPA RDIP 2017-2022 and FY 2023 AIP**

ARD Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., of NEDA MIMAROPA presented the highlights of the Updated MIMAROPA Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP) 2017-2022 and Annual Investment Program (AIP) FY 2023. He reported that the RDIP is one of the two accompanying documents of the Regional Development Plan (RDP). It is a six-year investment portfolio of the region that translated the development goals, objectives, and strategies identified in the MIMAROPA Regional Development Plan (RDP) into viable public sector programs, activities, and projects (PAPs). The MIMAROPA RDIP is updated annually pursuant to the following legal basis and policy issuances: a) Executive Order (EO) 325, s. 1996, section 4.a; b) RDC MIMAROPA Resolution No. 2020-070-832 or the 2020 Revised Edition - RDC Manual of Operations; c) Executive Order (EO) No. 27, s. 2017; d) Executive Order (EO) No. 138, s. 2021 or The Full Devolution of Certain Functions of the Executive Branch to Local Governments, Creation of a Committee on Devolution, and for Other Purposes; and e) Executive Order (EO) No. 05, s. 2016.

ARD Atienza mentioned that the MIMAROPA RDIP contains the rolling list of PAPs to be implemented and funded by agency regional offices (AROs), government owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs), government financial institutions (GFIs), other national government agencies (NGAs) and instrumentalities, and state universities and colleges (SUCs) within the medium-term to contribute in the achievement of the societal goal and target indicators in the RDP Results Matrices (RMs). The annual slice of the RDIP is known as the annual investment program (AIP).

He further discussed how the MIMAROPA RDIP is being updated annually to revalidate and enhance the investment programs, activities, and projects (PAPs) of AROs, SUCs, and GOCCs in the region. He said that the PAPs remain consistent with the goals and strategies identified in the Philippine Development Plan (PDP), Regional Development Plan (RDP), Regional Physical Framework Plan (RPFP), and local development plans (Provincial and City/Municipal Development Plans) and are given the appropriate funding to generate the

intended results/outcome. The FY 2023 Annual Investment Program (AIP) is included to serve as the basis in the review of agency budget proposals for FY 2023.

ARD Atienza said that the total investment requirements in the updated MIMAROPA RDIP for 2017-2022 is ₱603.58 billion to fund the 815 PAPs of the region. Of the four (4) sectors, the social sector got the biggest share with 47.61 percent or ₱287.36 billion. This was followed by the infrastructure sector with 45.94 percent or ₱277.27 billion, economic sector with 5.07 percent or ₱30.62 billion, and the development administration sector with 1.38 percent or ₱8.33 billion.

He added that the total investment requirements proposed for inclusion in the FY 2023 Annual Investment Program is ₱199.01 billion. The social sector agencies reached ₱99.56 billion and most of the investment requirements of this sector will fund the PAPs of the DOH. This was followed by the infrastructure sector agencies with ₱91 billion, which most of the investment requirements will fund the PAPs of the DPWH; the economic sector agencies with ₱6.61 billion, and the development administration sector agencies with ₱1.84 billion.

The sectoral committees of the MIMAROPA RDC during its fourth quarter meetings held on November 4 and 5 favorably recommended RDC endorsement of the updated sector investment programs and the FY 2023 annual investment program (AIP) for inclusion in the MIMAROPA RDIP.

On a motion duly seconded, the Updated MIMAROPA RDIP and AIP FY 2023 were approved and adopted.

• **CY 2021 RDR Preparation Guidelines**

ARD Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., of NEDA MIMAROPA presented the 2021 MIMAROPA Regional Development Report (RDR) preparation guidelines. The MIMAROPA RDR contains an assessment of the performance of the region for a given year based on the targets of the MIMAROPA RDP 2017-2022 Midterm Update and its accompanying revalidated Results Matrix (RM). It also provides strategic and policy direction to refocus priorities and/or catch-up with the targets.

The RDR preparation guidelines aims to provide standard procedures, data requirements, and schedule of activities to ensure consistency with the Philippine Socioeconomic Report (SER) submitted to the Office of the President. It also contains 22 chapters consistent with the regional socioeconomic report and the MIMAROPA RDP 2017-2022. The write-up for each chapter shall not exceed ten pages which contain the following: a) abstract; b) accomplishments; c) moving forward; and d) recommendation. Gender-fair language (GFL) will also be used in the writing of the 2021 regional development report.

The 2021 RDR assess the region's performance relative to the implementation of rehabilitation and recovery plan for COVID-19, Bayahihan to Recover as One Act, Bayanihan 2, Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa (BP2) program, and the whole-of-nation approach. The annual accomplishment reports and other sectoral inputs of the regional line agencies (RLAs), state universities and colleges (SUCs), government owned and controlled corporation (GOCCs), local government units (LGUs), and private sector representatives (PSRs) will be used as bases in the evaluation of the performance of the region.

Lastly, ARD Atienza presented the schedule of activities in preparation of the report which includes: a) submission of inputs from the concerned agencies; b) conduct of technical

writeshop on April 2022; c) presentation to the sectoral committee meetings for any additional comments/inputs on May 2022; and d) finalization of final draft for approval of the RDC on June 2022.

On a motion duly seconded, the set of guidelines on the preparation of 2021 MIMAROPA RDR was approved.

- **Proposed ENRIS Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region**

EDC Chairperson PSR Rodne R. Galicha reported that the Palawan Council for Sustainable Development (PCSD) requested RDC endorsement of the proposed Environment and Natural Resources Information System (ENRIS) Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region. The project aims to contribute to efficient land use, enhanced ecosystem condition and services, water and food security, and climate change resilience under the Environmentally Critical Areas Network (ECAN) of the Strategic Environmental Plan (SEP) for the Palawan through the establishment of a web-based information system.

The proposal is a co-financing project between the Korean Government through the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) and the Republic of Philippines with a proposed project cost of USD8.8 million. The project's expected outcome include: a) data accessibility improvement and uptake promotion; b) environment-cum-agro ecosystem governance in terms of policy, assessment and regulation, investment promotion improved; c) enhancement of environment-cum-agro ecosystem information management, analysis technology, and application among individuals and institutions related to water and food security, and climate change; and d) improvement of the Palawan eco-region's environment, water security, and productivity through the realization of advanced scientific decision support.

PSR Galicha added that the EDC during its fourth quarter meeting held on November 4, 2021 through video conferencing reviewed and favorably recommended RDC endorsement of the proposed project.

On a motion duly seconded, the Environment and Natural Resources Information System (ENRIS) Spatial Decision Support for Palawan Island Eco-Region project was endorsed for possible KOICA assistance.

- **Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM) Framework**

PSR Rodne R. Galicha presented the Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM) Framework. The IWRM is a collaborative process that promotes the coordinated development and management of water, land, and related resources within hydrological boundaries in order to maximize the resultant economic and social welfare in an equitable manner without compromising the sustainability of vital ecosystems. The Philippine IWRM Plan Framework is a directional plan intended to guide different stakeholders involved in water resources management, at different levels in preparation of their respective IWRM plans, update or enhance their existing IWRM related plans, or make IWRM an integral part of their development plans and programs.

PSR Galicha explained that the increasing water demand together with insufficient water infrastructure threaten to outstrip sustainable levels of supply. Over extraction of groundwater due to increase in water demand resulted to a decline in groundwater levels or drying up of wells or springs; and the contamination of wells by salt water intrusion in coastal areas. There are also threats on groundwater and surface water caused by: a) domestic, agricultural, and

363 industrial wastes; b) watershed degradation including deforestation and denudation of forests;
364 and c) climate change and global warming. To respond to these challenges and ensure that
365 demand does not overrun supply, PSR Galicha mentioned that there should be a balancing
366 mechanism to ensure that the economic growth and development does not jeopardize the
367 viability and integrity of the ecosystems both in the present and in the future.
368

369 He further cited that the Technical Working Group (TWG) on Water Resources Management
370 under the Economic Development Committee (EDC) chaired by the DENR MIMAROPA RD
371 Ma. Lourdes G. Ferrer initiated the formulation of an IWRM Framework for MIMAROPA region.
372 The proposed IWRM Framework for MIMAROPA region includes the following sustainable
373 outcomes: a) effective protection and regulation for water security and ecosystem health; b)
374 sustainable water resources and responsive services for present and future needs; c) improve
375 effectiveness, accountability, and synergy among water related institutions and stakeholders;
376 and d) innovative responses to future challenges. Among the identified issues and concerns
377 relative to the IWRM in MIMAROPA include: a) lack of site-specific studies on IWRM such as
378 hydrology; b) lack of budget allocation on IWRM implementation; and c) no existing database
379 on IWRM.
380

381 PSR Galicha said that the EDC during its fourth quarter meeting held on November 4, 2021
382 through video conferencing reviewed and favorably recommended RDC adoption of the said
383 proposal for the region.
384

385 On a motion duly seconded, the MIMAROPA Integrated Water Resources Management
386 (IWRM) Framework as an integral part of the development planning and programming in the
387 region was adopted.
388

389 • **Province of Marinduque as a Mining-Free Zone**
390

391 EDC Chairperson PSR Rodne R. Galicha reported that the Marinduque Council for
392 Environmental Concerns (MACEC), a church based non-governmental organization, appealed
393 to all government agencies, civil society organizations (CSOs), religious organizations and the
394 academe in Marinduque to manifest opposition to Executive Order No. 130, s. 2021: Amending
395 Section 4 of EO No. 79, s. 2012, Institutionalizing and Implementing Reforms in the Philippine
396 Mining Sector, Providing Policies and Guidelines to Ensure Environmental Protection and
397 Responsible Mining in the Utilization of Mineral Resources.
398

399 The MACEC provided copies of resolutions and statements from various local government
400 units (LGUs), CSOs, religious organizations, Sangguniang Kabataan, and other youth
401 organizations requesting to: a) deny with finality the mineral production sharing agreement
402 (MPSA) application of Marcopper and 38 other mining applications; b) delist Marinduque from
403 the mining tenement area; and c) declare the province of Marinduque as a mining-free zone.
404 The MACEC also reported the presence of unidentified nuclear materials and 100 barrels of
405 hazardous waste found in the Marcopper mining site.
406

407 PSR Galicha mentioned that the RDC-Technical Working Group (TWG) initiated the conduct
408 of an online meeting on July 29 to discuss the following: a) proposed action to declare
409 Marinduque as a mining-free zone; b) presence of radioactive materials and 100 barrels of
410 hazardous wastes in the Marcopper mining site; and c) updates on the construction of
411 flood/sediment control structure in Mogpog River in Marinduque. The meeting served as a
412 venue for the stakeholders to raise their concerns regarding the status of mining in
413 Marinduque.
414

He added that *An Aide Memoire* on the proposed declaration of the Province of Marinduque as a mining-free zone was also prepared and presented to Economic Development Committee (EDC) during its fourth quarter meeting. The document includes assessment of the mining industry, impacts of mining in the province, alternative industries for economic growth of Marinduque, and recommendations. Among the recommendations include: (1) a proposed framework for adoption by the Provincial Government as an alternate strategy for economic recovery anchored on good governance and participatory approach with the development partners, (2) formulation of a recovery action plan anchored on this framework, and (3) updating of the land use plans and zoning ordinances by the LGUs.

PSR Galicha further cited the following action plans to be undertaken: (1) all municipalities in the province of Marinduque will update their comprehensive land-use plans (CLUPs) and zoning ordinances (ZOs) to declare the province's metallic mineral areas under strict protection zone and be closed to all human activities except for scientific studies and/or ceremonial or religious use by indigenous communities; (2) the Department of Agriculture (DA), Department of Tourism (DOT), Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), and local government units (LGUs) of Marinduque, among others, shall develop further agriculture and tourism in the province to spur livelihood and employment opportunities and improve the local economy; (3) support in the formulation and implementation of recovery and rehabilitation efforts to address the impacts of the mining waste such as acid and toxic chemicals it generated in the environment; (4) conduct of researches, sustained tree planting activities by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Mines and Geosciences Bureau (MGB), local government units, and civil society organizations; and (5) immediate approval and implementation of the proposed flood/sediment control structure in Mogpog River.

He said that the EDC, during its fourth quarter meeting held on November 4, 2021, favorably recommended RDC endorsement of the initiative to declare the Province of Marinduque as a mining -free zone.

On a motion duly seconded, a resolution was passed endorsing the initiative to declare the province of Marinduque as a mining-free zone.

• **RDC VII Resolution No. 43, s. 2021**

Mr. Emerson Kim J. Lineses, Chief of Development Research Division (DRD) of NEDA MIMAROPA, presented the RDC VII Resolution No. 43, s. 2021 entitled, "Requesting Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) to amend the Principles of the Z-Benefits (Circular 2015-035), particularly for Early-Stage Breast Cancer Patients".

Mr. Lineses reported that the Central Visayas Regional Development Council (RDC), during its meeting on September 17, 2021, through video conference, passed the said resolution to: a) allow early-stage breast cancer patients to avail themselves of the maximum benefit package of ₱100,000.00 by not making chemotherapy a mandatory procedure and by extending the filing schedule for tranche 2 claims of Stage 0 patients to other early-stage breast cancer patients who do not need chemotherapy; b) include aromatase inhibitor as a drug for hormone therapy; and c) furnish the other RDCs a copy of the resolution for their support.

He mentioned that RDC VII Resolution No. 43, s. 2021 was presented to the MIMARORA Social Development Committee (SDC) during its fourth quarter meeting held on November 5, 2021 through video conference for discussion. Likewise, PhilHealth presented the guiding principles of Z-benefits on the procedures for filing and schedule of payment of claims for early-stage breast cancer on the same meeting. The SDC members agreed to review the principles

of Z-benefits, particularly the process and procedure in the granting of benefits for the early-stage breast cancer patients and facilitated the submission of documentary requirements.

Mr. Lineses further cited that the SDC during the said meeting, favorably recommended RDC support to the RDC VII Resolution No. 43, s. 2021.

On a motion duly seconded, the support to RDC VII Resolution No. 43, s. 2021 entitled, "Requesting Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) to amend the Principles of the Z-Benefits (Circular 2015-035), particularly for Early-Stage Breast Cancer Patients", was approved.

- **Expand the Coverage of Z-Benefits (PhilHealth Circular 2015-035)**

Mr. Emerson Kim J. Lineses reported that PhilHealth representative discussed the guiding principles of Z-benefits and the procedures for filing and schedule of payment of claims for early-stage breast cancer during the fourth quarter SDC meeting held on November 5, 2021 through video conference. The Z-benefit aims to provide relevant financial risk protection to patients with life or limb-threatening conditions that requires prolonged hospitalization, extremely expensive therapies, or other health care related problems that would deplete one's financial resources, under its classification of illnesses.

Under the said guiding principles, Mr. Lineses explained that the Z-benefit package rate for breast cancer Stage 0 to III-A is ₱100,000.00 with two tranche payments: ₱75,000.00 for the first tranche and ₱25,000.00 for the second tranche. The first tranche of payment includes both surgery and initial cycles of standard chemotherapy for Stage I to III-A or surgery and hormonotherapy with tamoxifen for Stage 0 (ductal carcinoma in situ), while the second tranche of payment includes the completion of the last cycle of chemotherapy for Stage I to III-A. If chemotherapy is not required for Z-patients with Stage 1 breast cancer, then the 2nd tranche payment of ₱25,000.00 is no longer applicable. He added that in order for the contracted health care institutions (HCIs) to claim the 1st and 2nd tranches and for the breast cancer patients to claim the full equivalent benefits maximum of ₱100,000.00, a number of documents should be secured and be submitted to PhilHealth by the Z-patients, including other mandatory procedures.

Mr. Lineses further cited that the SDC during its fourth quarter meeting, agreed to review the guiding principles and consider the expansion of the Z-benefit package to breast cancer patients who do not need to undergo chemotherapy and streamline the requirements for claims to lift the burden of the patients in providing numerous documents.

The SDC during its fourth quarter meeting held on November 5, 2021 through video conference, favorably recommended RDC to request PhilHealth to expand the coverage of Z-benefits and streamline the process and procedures under PhilHealth Circular 2015-035 to avail the maximum coverage of benefits equivalent to ₱100,000.00 for breast cancer patients notwithstanding other essential benefits from PhilHealth.

On a motion duly seconded, a resolution was passed requesting the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) to expand the coverage of Z-Benefits under Circular No. 2015-035 to benefit Early-Stage Breast Cancer patients.

• **Proposed Schedule of CY 2022 RDC Meetings**

Ms. Sheryll B. Sarabia, Chief, Policy Formulation and Planning Division, of NEDA MIMAROPA presented the proposed schedule of CY 2022 RDC meetings. Executive Order No. 325, s. 1996 or the Reorganization of the RDC states that the RDC Full Council shall meet at least once every quarter. The RDC Executive Committee shall meet whenever the need arises while the RDC Advisory Committee shall be conducted in May. The RDC may adopt its own rules on constituting quorum. She mentioned that in order to assist the RDC in its functions, the following sectoral committees were created: development administration (DAC), economic development (EDC), infrastructure development (IDC), and social development (SDC).

Ms. Sarabia further said that the RDC secretariat prepared the proposed schedule of CY 2022 RDC full council and its sectoral committee meetings to avoid overlap with member agencies' schedule. She added that the FY 2023 sectoral budget review will be conducted on February 3-4 during the first quarter sectoral committee meetings. The proposed schedule is as follows:

The RDC sectoral committees during the fourth quarter meetings held on November 4 and 5 virtually through Zoom reviewed the proposed schedule and favorably recommended RDC approval.

RD Abilay requested that the conduct of FY 2023 sectoral budget review will be done prior to the conduct of the first quarter sectoral committees meetings of the RDC. This is to avoid overlap with the meeting of the sectoral committees and to allow the regional line agencies (RLAs) to focus on the budget preparation.

On a motion duly seconded, the proposed schedule of FY 2022 RDC meetings was approved and adopted.

G. Matters for Information

• **RA 11285 or Energy Efficiency and Conservation (EE&C) Act**

Ms. Lana Rose Manaligod of Department of Energy (DOE) presented the salient features of Republic Act No. 11285 or the Energy Efficiency and Conservation (EE&C) Act. RA 11285 or EE&C Act aims to institutionalize energy efficiency and conservation, enhance the efficient use of energy, and grant incentives to energy efficiency and conservation programs and projects. Under the EE&C Act, the Inter-Agency Energy Efficiency and Conservation Committee (IAEECC) was created to provide strategic direction to the Government Energy Management Program (GEMP). The IAEECC is chaired by the Department of Energy (DOE).

As provided under Section 43 of DOE Department Circular (DC) No. DC2019-11-0014 or the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the EE&C Act, the GEMP coverage was expanded to cover all government entities (GEs) which includes all departments, bureaus,

offices, branches and instrumentalities, government-owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs), including its subsidiaries or other self-governing board or commission of the government, local government units (LGUs), state universities and colleges (SUCs).

Ms. Manaligod reported that the IAEECC issued the following resolutions to provide direction on the implementation of the GEMP: a) Resolution No. 1, s. 2020, "Directing All Government Agencies, Including the Local Government Units (LGUs) and Foreign Service Posts, to Comply with the GEMP, Ordering the DOE to Conduct Energy Audits and Spot Checks, and Submit Proposed Improvements to the GEMP"; b) Resolution No. 2, s. 2021, "Directing All Government Entities, including the LGUs and Foreign Service Posts, to Use Energy Efficient Light Emitting Diode (LED) Lamps in Government Buildings and Facilities as a Requirement for Compliance to the GEMP"; and c) Resolution No. 3, s. 2021, "Directing All Government Entities, including the LGUs and Foreign Service Posts, to Use Inverter Type Air-Conditioning Units in Government Buildings and Facilities as a Requirement for Compliance to the GEMP".

She further cited that the GEMP mandated all Government Entities to comply with the following reportorial requirements: a) Designation of Energy Efficiency and Conservation Officer (EECO), b) Designation of Energy Efficiency and Conservation Focal Person (EECF, and c) Monthly Electricity Consumption Report (MECR), and 4) Monthly Fuel Consumption Report (MFCR).

Ms. Manaligod requested for RDC support on the EE&C Act. RD Mendoza responded that the EE&C Act should be first presented to the appropriate sectoral committees for recommendation prior to action of the RDC. Director Mendoza added that in the next meeting of the IDC, the DOE will be invited again to present the salient features of the EE&C Act.

• **COVID-19 Situationer and Vaccination Plan**

Dr. Christy Andaya of DOH MIMAROPA presented the COVID-19 case tracker. She reported that as of December 1, 2021, MIMAROPA has recorded a total of 33,330 cumulative number of COVID-19 cases with 394 (or 1.2 percent) total active cases. Oriental Mindoro recorded the highest number of active cases with 9,885 followed by Occidental Mindoro with 5,872 active cases, Palawan has 5,240, Romblon has 4,675, Puerto Princesa City has 3,976, and Marinduque has 3,682 active cases.

Out of the 33,330 cumulative number of cases, 31,426 (or 94.3 percent) have recovered and 955 (or 2.9 percent) died due to COVID-19. As to the cumulative positivity rate, of the total 110,358 individual tested for COVID-19, 33,256 turned positive for local cases with 30.13 percent positivity rate as of November 27, 2021.

On the classification of province/city by alert level, Dr. Andaya reported that based on the Risk Classification, Case Trend, Total Beds Utilization, and Vaccination Coverage, all the MIMAROPA provinces (Marinduque, Occidental Mindoro, Oriental Mindoro, Palawan, and Romblon) including Puerto Princesa City are under Level 2.

As to the status of laboratory, equipment and beds utilization for COVID-19 in the region, Dr. Andaya reported the following: a) out of the 44 total ICU beds, 86 percent beds are available; b) out of the 728 COVID-19 beds, 28 percent beds are occupied; c) out of the 2,378 non COVID beds, 50 percent are available; d) out of the 51 total ventilators, 90 percent ventilators are still available; and e) 93 percent of the temporary treatment monitoring treatment (TTMF) beds are available.

On the status of vaccination, Dr. Andaya reported that of the 2,248,549 target population of the MIMAROPA region, a total of 749,658 were fully vaccinated individuals with consumption rate of 33.34 percent. Oriental Mindoro recorded the highest number of fully vaccinated individuals with 226,490, followed by Palawan with 162,338, Occidental Mindoro has 104,205, Romblon has 96,304, Puerto Princesa City has 88,569, and Marinduque has 71,752 fully vaccinated individuals as of December 1, 2021.

For the eligible A1 group (workers in frontline health services), 48,675 (or 106 percent) were vaccinated for the first dose, 44,817 (or 97 percent) completed the two doses, and 1,735 (or 3.8 percent) had booster. For the eligible A2 group (senior citizens), 109,396 (or 41 percent) were vaccinated for the first dose, 111,057 (or 41 percent) completed the two doses, and 784 had booster. For the eligible A3 group (individual with comorbidity), 130,020 (or 53 percent) were vaccinated for the first dose, 158,420 (or 65 percent) completed the two doses, and only 62 had booster. For A4 group (frontline personnel in essential sectors) and A5 eligible group category, 383,931 (or 71 percent) and 139,743 (or 28 percent) were vaccinated for the first dose and 271,047 (or 50 percent) and 93,942 (or 19 percent) completed the two doses, respectively.

Dr. Andaya also briefed the body on the new variant of COVID-19. She said that the World Health Organization (WHO) is very concerned on omicron variant because it has several mutations in the spike protein and spreading more rapidly than the Delta variant. She mentioned that no official report yet in terms of transmissibility, severity of infections, performance of vaccines, and effectiveness of treatments.

She added that the most effective steps that individuals can take to reduce the spread of COVID-19 is to: a) avoid crowded places; b) keep a physical distancing; c) wear a well-fitting mask; d) keep hands clean; e) cough or sneeze into a bent elbow or tissue; f) open windows to improve ventilation; and g) get vaccinate when it's their turn.

- **NEDA MIMAROPA GAD Corner**

The RDC Secretary, ARD Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., presented the NEDA MIMAROPA GAD Corner. He reported that the establishment of GAD corner is in compliance with the Executive Order No. 273, which directs all government agencies, departments, bureaus, offices, and instrumentalities, including government owned and controlled corporations at the national, sub-national, and local levels to take appropriate steps to ensure the full implementation of the policies/strategies and programs/projects outlined in the Philippine Plan for Gender-Responsive Development. The Philippine Plan for Gender-Responsive Development has a long-term goal of fully integrating GAD concerns into the whole development process. Thus, it highlights the need to strengthen the GAD mainstreaming efforts of the various government agencies.

He said that the GAD corner in the NEDA MIMAROPA website features GAD related initiatives and GAD mainstreaming efforts of the regional office by uploading news articles, publications, laws, issuances, policies, guidelines and information, education and communication (IEC) materials in relation to GAD in the region. Given that the NEDA MIMAROPA acts as the secretariat of the RDC and its committees, the GAD corner also includes the GAD related activities and initiatives of the RDC and its committees such as the Regional Gender and Development Committee (RGADC).

ARD Atienza added that since NEDA MIMAROPA aim to advocate gender and development and promote awareness towards gender equity, a monthly infographics materials on GAD

concept and various GAD tools, such as the Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines (HGDG), the RGADC-developed and RDC-approved certification guidelines for Regional Pool of Gad Resource Persons (RPGRP) and the GAD mechanisms and profiling and inventory of GAD policies form will be posted in the GAD corner.

- **Regional Economic Situationer**

ARD Atienza presented the 3rd Quarter Regional Economic Situationer (QRES) 2021. QRES provides a preliminary and indicative assessment of the economic performance of the region using proxy indicators. It does not replace the assessment of the regional economy based on the complete statistical data from official sources.

He reported that MIMAROPA's average inflation rate increased to 4.7 percent in July to September 2021 from previous year's 3.1 percent. All provinces registered lower inflation rates except for Romblon. Romblon registered the highest inflation rate at 9.0 percent. The region's working age population increased by 1.9 percent from 2,049,000 in July 2020 to 2,088,000 in July 2021. Labor force participation rate decreased by 1.4 percentage points from 64.2 percent in July 2020 to 62.8 percent in July 2021. Employment rate decreased slightly by 1.4 percentage points from 94.3 percent in July 2020 to 92.9 percent in July 2021.

The region's employment rate was lower by 0.2 percentage points compared to the national average employment rate of 93.1 percent. This was attributed to the re-imposition of varying levels of community quarantine restrictions and health and safety protocols in the region, which resulted in disproportionate job loss for occupations in the region hardly hit by COVID-19.

The crops subsector registered 11.21 percent increase in outputs during the quarter. It remains the biggest contributor to the agriculture sector, sharing 76.63 percent to the region's total agriculture production. Notable increases were recorded in the production of palay, banana, calamansi, and cassava. Palay production in MIMAROPA increased by 11.39 percent this quarter. Meanwhile, corn production decreased by 8.99 percent from the third quarter of the previous year.

On the agriculture and fisheries production, banana production increased by 26.21 percent from third quarter of 2020 to the same period in 2021. Calamansi production increased by 16.59 percent last year. Coconut production, increased by 1.14 percent. The region's cacao production decreased by 10.63 percent. Cassava production increased by 44.16 this year. Mango production slightly increased by 0.66 percent from 124.66 MT during the third quarter of 2020 to 125.48 MT produced during same period in 2021. Livestock production slightly increased by 3.87 percent and poultry production increased by 8.94 during the third quarter of 2021.

The number of registered business names, assisted micro, small, medium enterprises (MSMEs), and registered vehicles decreased except the province of Oriental Mindoro. A total of 3,495 business names were registered in the region during the third quarter of 2021. This was 27.19 percent lower compared to the 4,800 business names registered during the same quarter last year. The value of metallic mineral production increased while non-metallic mineral production decreased. The exports and imports also increased.

Tourist arrivals in the region increased by 4.86 percent, with 28,512 tourist arrivals in July to September 2021 compared to 27,190 in the same period of 2020. This generated about ₱299.38 million income for the region's tourism industry, a 4.86 percent increase from the recorded tourist receipts during the same period last year. The increase in visitor arrivals may

be attributed to the reopening of several tourist destinations in Occidental Mindoro, Oriental Mindoro and Palawan.

ARD Atienza requested also the concerned agencies to validate and provide feedback or corrections on the draft QRES.

RD Ma. Josefina P. Abilay of DOST commented that there should be analysis on the impact of prime commodities (e.g., calamansi, banana, cashew, seaweeds, etc.) of the region to the regional economy and specific recommendations so that the agencies could act accordingly to improve the economic performance of the region.

RD Mendoza agreed on the suggestions of Director Abilay and responded that a more comprehensive and detailed analysis on the different subsectors of regional economy in crafting policy and identifying priority programs and projects that would help drive regional growth will be prepared by the RDC secretariat. He added that a state of the region report by the RDC Chairperson as well as analysis of the entire regional economy will also be presented in the next meeting of the RDC.

• **Project Monitoring Reports**

Mr. Roy A. Dimayuga, Chief of Project Monitoring and Evaluation Division (PMED) of NEDA MIMAROPA stated that the RPMC secretariat tracked the status of the implementation of on-going priority projects in the region through the submission of reports from various government agencies to the Regional Project Monitoring Committee (RPMC) using the “ProyekTanglaw” system.

He reported of the 730 projects, 683 or 93.56 percent were regular projects, 18 or 2.47 percent were funded under the Official Development Assistance (ODA), 26 or 3.56 percent were under the Rehabilitation and Recovery Program (RRP) projects, and three or 0.41 percent were under the End of Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) projects. There are no projects under National Action Plan against COVID-19 (NAP), Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa (BP2) reported by the implementing agencies for the third quarter of 2021. Hence, it is encouraged that implementing agencies report BP2 and NAP projects on the subsequent quarters.

Mr. Dimayuga presented that of the 730 projects monitored with a total project cost of ₱22.15 billion, transportation sector projects has the highest project cost of ₱15,184.87 million with 258 projects, power and energy sector with 17 projects amounting to ₱1,913.61 million, social infrastructure sector with 154 projects amounting to ₱1,536.65, and agri, fishery and livestock sector with 155 projects amounting to ₱1,482.53. A total of 60,779 were employed of which 35,140 or 58 percent are males and 25,639 or 42 percent are females. It is encouraged for implementing agencies to continuously seek out women and have them employed in our programs and projects in the region.

He added that of the reported 730 projects, 160 projects or 21.92 percent encountered delay in implementation. These were as follows: Department of Agriculture (DA) 24 projects, Department of Health-Center for Health Development (DOH-CHD) two projects, Department of Science and Technology (DOST) four projects, Department of Transportation (DOTr) two project, Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) 49 projects, National Power Corporation (NPC) nine projects, Commission on Population and Development (POPCOM) three projects, Provincial Government of Occidental Mindoro seven projects, Marinduque State College (MSC) five projects, Mindoro State University (MinSU) two projects, and Palawan State University (PSU) four projects. A total of 292 projects or 40 percent were

771 reportedly completed, while 146 projects or 20 percent were ahead of schedule. Projects with
772 slippage of negative 15% or greater are prioritized for field validation and problem solving
773 sessions.

775 • **RDC Endorsed Projects**

776
777 Ms. Jobelle M. Cruzado, OIC-Chief of Project Development Investment Programming and
778 Budget Division (PDIPBD) of NEDA MIMAROPA stated that the RDC is mandated under
779 Executive Order No. 325, s. 1996 to initiate and coordinate the development, funding, and
780 implementation of regional and special development projects such as those involving several
781 agencies or local government units. The secretariat regularly monitors the status of proposed
782 programs, activities, and projects (PAPs) endorsed by the RDC through a resolution.

783
784 She reported that from 2011-2020, a total of 24 major PAPs amounting to ₱57.94 billion pesos
785 were monitored in the region proposed for funding either under the General Appropriations Act
786 (GAA), Public-Private Partnership (PPP), or special program. Out of the 24 major PAPs, four
787 PAPs were related to transportation sector amounting to ₱96.23 billion pesos. This was
788 followed by agriculture sector with two PAPs amounting to ₱32.20 billion pesos, power and
789 energy sector with three PAPs amounting to ₱11.02 billion pesos, tourism sector with ten PAPs
790 amounting to ₱7.82 billion pesos, flood control projects with two PAPs amounting to ₱0.36
791 billion pesos, and three PAPs under human capital development amounting to ₱0.33 billion
792 pesos.

793
794 Ms. Cruzado presented the status of the following big ticket PAPs and other PAPs with
795 significant reports for the quarter: a) *Mindoro-Batangas Super Bridge*. The DPWH regularly
796 coordinates with the PPP Center on the finalization of cost for the consultancy services; b)
797 *Upgrading of Airstrip in Roxas, Palawan*. The project is included in the FY 2023 AIP of the
798 DOTr; c) *Maritime Safety Enhancement Project (MSEP) of DOTr-PCG*. The Philippine Coast
799 Guard (PCG) is undertaking the preparatory activities on the conduct of environment and social
800 impact assessment of the project; d) *Marinduque-Quezon Link Expressway (MQLEX)*. The
801 funding for the conduct of F/S is included in the agency proposed FY 2022 budget. However,
802 it is not considered in the FY 2022 NEP of DPWH MIMAROPA. DPWH Central Office is
803 recommending the implementing office to consider the ODA funding given the scale and
804 complexity of the project; e) *Hydropower Development Project (HDP) in Marinduque*. The PPP
805 Center is at the initial stage of the rapid assessment of the project and awaiting the submission
806 of the accomplished rapid assessment from the Municipal Government of Boac; f) *Laylay Light*
807 *Station Restoration and Development Project (LLSRDP) in Boac, Marinduque*. The PCG
808 Maritime Safety Services Command (MSSC) is awaiting the submission of the Maritime Safety
809 Services Unit Southern Tagalog Luzon on other documentary requirements for the conduct of
810 the F/S; g) *Sustainable Tourism Development Project (STDP) in Coron and El Nido, Palawan*.
811 The TIEZA has yet to finalize the financing arrangements of the project, in coordination with
812 the Department of Finance (DOF), specifically on the proposal to course the loan through a
813 government financial institution; h) *Philippine Rural Development Project Second Additional*
814 *Financing (PRDP-AF2)*. The loan agreement and grant agreement of the project have been
815 declared effective on September 24, 2021. The financial releases will be on the first quarter
816 of 2022; and i) *Philippine-Israeli-Solar-Powered Fertigation (PISPF) Project*. The DOF
817 requested the Israeli Embassy to provide a diagram showing the roles of the Israeli
818 Government (Ministry of Finance), insurance provider, contractor, and all the other relevant
819 parties to establish the government-to-government (G2G) arrangement and the process flow
820 for the financing.

For the details of the RDC endorsed projects, Ms. Cruzado referred the members to the reference folders for review of the concerned agencies

Subject: FY 2023 RDC Budget Review

1. The Regional Development Council (RDC) is mandated under Presidential Executive Order 325, s. 1996 to review and endorse to the national government the annual budgets of agency regional offices (AROs), state universities and colleges (SUCs), and selected government owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs).
2. In line with the guidelines and procedures provided under the National Budget Memorandum (NBM) No. 142 of the Department of Budget and Management (DBM), the MIMAROPA RDC sectoral committees conducted the RDC budget review and consultation on February 22-23 via zoom video conference.
3. The consultation was intended to review the status of the FY 2022 RDC-endorsed budgets, monitor the CY 2021 agency budget utilization rates, and present the proposed FY 2023 agency expenditure programs. The consultation also ensures that the proposed agency PAPs are consistent with the updated regional development investment program approved by the RDC and supportive of the development thrusts and priorities of the current administration and the region.
4. The RDC private sector representatives, chiefs of staff of MIMAROPA congressional district representatives, Provincial and City Planning and Development Coordinators, RDC officers, and the regional director of DBM MIMAROPA served as panel members during the two-day consultation.
5. The budget proposals of the concerned agencies considered the following priority PAPs of the RDC: a) Build Back Better (BBB) and climate change-related PAPs considering the MIMAROPA Rehabilitation and Recovery Plan (RRP) for areas affected by typhoon "Odette"; b) PAPs for gender and development (GAD) adopting the new guidelines of the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW); c) PAPs for COVID-19 response and recovery interventions; and d) the continuing impact of the pandemic and the Supreme Court decision in the "MANDANAS RULING".
6. The sectoral committees recommended RDC endorsement of the FY 2023 budget proposals of the RLAs, SUCs, and GOCCs subject to revisions based on the comments of the panel and committee members.
7. The sectoral committee chairpersons will report the FY 2023 budget proposals, FY 2021 agency budget utilization rates, and the status of FY 2022 RDC endorsed budgets of the selected member agencies of the development administration, economic development, infrastructure development, and social development committees.
8. Action requested: RDC endorsement of the budget proposals to their respective agency central offices (ACOs), Department of Budget and Management, MIMAROPA Congressional District Representatives, and the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) for SUCs, for inclusion in the FY 2023 agency budget proposals.

Subject: Donation to the Province of Palawan and Puerto Princesa City

1. Typhoon Odette, internationally named Rai, was the 15th tropical cyclone that hit the country and the strongest storm of 2021. The typhoon entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) on December 14, 2021 and made its first landfall over Siargao Island, Surigao del Norte.
2. On December 17, 2021, Typhoon Odette made its 9th and final landfall in Roxas, Palawan and wreaked havoc in central areas and northern portion of the province leaving behind casualties and significant damages to productive, infrastructure, social, and cross sectoral.
3. As of January 28, a total of 118,276 families consisting of 395,433 individuals were affected in the province of Palawan.
4. A total of 31 casualties were reported: 25 are dead; two are injured; and four are missing. The Regional Offices of Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), Philippine National Police (PNP), and Department of Health (DOH) are validating the reported casualties.
5. As of February 09, estimated damages is ₱4.39 billion. Among the four major sectors, social sector recorded the largest damages amounting to ₱2.25 billion or 51.31% of the total damages, followed by productive sector with ₱1.48 billion or 33.75%, infrastructure sector with ₱371.26 million or 8.44%, and cross sectoral with ₱285.74 million or 6.50%.
6. Total houses damaged were 89,782 amounting to ₱1.52 billion, 74,319 of which were partially damaged, while 15,463 were totally damaged.
7. In terms of losses, a total estimated losses of ₱4.24 billion were recorded in the region. Productive sector reported the largest losses amounting to ₱2.09 billion or 49.33% of the total losses. This was followed by social sector with ₱2.02 billion or 47.74%, infrastructure sector with ₱99.55 million or 2.35%, and cross sectoral with ₱ 24.79 million or 0.58%.
8. On December 21, 2021, President Rodrigo Roa Duterte signed Proclamation No. 1267 declaring a State of Calamity in regions IV-B, VI, VII, VIII, X, and XIII.

9. In the spirit of compassion and solidarity, MIMAROPA Regional Development Council recognizes the need to donate an amount of ₱150,000.00 to the Provincial Government of Palawan (₱100,000.00) and City Government of Puerto Princesa (₱50,000.00) to support the recovery and rehabilitation efforts intended for the families and communities affected by Typhoon Odette.

10. The proposed amount for donation will be charged to the MIMAROPA RDC Trust Fund.

11. Development Administration Committee, during its 1st quarter meeting on February 22 virtually through Zoom, recommended RDC approval to authorize the MIMAROPA RDC to donate an amount of ₱150,000.00 to the Provincial Government of Palawan (₱100,000.00) and City Government of Puerto Princesa (₱50,000.00) which will be charged to the MIMAROPA RDC Trust Fund.

On April 24, 2009, the Banko Sentral ng Pilipinas (BSP) and Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) forged two Memoranda of Agreement (MOA) to institute information sharing between the BSP and city and municipal governments on the licensing and registration of pawnshops (PSs) and money service businesses (MSBs).
2. The two MOA aim to: a) combat money laundering or terrorist financing, and regulate the PSs and MSBs to ensure funds are only channeled for legitimate purposes; b) protect the public from PSs and MSBs operating without the necessary business registrations, permits, or licenses; and c) lay down the minimum requirements and standards under which PSs and MSBs may be established and do business.
3. On November 15, 2019, BSP and DILG signed Joint Memorandum Circular (JMC) No. 01, s. 2019 providing for guidelines in the issuance of business and license/permit for head offices and branches of PSs and MSBs, and on information sharing with BSP. Further, the JMC institutionalizes and ensures the effective implementation and monitoring of the information sharing between LGUs and the BSP pursuant to the MOA between the BSP and DILG.
4. The joint effort of BSP and DILG promotes consumer protection against illegal and unfair practices of entities operating without permits or licenses and those involved in money laundering or terrorist financing activities. It also helps individuals who are unserved or unreached by banks to have access to financial services and thereby, contribute to inclusive finance.
5. Information sharing on the BSP-DILG JMC No. 01, s. 2019 became more relevant with the inclusion of the Philippines in the "Financial Action Task Force's Grey List of Jurisdictions under Increased Monitoring," which can affect the country's remittances and loans abroad. In this regard, there is a need to boost a countrywide approach to address money laundering activities. LGUs play a crucial role in ensuring that business permit renewals are only issued to duly registered PSs and MSBs with BSP.

Subject: FY 2022 GAA “For Later Release” of DPWH MIMAROPA

1. The Regional Development Council (RDC) is mandated under Executive Order No. 325, s. 1996 to review and endorse to the national government the annual budgets of agency regional offices, state universities and colleges, and other special development authorities in the region.
2. The General Appropriations Act (GAA) of 2022 includes expenditure items categorized as “For Later Release (FLR)” under Convergence and Special Support Program (CSSP).
3. The 493 FLR projects consists of 258 projects under Sustainable Infrastructure Projects Alleviating Gaps (SIPAG) amounting to ₱14,170,025,000, 52 projects under Asset Preservation Program amounting to ₱4,518,374,000, 124 projects under Basic Infrastructure Program amounting to ₱2,257,000,000, 19 projects under Network Development Program amounting to ₱1,528,650,000, 19 projects under Flood Management Program amounting to ₱857,000,000, ten projects under Special Road Fund - Motor Vehicle User's Charge (MVUC) amounting to ₱645,751,000, four projects under Bridge Program amounting to ₱89,920,000, and seven projects under National Building Program amounting to ₱72,770,000.
4. In the proposed 493 FLR projects, Palawan has 153 projects amounting to ₱8,469,577,000, Romblon has 85 projects amounting to ₱7,236,390,000, Marinduque has 121 projects amounting to ₱4,307,650,000, Oriental Mindoro has 106 projects amounting to ₱2,945,103,000, and Occidental Mindoro has 28 projects amounting to ₱1,180,770,000.
5. As provided in the National Budget Circular (NBC) 578, s. 2022, Schedule II - Expenditure Items for Later Release (Negative List) through SARO/GARO, RDC’s endorsement is required for DPWH infrastructure projects to ensure alignment with regional priority plans and programs.
6. The proposed various projects categorized as FLR under the CSSP consists of roads, bridges, water system, multi-purpose building, flood control/mitigation measure/structure, and other infrastructure projects that are included in the DPWH MIMAROPA FY 2022 GAA are deemed supportive of the development thrusts and priorities of the current administration and the region.

7. The proposed PAPs of DPWH MIMAROPA in the FY 2022 GAA are deemed supportive of the development thrusts and priorities of the current administration and the region.
8. Upon review by the RDC Secretariat of the 493 PAPs, a number of projects are not included in 2022 National Expenditure Program, 129 PAPs amounting to **₱6,146,244,000** are included in the Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP) 2017-2022, and 364 PAPs amounting to **₱17,993,246,000** are not included in the RDIP 2017-2022.
9. As prescribed in the Comprehensive Investment Programming Guidelines of the RDC, all projects requiring RDC endorsement must be included in the RDIP.
10. The 493 PAPs amounting to ₱24,139,490,000 under the FY 2022 GAA expenditure items categorized as “For Later Release (FLR)” under Convergence and Special Support Program (CSSP) of the DPWH MIMAROPA is being requested for RDC endorsement to DPWH Central Office.

BRIEF FROM THE RDC SECRETARIAT

**Subject: Energy Efficiency and Conservation (EE&C) Act and the
Government Energy Management Program (GEMP)**

1. The Republic Act No. 11285 or the Energy Efficiency and Conservation (EE&C) Act institutionalizes energy efficiency and conservation, enhances the efficient use of energy, and grants incentives to energy efficiency and conservation programs and projects.
2. Under the EE&C Act, the Inter-Agency Energy Efficiency and Conservation Committee (IAEECC) was created to provide strategic direction to the Government Energy Management Program (GEMP). The IAEECC is chaired by the Department of Energy (DOE).
3. As provided under Section 43 of DOE Department Circular (DC) No. DC2019-11-0014 or the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the EE&C Act, the GEMP coverage was expanded to cover all government entities (GEs) which includes all departments, bureaus, offices, branches and instrumentalities, government-owned and controlled corporations (GOCCs), including its subsidiaries or other self-governing board or commission of the government, local government units (LGUs), state universities and colleges (SUCs).
4. To provide direction on the implementation of the GEMP, the IAEECC issued three resolutions.
5. Resolution No. 1, s. 2020 – Directing All Government Agencies, Including the Local Government Units (LGUs) and Foreign Service Posts, to Comply with the GEMP, Ordering the DOE to Conduct Energy Audits and Spot Checks, and Submit Proposed Improvements to the GEMP
6. Resolution No. 2, s. 2021 – Directing All Government Entities, including the LGUs and Foreign Service Posts, to Use Energy Efficient Light Emitting Diode (LED) Lamps in Government Buildings and Facilities as a Requirement for Compliance to the GEMP
7. Resolution No. 3, s. 2021 - Directing All Government Entities, including the LGUs and Foreign Service Posts, to Use Inverter Type Air-Conditioning Units in Government Buildings and Facilities as a Requirement for Compliance to the GEMP.

8. The GEMP also mandates all GEs to comply with the following reportorial requirements: 1) Designation of Energy Efficiency and Conservation Officer (EECO), 2) Designation of Energy Efficiency and Conservation Focal Person (EECF, 3) Monthly Electricity Consumption Report (MECR), and 4) Monthly Fuel Consumption Report (MFCR).
9. DOE presented the salient features of the EE&C Act and GEMP in the fourth quarter Regional Development Council (RDC) Full Council meeting on December 3, 2021 requesting RDC support.
10. DOE was instructed to present the matter first to the Infrastructure Development Committee (IDC) prior to RDC action.
11. Thus, the DOE presented the salient features of the EE&C Act and GEMP in the first quarter IDC meeting last February 23.
12. The IDC favourably recommended to RDC to support the EE&C Act and the GEMP of the DOE.

6. The Regional ComDev shall be chaired and co-chaired by the regional directors of DBM MIMAROPA and DILG MIMAROPA, respectively, and shall be composed of the member agencies and organizations listed in Annex A.
7. The DAC, during its special meeting on September 10 through Zoom video teleconference, reviewed the proposed creation of Regional ComDev and favorably recommended RDC approval.

8. The Regional ComDev shall be required to report to the RDC on a quarterly basis, synchronized with the submission of their quarterly accomplishment reports to the ComDev.

BRIEF FROM THE RDC SECRETARIAT

Subject: MIMAROPA COVID-19 Situational and Vaccine Rollout Reports

1. President Rodrigo R. Duterte issued Proclamation No. 922, declaring a state of public health emergency throughout the entire Philippines and prompting a whole-of-government approach in addressing the COVID-19 pandemic. On March 12, 2020, the President, upon the recommendation by the IATF, raised the code alert level for COVID-19 to Code Red Sublevel 2 and directed the imposition of stringent social and physical distancing and enhanced response measures.
2. The Department of Health–Center for Health Development (DOH-CHD) MIMAROPA conducts surveillance, infection prevention and control, risk communication, contingency planning, and laboratory capacity building.
3. As of February 23, 2022, MIMAROPA has recorded a total of 38,793 cumulative number of COVID-19 cases, with 447 total active cases. Palawan recorded the highest number of total active cases, with 260. This was followed by Oriental Mindoro with 69 cases, Puerto Princesa City with 65 cases, Occidental Mindoro with 42 cases, and Marinduque with 9 cases. Romblon recorded the lowest number of active cases at 2.
4. The government has been implementing the vaccination program to ensure equal access to vaccines and to implement quality vaccination services.
5. As of February 24, 2022, based on the latest National COVID-19 Vaccination Breakdown Dashboard, a total of 1,604,267 individuals or 61.75 percent of the target population of 2,598,144, were fully vaccinated in the region. Priority Group A4 (frontline personnel in essential sectors) recorded the highest number of fully vaccinated individuals with 472,830. This was followed by Priority Group A3 (individuals with comorbidity, pregnant, and 12-17 pediatric) with 196,733; Priority Group A5 (poor population) with 192,474; Priority Group A2 (senior citizen) with 157,292; and Priority Group A1 (workers in frontline health services) with 71,632. Moreover, a total of 513,306 fully vaccinated individuals were reported from the rest of the adult and pediatric population.
6. Further, a total of 147,275 individuals in MIMAROPA were reported to have received booster vaccines. Priority Group A4 recorded the highest number of individuals to receive booster vaccines with 39,394. This was followed by Priority Group A3 with 36,631; Priority Group A2 with 30,297; Priority Group A1 with 25,510; and Priority Group A5 with 7,744.
7. DOH MIMAROPA will present the full COVID-19 situation including the vaccine rollout report.

Subject: 4th Quarter Regional Economic Situationer (QRES) 2021

1. QRES provides a preliminary and indicative assessment of the economic performance of the region using proxy indicators. It does not replace the assessment of the regional economy based on the complete statistical data from official sources.
2. MIMAROPA's inflation decreased by 0.7 percentage point from 3.2 percent in October to 2.5 percent in December 2021. This may be attributed to the slow price increase of all commodity groups, particularly alcoholic beverages and tobacco.
3. The region's working age population increased by 0.97 percent from 2,055,000 in October 2020 to 2,075,000 in October 2021. The labor force participation rate also increased by 0.82 percentage point from 62.0 percent in October 2020 to 62.8 percent in October 2021.
4. Some indicators that show the region's positive economic performance in the fourth quarter of 2021 are reflected in the production of the agricultural commodities such as palay, calamansi, coconut, arrowroot, cacao, livestock, poultry, and commercial and municipal inland fisheries. However, fisheries production decreased.
5. The number of registered business names, amount of investments, and employment generated decreased during the quarter. Further, the value of metallic mineral production, non-metallic mineral, and exports also decreased. On the other hand, the value of imports increased.
6. Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, tourist arrivals, movement of aircrafts, passengers, water transport, movement of sea vessels including ROROs, and cargoes in air and land transport services all increased. However, water transportation operations were still negatively affected, especially the container port traffic and cargo throughput.
7. The region remains peaceful, as the volume of crimes decreased compared to previous year's fourth quarter data.
8. The 4th quarter regional economic situationer and the annual RES 2021 will be distributed to the members for review and validation of data.

Subject: CY 2021 Project Monitoring Report

1. The RPMC secretariat tracked the status of the implementation of on-going priority projects in the region through the submission of reports from various government agencies to the Regional Project Monitoring Committee (RPMC) using the “ProyekTanglaw” system.
2. For the 4th quarter of CY 2021, 28 MIMAROPA government offices reported the implementation status of 617 projects amounting to ₱23.261 Billion, in the region. These agencies were as follows: Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines (CAAP) Area Center 3, Department of Agriculture (DA), Department of Energy (DOE), Department of Health - Center for Health Development (DOH-CHD), Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), Department of Science and Technology (DOST), Department of Transportation (DOTr), Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) , DPWH Marinduque District Engineering Office, DPWH Mindoro Oriental District Engineering Office, DPWH Palawan 3 District Engineering Office, DPWH Southern Mindoro District Engineering Office, Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), Local Water Utilities Administration (LWUA), Marinduque State College (MSC), Mindoro State University (MinSU), National Housing Authority (NHA), National Power Corporation (NPC), Occidental Mindoro State College (OMSC), Provincial Government of Marinduque, Provincial Government of Occidental Mindoro, Provincial Government of Oriental Mindoro, Provincial Government of Romblon, Philippines Ports Authority (PPA) - Port Management Office (PMO) Palawan, Population Commission (PopCom), Palawan State University (PSU), Romblon State University (RSU), and Western Philippine University (WPU).
3. The 617 projects generated employment of 52,410 persons, of which 30,589 (58 percent) were men and 21,821 (42 percent) were women.
4. A total of 366 projects or 59.32 percent were reportedly completed.
5. Of the reported 617 projects, 121 projects (19.61 percent) encountered problems in implementation. These were as follows

6. Of the reported 617 projects, 583 (94.49 percent) were regular projects, 16 (2.59 percent) were ODA projects, 17 (2.76 percent) were rehabilitation and recovery projects (RRP), and one (0.16 percent) End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) project.
7. Transportation, Social Infrastructure, and Agriculture, Livestock, Fishery sectors accounted for 76 percent of the total projects implemented for the fourth quarter. The breakdown of projects implemented per sector are as follows:

9. Projects in the transportation sector accounted for 62.89 percent of the total cost of projects implemented in the region for the period CY 2021.
