	He also added that we need to establish a national database for natural resources and requested to give some clarifications regarding these
	concerns.
	Dr. Guiang mentioned that the project is working with the local
	government as active partners in the field like in Siargao – the project
	is working with 9 local government units, BFAR and with the law enforcement. The project is also working with the PAMBs and
	PAMOs for the issuances of resolutions and ordinances.
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	FMB is now working with the USDA and US Forest Service who are
	helping FMB setting up the national level forest reference emission
	baselines.
	Involvement of the DILG is included in the regional SOs as mentioned
	by Mr. Guidote. The project has met with DILG and based on the
	initial discussion the Bureau of Local Government Development and
	the Bureau of Local Government Supervision and they were asking to
	be involved in the project implementation.
	Dr. Guiang also mentioned a big challenge on how to scale down the
	project approaches in order to become effective and efficient so that
	the government partners can continue the process.

	the NCA roadmap. She also mentioned that SIBOL is doing a master



	list for all information needed for NCA and will map out which of these are existing, collected and monitored. DENR relevant existing monitoring systems will be enhanced and identified for those which are not existing as mentioned by Ms. Rosales.
	Ms. Villar mentioned that DENR-KISS has been started training for NCA and requested SIBOL to help them in conceptualization the training to empower their people. DENR KISS, Planning and HRDS will conceptualize and plan a training course to capacitate people from the central office and create a pool of trainors who could go down to the field and teach them on how to do the training.
	She also asked on how SIBOL can do the NCA for forestry, fishery and coral reef as DENR KISS wanted to learn the methodologies or framework that are going to use for this activity
	She also mentioned that DENR KISS wanted to learn on other systems that SIBOL will assist on and introduce including LAWIN so that they can use it as model that can adopt by the DENR
	Policy change using the output of the NCA – DENR KISS requested SIBOL to work with them closely at the policy and on the technology level to adopt the experiences in planning for a policy change and for the systems development.
	Ms. Rosales mentioned that SIBOL will not be able to do all the accounts for all the ecosystem services available. SIBOL will help DENR in the roadmap and to help map out the information needed for the whole ES valuation work. The importance of NCA is to show the trade of what is helpful to the DENR, BFAR and LGUs for decision making.
	Mr. Yap mentioned that SIBOL will do the blue carbon modification protocol during the 1st quarter of FY2023
	Atty. Kabigting mentioned that DENR has a carbon accounting verification and certification system that can measure carbon sequestration after a period of time. He also suggested to upscale the DENR current system in order to produce a tradeable/non-tradeable credit so that the LGU can include this to their investment options, baselining for the carbon stock, allocation on the forestry program and standardization of the data points. He also mentioned that they were already come up with the data points that will need to serve the biodiversity and forestry requirements.
	Ms. Tena mentioned that it is SIBOL commitment to get the value of carbon sequestered in SIBOL sites and this can be replicated in other areas. She also mentioned that DILG, DBM and DOF have an important role and suggested to include them in the ITWG. She also

	Ms. Astrera shared that SIBOL provided support to recognize ICCs and IPs by providing capacity building efforts, they were part of the citizen science training, CapDev Training activities, enjoined them in the development of BDFEs and ensuring that they will be part of the decision-making processes.
	Ms. Tena mentioned that there is a new requirement from USAID for SIBOL on doing social impact assessment in protected areas with IPs and a grievance mechanism in order to have a venue for the local communities and indigenous people.






