Governor Velasco asked to have one item (1) added under Other Matters – Status of
submission of devolved functions of regional offices in MIMAROPA.

- 151 C. Approval of the Proposed Agenda
- 153 The approval of the proposed agenda with amendments was moved and duly seconded.
- D. Approval of the Minutes of the Previous Meeting

The Secretariat presented and asked for the approval of the minutes of the previous meeting. On the motion duly seconded, the minutes of the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Committee Meeting of the Regional Committee on Devolution was approved as presented.

161 E. Matters for Discussion/Information

RD Sanchez asked for the guidance of the body to continue with the business proper (even without a quorum). With no objections and the approval of the body, the discussion proceeded. The Secretariat clarified that there was no matters arising from the previous meeting and informed the body of additional members in attendance, thus having a quorum.

169 Updates on the Submission of DTPs of LGUs in the MIMAROPA Region

171Mr. JR Palanca-Golifardo, started the discussion by citing Section 10 of EO 138172which provides the instruction to LGUs to formulate their respective DTPs. These173DTPs were uploaded to a repository. It was noted that the deadline of submission174of DTPs was set to October 13, 2021 for the barangay level; November 12, 2021175for the municipality; and December 12, 2021 for the provincial level. The results176of DTP submission are presented per Province.

- 1781. Occidental Mindoro has 100% completion 164 barangays, 11 municipalities179and 1 provincial government
- 1802. Oriental Mindoro has 100% completion 426 barangays, 14 municipalities and1811 provincial government
- 1833. Marinduque being the first to submit has 100% completion 218 barangays,1846 municipalities and 1 provincial government
- 1864. Romblon has 100% completion 219 barangays, 17 municipalities and 1187provincial government
- 1895. Palawan has 99.98% completion 367 barangays, 22/23 municipalities and 1190provincial government. Mr. Palanca-Golifardo seeks assistance from the President191of the Leagues of Provinces to make a follow up with the submission of the

Municipality of San Vicente with pending narrative and message. DILG is hoping 192 that the submission be completed by the end of June. 193 194 6. Puerto Princesa City has 100% completion – 66 barangays and 1 highly 195 urbanized city 196 197 The submission of all LGU DTPs is now at 99.99%. 198 199 200 LGU DTP Quality Assessment 201 DILG has formulated an assessment of the submitted LGU DTPs which comes in 202 two (2) phases - Quality Assessment Tool and the Analytics. 203 204 The Quality Assessment Tool (QAT) was developed as an initial assessment of 205 the DTPs. It is composed of two (2) parts - the Assessment Forms for the 206 barangays, cities / municipalities, and provinces; and the Consolidated Report 207 Template. The Assessment Forms evaluate the quality and compliance of the LGU 208 DTPs based on the parameters identified and requirements set in the guidelines, 209 as well as to provide guidance to further improve the DTPs. 210 211 The DTPs are assessed by the Municipality/City Local Government Operations 212 Officers (MLGOOs) and field officers from the provincial offices. The Quality 213 Assessment forms are consolidated on the regional level prior to forwarding to 214 the Central Office for their comments. 215 216 During the assessment, it aims to evaluate the quality of the compliance of the 217 LGU DTPs based on the set standards and guidelines of EO No. 138 and the 218 DILG-DBM Joint Memorandum Circular (JMC) 2021-01 dated August 11, 2021, 219 the Guidelines on the Preparation of Devolution Transition Plans of Local 220 Government Units in Support of Full Devolution under Executive Order No. 138, 221 dated 01 June 2021. 222 223 224 This Quality Assessment Tool is divided into three (3) Parameters. 225 Parameter 1 - A checklist is provided to verify if all required and corresponding 226 documents are submitted or considered not applicable, and a remarks column 227 for additional requirements, changes or otherwise may also be included in the 228 remarks section. The Consolidated Report Template is used to identify which 229 forms are not submitted and indicate the dates of the initial and final complete 230 submission of the DTPs. 231 232 This is the form completeness, refers to the forms submitted as required in the 233 DTP repository based on the Sec. 5 of the DILG-DBM JMC 2021-01. 234 235 Parameter 2 – This parameter validates if higher and lower-tier LGUs 236 237 coordinated/interfaced with each other as well as with NGAs whenever applicable, to ensure DTP vertical alignment of plans across each LGU tier and 238 with the sectoral requirements of concerned NGAs based on NGA DTPs. This 239

- 240 parameter also assesses if the LGU DTPs have been approved accordingly by the 241 concerned Sangguniang to ensure the legitimization of the said plan.
- This is the Progress and Alignment. Checklist were provided to LGUs to verify submission certain documents and to determine if those documents are applicable to their level. It is also important to identify the status of the submission of each LGU's attendance on the Regional Orientation for the Formulation of the LGU DTP and their respective EO on the formulation of Devolution Transition Committee (DTC).
- Parameter 3 This parameter assesses the LGU DTPs as to its logic and consistency. A checklist on completeness verifies if the forms were properly filled out. It should be indicated in the remarks section if the forms submitted have complete or incomplete information and other comments or observations relative to the extent of compliance.
- 256This is Coherence and Completeness to identify if the function services and257facilities (FSFs) are captured in line with the DTPs of NGAs. Unfortunately, the258DTPs of the NGAs are yet to be completed. With the completion, the LGU and259NGA DTPs can be compared.
- 261 The results were as follows:

- Parameter 1 With a total of 1540 LGU, 1524 were compliant, 11 partially compliant and 3 non-compliant.
- Parameter 2 1403 were compliant, 135 partially compliant and 0 non-compliant.
   Parameter 3 1524 LGUs were compliant.
  - LGU DTP Analytics

Following the conduct of LGU-DTP Quality Assessment, the DILG-BLGD developed the LGU-DTP Data Capture Form (DCF) as a tool to gather data from the LGU-DTPs and process these into information with intent to inform and guide policies and actions of the national government to support LGUs' transition to full devolution within the given timeframe.

Data gathered from using the DCF shall be used for the LGU-DTP Analytics ("Analytics") to produce information on a) the level of LGU absorption of devolved functions and services; b) the readiness of the LGU for full devolution; c) the available information to track LGU performance in the delivery of devolved functions and services.

- This is internal to DILG and the LGU DTP Analytics shall inform the policy and direction of the department with regards to the Devolution. The results will be shared to this Committee, concerned NGAs, League of LGUs and other stakeholders once finalized.
- The purpose of this Analytics is to inform the progress of devolution whether this will be for implementation this year (2022), or to be implemented by the

year 2023 and 2024. This will also check the budget and capacity development 288 for the LGUs. Second is to influence the design – this will determine if the strategy 289 of implementation of NGAs is in line with that of the LGUs and if there is a need 290 for capacity development from the NGAs to LGUs. Lastly, it aimed to shape 291 policies and accelerate transition to full devolution. The year 2022 crucial year 292 since this will be the start of transition to the full devolution and the new 293 administration. 294 295 296 The data capture form has assessment areas to determine if FSFs of the LGUs are fully captured. This contains different FSFs to be devolved to LGUs based on 297 the Sec. 17 of Local Government Code (LGC) and other pertinent laws selected 298 thereafter assigning responsibilities to the LGUs. The list in the data capture form 299 is the devolved responsibilities – consolidated from the submitted Attachment C, 300 the Matrix of Devolved Basic Services and Facilities Based on the Local 301 Government Code of 1991. 302 303 The Analytics has seven (7) assessment areas defined in set of indicators as data 304 aathered from the attachment provided by the LGUs. This is yet to be shared 305 since the tool is still on the process of enhancement. DILG is still gathering 306 feedback from DILG field offices for the alignment of LGU DTPs. 307 308 Ways Forward 309 310 1. Conduct of National Government Agencies (NGA) Forum 311 312 There will be series of talks between different NGAs to align the DTPs of LGUs. 313 This will serve to provide a collaborative avenue and align appreciation and 314 insights from LGU and NGA DTPs. This will also outline challenges, determine 315 technical assistance needed by both the NGA and LGU for the implementation 316 of the full devolution. It also aims to identify strategic steps to harmonize DTPs 317 of concerned NGAs with devolved functions to LGUs. 318 319 320 The concerned NGAs are: Department of Agriculture (DA), Department of Health (DOH), Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), 321 National Irrigation Administration (NIA), Department of Education (DepEd), 322 Department of Tourism (DOT), Department of Public Works and Highways 323 (DPWH) and the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI). 324 325 DILG is still in partnership with DBM on the conduct of this activity which is 326 set on July to the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of August. The guidelines is yet to be issued by the 327 DILG Central Office. 328 329 2. Conduct of Series of Regional Forum on PPAs and Devolve functions with Line 330 Agencies and LGUs/League 331 332 This will align the regional devolved functions to DTPs of LGUs. 333 334

- RD Sanchez asked Mr. Palanca-Golifardo to respond to the question raised from DENR ARD Donna Mayor-Gordove as to how the series of regional forum be conducted as to per line agency or per province. He explained that there will be a NGA forum on a national level, after which this will be echoed on a regional level. Thus, the regional line agencies will conduct a forum with the LGUs.
- DTI Regional Director Joel Valera inquired on the stand of the new administration on the devolution. He also mentioned that DTI MIMAROPA has no regional DTP and has submitted its DTP to the national level for review. He suggested that the Committee wait for any instruction from the new administration.
- Mr. Palanca-Golifardo welcomed the director's comments and answered that we still have to comply until there are any succeeding laws that says otherwise.
- RD Valera added that his suggestion is on a more practical approach since some of the regional directors will be reassigned and that there will be new Local Chief Executives (LCEs) on other LGUs.
- 353 DENR ARD Donna Mayor-Gordove on a rejoinder asked on having the forum on a ground 354 level (municipal and provincial) instead of it being on the regional level. She mentioned 355 checking on assistance to be provided to the LGUs, as well as the adjustment of work 356 plans. This was noted by Mr. Palanca-Golifardo and will have the suggestion raised to 357 DILG CO.
- RD Sanchez provided updates regarding status of the NGA DTPs. There are already two (2) approved DTPs – the DTP of Commission on Population and Development (POPCOM) and the joint DTP of Department of Health (DOH) and National Nutrition Council (NNC). As for the submission, the Department of Energy (DOE) and Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) are yet to submit their DTPs. The DTPs are subject to in-depth evaluation of the DBM Central Office. These will be cascaded once approved.
- The representative from MPDO of Boac, Marinduque, Ms. Lyra Magalang asked if the LGU can continue the process of the DTP even if their LGU is categorized as Compliant only and if they can we still conduct the inter-phasing with barangays and province regarding the presentation of DTP. Mr. Palanca-Golifardo answered that the LGUs can still continue with their DTP activities as there is no advisory/memorandum ordering to hold any activities.
- Another inquiry from DENR ARD Donna Mayor-Gordove asked the about the status of 374 the activity conducted on the pilot area which is the Province of Marindugue. During the 375 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter meeting, they were advised to coordinate with the LGUs. They also have set 376 aside a budget for the Capacity Development. Mr. Palanca-Golifardo replied that the 377 activity was the Capacity Development Analytics of LGU DTPs conducted on the first 378 guarter of 2022 particularly on the Province of Marindugue. He mentioned that the 379 results can be explained better by the focal person on CapDev Analytics, Ms. Cidney 380 Bejasa. He has the inquiry noted and will get back to DENR regarding the results. 381

- POPCOM Regional Director Reynaldo Wong asked if their CapDev activities will be affected by ongoing conduct of the analytics. This was answered by Mr. Palanca-Golifardo, that the CapDev activities will not be affected by any activities related to the DTP analytics.
- Another inquiry from LGU Boac is about the schedule of presentation of the Analytics of reviewed DTPs for the LGUs. Mr. Palanca-Golifardo replied that there are no schedules yet and will have the LGUs updated through the DILG provincial office in Marinduque.
- RD Sanchez inquired on the next steps after the conduct of assessments and if the results were communicated to the concerned LGUs. Mr. Palanca-Golifardo mentioned that the findings were informally communicated to the concerned LGUs as they are still waiting for guidance from the DILG CO regarding the LGU DTPs that needs revisions/improvement.
- 397 Mr. Palanca-Golifardo closed his presentation with a story from El Filibusterismo. 398 "Minsan nilapitan si Pilosopo Tasyo ng dalawang estudyante. Isa sa mga estudyante ay 399 may dalang ibon sa kanang kamay. Para subukin ang talino ng matanda, pinahulaan 400 nila dito kung ang ibon ay buhay o patay. Kung sasabihin ni Pilosopo Tasyo na ang ibon 401 ay buhay, sasakalin ng bata ang leeg ng ibon hanngang ito ay mamatay. Kung sasabihin 402 niya namang ang ibon ay patay, pakakawalan ng estudyante ang ibon at si Pilosopong 403 Tasyo ay mapaphiya. Kaya't ang tanging sagot niya ay: Ang buhay ng ibong iyan as 404 nasa iyong mga kamay." 405
- He related the story with the on-going devolution. He mentioned that the crucial part of the transition and the full devolution does not rely on one agency/person alone. He encouraged everyone to work hand in hand for the improvement of the DTPs for a better MIMAROPA region.

- 412 413 F. Other Matters
- Gov. Presbiterio Velasco asked the Status of the Submission of Devolved Functions of Regional Offices be discussed first. He mentioned that this can be parallel with the LGU DTPs and the provincial governments of MIMAROPA could be made aware of the activities regarding the devolution.
- RD Sanchez agreed with the recommendation and asked feedback from the line agencies with devolved functions to the LGUs. He reiterated that the national status – DBM is expecting twenty (20) DTPs from NGAs to be submitted for review and approval. Two (2) out of the eighteen (18) submissions has already been approved. He clarified that the submission is on a national level, thus the presentation will only come from those agencies with approved DTPs.
- 427 Status of Submission of Devolved Functions of Regional Offices
- 429 POPCOM Regional Director Reynaldo Wong shared the updates of POPCOM DTP.

472	PD Canchez inquired on the develved functions of PODCOM that not all functions were
473	RD Sanchez inquired on the devolved functions of POPCOM – that not all functions were
474	devolved, particularly to GIDA and 5 <sup>th</sup> and 6 <sup>th</sup> class municipalities. There will still be
475	investment/assistance provided to them, although the NGAs should be focused on
476	steering and deliberate standards of development and policy formulation. This has been
477	given clarity by RD Wong that this is certainly going to happen.
478	

- While waiting for the feedback from the representative of DOH or NNC, the Chairperson
  responded to the comment from DENR that they already had presented the proposed
  DENR DTP during the Regional Roll-Out Orientation on the Preparation of LGU DTPs last
  August 9-11, 2021.
- 484 RD Sanchez took note of the activity and explained that the initial roll out was for the 485 Regional line agencies to present the DTPs to LGUs to help them on the formulation of 486 their own DTPs. He mentioned that we aim to cascade the approved DTPs.

- National Nutrition Council (NNC) MIMAROPA OIC Ma. Eileen B. Blanco provided an
   update on the program included on the approved DTP of DOH. The Tutok Kainan is an
   ongoing program in the target areas in MIMAROPA particularly Occidental Mindoro and
   Marinduque. By 2023, NNC will provide 50% of the total funds needed as well as the
   technical assistance. However, by 2024, this will be fully devolved and NNC will only
   provide the technical assistance.
- RD Sanchez shared one highlight from the DOH approved DTP which is the Human Resource for Health (HRH) – a program which requires a lot of funding from the national government. It was mentioned that the HRH funding for nurses and midwives will be devolved to the LGUs, except for the 5<sup>th</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> class municipalities. The higher income LGUs should have funding for HRH for midwives and nurses. Funding for other medical personnel (doctors, dentists, medical technologists) will still be provided by the NGA through the DOH.
- Governor Velasco commented on the update provided by RD Sanchez. He stated that 503 the 3<sup>rd</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> class LGUs cannot provide for the funding for the HRH of midwives and 504 nurses. He mentioned that the National Tax Allotment (NTA) will decrease by fourteen 505 (14) to twenty (20) per cent on 2023. He also mentioned about filing an opposition to 506 such because they cannot provide the funds. Additionally, he talked about the reason 507 why they wanted to get hold of the submission of DTPs of regional offices for each 508 province in MIMAROPA. His position is that the NGAs should provide the funds to support 509 the devolved functions. With the varying positions, it will still depend with the incoming 510 administration on how they look at the devolution. He added that the lower rank LGUs 511 will have difficulty in supporting the devolved functions more particularly the DOH. He 512 further shared that he was not the Governor then, when DOH devolved certain functions 513 but not the funds. At this time, he cited that he is eager to know the devolved functions 514 so that the provincial government will know how to answer and deal with it, as well as 515 to know if they provide the services with their own financial resources. He said that they 516 are looking at the devolution very carefully as he still want to perform satisfactorily. He 517 referred to what happened in the Agriculture sector that they are being blamed for woes 518 being experienced by the sector and that they do not agree on that. He added that DA 519 supported the LGUs. He appealed that funds should be devolved along with the 520 functions. They cannot rely on the share of NTA which was already computed. He also 521 pointed out that the provinces will have difficulty on the funding for the devolved 522 functions which were even increased by the special laws, aside from what were listed 523 under Sec. 17 of the LGC. With this, he added that the devolution should be done in 524 phases and that the NGA should still have a share on the funding because they cannot 525 totally rely on their NTA shares. He wanted to be prepared on this devolution. 526

- RD Sanchez informed the body that the approved NGA DTPs were already posted in the DBM website. He requested that the (regional) line agencies with approved DTPs should have a touch base with the LGUs. This is to have the approved DTPs cascaded to their level and the LGUs can easily understand coming from the regional level and they can provide the feedback, if any they can provide their position through their respective leagues.
- List of NGAs who submitted their Alternate Focal Person
- The list was presented by Ms. Novalyn Asuncion. As of June 15, 2022, eleven 537 (11) agencies have complied with the submission of names for the Permanent 538 and Alternate Representative and Permanent Communications Focal Person. She 539 mentioned that from the first meeting, an Alternate Communications Focal 540 Person was not requested but NIA and DOT have sent their alternates, reason 541 why they were on the list. She requested for the approval that the deadline for 542 submission of representatives be set on July 28, 2022. Also, she added that email 543 can be sent to remind the members of such. 544
- 546 RD Wong agreed with having the email/reminder sent to this effect.
- 548 RD Sanchez inquired if there is a member from Philippine Information Agency (PIA). He 549 noted that the member from PIA can help out on mapping a communications strategy 550 for an effective dissemination of information to our stakeholders.
- 552 III. ADJOURNMENT

### BACKGROUND

Section 8 of Executive Order No. 138, s.2021

The GEF shall be established to address the issues of marginalization, unequal development, high poverty incidence and disparities in the net fiscal capacity of the LGUs.

### **LEGAL BASIS**

Special Provision No. 4 of the LGSF, FY 2022 GAA, RA 11639

The amount of Php 1.25B shall be used as financial assistance to the identified poor, disadvantaged, and lagging LGUs for the implementation of priority projects to gradually enable the full and efficient implementation of the functions and services of concerned LGUs as provided under Section 17 of the LGC of 1991 (RA No. 7160).



### **LEGAL BASIS**

President's Veto Message to the FY 2022 GAA, RA 11639

The GEF shall be executed in accordance with the guidelines to be issued by the Development Budget Coordination Committee (DBCC) pursuant to EO 138, s. 2021


