163 **I. PRELIMINARIES**

164

165 The RDC secretariat led the preliminaries with the singing of the Philippine National Anthem,
 166 an invocation, and playing of the MIMAROPA Hymn.

167

168 Oath Taking of Special Non-Voting Members of the RDC

169

170 The RDC Chairperson administered the oath of additional special non-voting members of the
 171 RDC MIMAROPA, namely: a) Department of Migrant Workers (DMW) Regional Director
 172 Jonathan A. Gerodias; b) Mindoro State University (MinSU) President Levy B. Arago, Jr.; c)
 173 Occidental Mindoro State College (OMSC) President Elbert C. Edaniol; d) Romblon State
 174 University (RSU) President Merian C. Mani; and e) Marinduque State College (MSC)
 175 President Diosdado P. Zulueta.

176

177 Birthday Greetings

178

179 The RDC secretariat played an audio-visual presentation of birthday greetings for the RDC
 180 official and members who celebrated their birthday during the third quarter of the year.

181

182 The official and members who were present during the meeting include: a) Gov. Jose R.
 183 Riano (Romblon); b) Mayor Angelina F. Tria (Mamburao, Occidental Mindoro); c) PSR
 184 Gemma M. Parcia (MWBPI); and d) EnP Jovenee Sagun (CPDO, Puerto Princesa City).

186 **II. MEETING PROPER**

187

188 **A. Declaration of Quorum**

189

190 The RDC Chairperson, Governor Jose R. Riano of the Provincial Government of Romblon
 191 called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. Acting RDC Secretary, Mr. Bernardino A. Atienza,
 192 Jr., Chief of the Project Development Investment Programming and Budgeting Division
 193 (PDIPBD) of NEDA MIMAROPA called the roll, acknowledged the guests, and informed the
 194 presence of quorum. Of the 53 regular members, 24 were present and 17 were represented,
 195 constituting 77 percent attendance. Among the 29 special non-voting members, 11 were
 196 present and eight were represented, registering 66 percent attendance.

197

198 **B. State of the MIMAROPA Region Address**

199

200 In his second term as RDC MIMAROPA Chairperson, Governor Riano delivered the State of
 201 the Region Address (SORA) highlighting the region's impressive 6.3 percent GRDP growth
 202 rate in 2022, which marked MIMAROPA's recovery and surpassed the highest pre-pandemic
 203 level in 2019 by Php 6 billion.

204

205 MIMAROPA aims to achieve consistent economic growth of 7 percent per year from 2023 to
206 2028. Stable population level of the region will lead to a higher GRDP per capita and a higher
207 budget share per capita. The SORA focused on the achievement of the goals and targets of
208 the MIMAROPA Regional Development Plan (RDP) 2023-2028, which include: a) ending
209 hunger by 2028; b) eradicating poverty by 2039; and c) doubling of GRDP by 2032-2040.

210
211 Governor Riano ended his message with the following key points: a) the pandemic taught
212 MIMAROPA economic resilience and social vulnerabilities; b) maintain the momentum to
213 complete economic recovery; c) sustain high economic growth, control externalities, and
214 strengthen governance; and d) prioritize strategic infrastructure projects to pursue
215 connectivity and create agglomeration economies.

216 217 **C. Messages from the MIMAROPA Governors**

218
219 EnP. Sharlene D. Vilches, the newly appointed Provincial Planning and Development
220 Coordinator of the Provincial Government of Palawan, delivered the message of Palawan
221 Governor Victorino Dennis M. Socrates. The message highlighted his unwavering support
222 to the development initiatives of the RDC in making the MIMAROPA region "*The Destination*
223 *of Choice*", particularly on the strategic infrastructure development projects, which include
224 the Busuanga Airport Development Project, Coron-Culion Inter-Island Bridges, Puerto
225 Princesa Viaduct, improvement of transportation system, tourism program, and livelihood
226 projects in the province of Palawan and the rest of the region.

227
228 Likewise, Mr. John Paul C. Ramos, representative of Occidental Mindoro Governor Eduardo
229 B. Gadiano read his message. In his message, Governor Gadiano congratulated the RDC
230 for all the hard work, dedication, and perseverance which produced good results. As
231 highlighted in the SORA of the RDC Chairperson, the region's development is a collaborative
232 undertaking of all the various stakeholders. He encouraged everyone to do more and contribute
233 to nation building despite all the challenges.

234
235 Moreover, EnP. Marian Cunanan, Provincial Planning and Development Coordinator of the
236 Provincial Government of Marinduque, relayed the message of Marinduque Governor Presbitero
237 J. Velasco, Jr., to continuously work hand in hand for a better and brighter future for all the
238 MIMAROPAns. The snapshot of the region's state and prospects not only shows substantial
239 contributions but also lays the groundwork for addressing the anticipated long term development
240 of the MIMAROPA region.

241 242 **D. Proposed Agenda**

243
244 The RDC Vice Chairperson and NEDA MIMAROPA Regional Director Agustin C. Mendoza
245 presented the provisional agenda with the following modification: a) agenda items number
246 14, and 15, will be discussed first as requested by the RRDIC Chairperson and DOST
247 Regional Director Ma. Josefina P. Abilay; b) followed by agenda items under the economic
248 development committee (EDC), which will be presented by the EDC Chairperson, Boac
249 Mayor Armi D.C. Carrion and the EDC Secretary, Mr. Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., and c)
250 agenda items under the development administration committee, which will be presented by
251 the RDC Vice Chairperson.

252
253 On a motion duly seconded, the provisional agenda was approved and adopted.

254
255 Similarly, the Council also agreed and approved the inclusion of the following agenda items
256 as part of the other matters, namely: a) Update on the status of establishment of additional (or
257 mobile) emission testing centers in Marinduque by LTO and DOTr; b) Update on the status of

258 projects proposed by indigenous peoples of Occidental and Oriental Mindoro; and c) Update on
259 the issue of Batangas Port affecting passengers of Romblon, Oriental Mindoro, and Occidental
260 Mindoro.

261

262 **E. Approval of the Minutes of the Previous Meeting**

263

264 Regional Director Ricky L. Sanchez of DBM MIMAROPA moved to dispense with the reading of
265 the minutes of the 82nd RDC full council meeting held on 02 June 2023 since copies of the
266 reference folder were transmitted to all the members before the meeting.

267

268 On a motion duly seconded, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

269

270 **F. Matters Arising from the Minutes of Previous Meeting**

271

272 Acting Secretary Atienza informed the Council that all matters discussed during the previous
273 RDC meeting were favorably and affirmatively acted upon, except on the concern of
274 passengers in Batangas Port which will be tackled in the next SRNH inter-agency committee
275 meeting in November. He also reported on the status of ten resolutions passed and provided
276 updates on the transmittal of project endorsements to the concerned national and regional
277 agencies, local government units and other concerned entities.

278

279 The matters arising from the minutes of the previous meeting were noted.

280

281 **G. Matters for Approval/Endorsement/Confirmation**

282

283 **NEW BUSINESS**

284

285 • **RESEED Program: Establishment of MIMAROPA Ventures and Innovation Network**
286 **(MVINET)**

287

288 The Regional Research, Development and Innovation Committee (RRDIC) Chairperson,
289 Regional Director Ma. Josefina P. Abilay of DOST MIMAROPA, presented the Regional
290 Startup Enablers for Ecosystem Development (RESEED) Program: Establishment of
291 MIMAROPA Ventures and Innovation Network (MVINET). The project intends to establish
292 the regional startup ecosystem consortium towards a stronger Philippine startup ecosystem.
293 It aims to: a) organize a regional startup ecosystem consortium; b) create, establish, and
294 implement a regional startup development program; c) implement a skills enhancement
295 program for the technology business incubator (TBI) team and other startup enablers; d)
296 establish a pool of mentors and conduct membership programs; e) develop strategies to
297 promote the startup programs of various funding agencies; and f) implement collaborative
298 programs/activities.

299

300 Director Abilay mentioned that the MVINET consortium is envisioned as one large single
301 MIMAROPA network of incubators, facilities, and ecosystem which shall be composed of
302 startup enablers, such as TBIs, academic institutions, government institutions, local
303 government units, other potential partners/investors/funders, and international networks.

304

305 She added that the RRDIC members, as the initial startup enablers of the MVINET
306 consortium, fully supported the establishment of the MVINET and the implementation of its
307 proposed activities.

308

309 The RRDIC, during its third quarter meeting in Makati, passed RRDIC Resolution No. 12, s.
310 2023 favorably recommending RDC approval of the said proposal.

311
312 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution strengthening the Startup Ecosystem in MIMAROPA
313 through the RESEED Program: Establishment of the MIMAROPA Ventures and Innovation
314 Network (MVINET) was approved.

315
316 • **Establishment of Petroleum Engineering Research and Development Center**

317
318 Director Abilay presented the proposed establishment of Center for Upstream Petroleum
319 Engineering Research, Development, Innovation, and Sustainability in the province of
320 Palawan.

321
322 The establishment of Petroleum Engineering R&D Innovation and Sustainability center in the
323 region intends to: a) establish an enhanced petroleum exploration workflow from basin
324 evaluation, petroleum system, exploration play fairways mapping through prospect
325 maturation, and drilling; b) develop an enhanced reservoir characterization workflow using
326 hybrid methods; c) produce some oil and gas industry-standard proppants through waste
327 upcycling and utilization; and d) yield waste-derived nano-absorbents for oil spill remediation
328 and recovery. The center will be a great boost not only in the Petroleum Engineering
329 Research Development Extension of Palawan State University (PSU), but also in the industry
330 as a whole.

331
332 Director Abilay further said that the creation of the center is aligned with the MIMAROPA
333 Regional Research and Development Agenda (MRDA) 2023-2025, which was approved by
334 the RDC through Resolution No. 2022-080-1111. She added that the establishment of the
335 center will be part of the Niche Centers in the Region (NICER), one of the sub-programs of
336 Science for Change Program (S4CP) Bill or House Bill 4581, which was also supported by
337 the RDC through Resolution No. 2021-076-1012.

338
339 The RRDIC, during its second quarter meeting held on 03 May 2023 in Makati City, passed
340 RRDIC Resolution No. 10, s. 2023 favorably recommending RDC approval of the said
341 proposed project.

342
343 On a motion duly seconded, the establishment of Petroleum Engineering Research and
344 Development Center in the province of Palawan was approved.

345
346 • **Proposed Pang-Agraryong Tulay Para Sa Bagong Bayanihan Ng Mga Magsasaka**
347 **(PBBM) Bridges Project**

348
349 The EDC Chairperson, Mayor Armi D.C. Carrion of Boac, Marinduque presented the
350 MIMAROPA component of the proposed PBBM Bridges project. Department of Agrarian
351 Reform (DAR) MIMAROPA requested RDC endorsement of the project to the NEDA
352 Investment Coordination Committee (ICC). PBBM Bridges is a nationwide project to be
353 implemented in five years from 2024 until 2028, with an estimated total project cost of PhP
354 28.24 billion, 85 percent of which is proposed for ODA funding.

355
356 The proposed project aims to construct 350 well-designed modular steel permanent bridges
357 in the identified sites within or near the agrarian reform communities (ARCs) throughout the
358 country. It will also respond to the rising needs of ARCs for better climate resilient and
359 efficient transportation systems, which can contribute to the attainment of food security,
360 expansion of growth centers, and improvement of farmers' income and productivity.

361

362 For MIMAROPA, there are 34 bridges included amounting to PhP 3.02 billion, with the
363 following provincial distribution: a) Marinduque, 10 bridges with a total of 325 linear meter
364 amounting to PhP 874.16 million; b) Occidental Mindoro, 5 bridges with a total of 119 linear
365 meter amounting to PhP 320.09 million; c) Oriental Mindoro, 2 bridges with a total of 50 linear
366 meter amounting to PhP 134.49 million; d) Palawan, 14 bridges with a total of 513 linear
367 meter amounting to PhP 1.42 billion; and e) Romblon, 3 bridges with a total of 104 linear
368 meter amounting to PhP 279.74 million.

369
370 Mayor Carrion reported that DAR MIMAROPA already submitted the necessary documents
371 to the Secretariat, such as SP/PDC resolution of all the MIMAROPA provinces, and the duly
372 accomplished validation forms, wherein gender-disaggregated data relative to the agrarian
373 reform beneficiaries were provided. The EDC during its third quarter meeting held on 03
374 August 2023 reviewed and favorably recommended RDC endorsement of the proposed
375 PBBM bridges project of DAR.

376
377 Fr. Edwin A. Gariguez of the Mangyan Mission, Inc. requested the inclusion of bridge in
378 Barangay Palhi, Calapan City, Oriental Mindoro, while Boac Mayor Carrion requested
379 additional bridges in the Municipality of Boac in the list of priority bridges to be constructed
380 under the PBBM project. DAR MIMAROPA will validate the inclusion of the requested
381 additional bridges.

382
383 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution favorably endorsing the MIMAROPA component of
384 the proposed PBBM Bridges of the DAR to the NEDA ICC was approved.

385
386 • **Proposed Inclusion of the Verde Island Passage in the Expanded National**
387 **Integrated Protected Areas System (ENIPAS).**

388
389 The EDC Chairperson presented the Verde Island Passage (VIP) to be included in the
390 ENIPAS. VIP is part of the Coral Triangle and is regarded by experts as the *Center of the*
391 *center of marine shore fish biodiversity* with the highest concentration of more than 1,736
392 species of fish, 338 species of corals, and thousands of other marine species. It is located in
393 the coastal areas, islands, and waters within the five provinces of Oriental Mindoro,
394 Occidental Mindoro, Marinduque, Romblon, and Batangas.

395
396 The proposed inclusion of VIP in the ENIPAS, shall adhere to the process under RA 11038
397 or ENIPAS Act, a policy to protect and conserve the area. The overall objective of protection
398 under the ENIPAS Act is to secure the perpetual existence of native plants and animals for
399 the present and future generations.

400
401 Mayor Carrion said that the management of VIP shall require the formulation of a general
402 management planning strategy and zoning such as: a) strict protection zones; b) buffer
403 zones; c) habitat conservation and rehabilitation; d) biodiversity management; e) cultural
404 zones; f) community organizing; and g) socioeconomic and scientific research zones.

405
406 She added that the EDC, during its third quarter meeting held on 03 August 2023, reviewed
407 and favorably recommended RDC endorsement of the proposed inclusion of the VIP in the
408 ENIPAS. Likewise, the Committee recommended the following: a) the infrastructure facilities
409 such as those major programs and projects identified in the Public Investment Program (PIP),
410 Regional Development Plan (RDP), Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP), and
411 Luzon Spatial Development Framework (LSDF) be allowed under special uses category; b)
412 the agriculture, tourism, extraction activities, and other livelihood activities be allowed in the

413 settlement, traditional, and agricultural areas; and c) RDC MIMAROPA will be included in the
414 consultation process to be undertaken relative to the inclusion of the VIP in the ENIPAS.

415
416 Fr. Edwin A. Gariguez of the Mangyan Mission, Inc. requested to remove specifically the
417 phrase “extraction activities” in the resolution as it contradicts the purpose of the VIP.

418
419 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution favorably endorsing the inclusion of the Verde Island
420 Passage (VIP) as part of the ENIPAs was approved.

421
422 • **MIMAROPA Regional Physical Framework Plan (RPFP) 2021-2050 Planning**
423 **Committees**

424
425 On behalf of the DAC Chairperson Mayor Marilou F. Morillo and DAC Co-Chairperson Mr.
426 Darius M. Guerrero, the RDC Vice Chairperson and NEDA MIMAROPA Regional Director
427 Agustin C. Mendoza presented the proposed creation of MIMAROPA RPFP 2021-2050
428 Planning Committees.

429
430 RD Mendoza mentioned the two legal basis of the RPFP: 1) Letter of Instruction No. 1350,
431 s.1983, “*Providing for the Institutional Framework for National Physical Planning*”; 2)
432 Executive Order No. 770, s. 2008 (Section 6), “*Reorganization of the Regional Land Use*
433 *Committee in accordance with the Institutional Framework for National Physical Planning*”.
434 The RPFP offers a strategic and long-term perspective on the development of the region
435 within the next three decades. It contains policies to guide decisions on the best use of land
436 and natural resources for the people.

437
438 The MIMAROPA RPFP is aligned with the National Physical Framework Plan (NPFP), Luzon
439 Spatial Development Framework (LSDF), and Visayas Spatial Development Framework
440 (VSDF). It shall integrate the MIMAROPA Regional Spatial Strategy contained in the
441 MIMAROPA RDP 2023-2028 to guide the provinces in the formulation of their respective
442 provincial spatial strategies, physical frameworks, and other local development plans.

443
444 The proposed RPFP Planning Committees are: a) Development Administration Committee
445 (land use/physical/institutional development), to be chaired by Calapan City Mayor Marilou
446 F. Morillo; b) Economic Development Committee (economic/environmental management), to
447 be chaired by Boac Mayor Armi D.C. Carrion; c) Social Development Committee
448 (settlement/social development), to be chaired by Bongabong Mayor Elegio A. Malaluan; and
449 d) Infrastructure Development Committee (infrastructure development), to be chaired by
450 Marinduque Governor Presbitero J. Velasco, Jr.

451
452 The RDC Secretariat shall assist the Planning Committees in data collection, situational
453 analysis, and strategy formulation for the four land uses, namely: a) settlements; b)
454 production; c) protection; and d) infrastructure.

455
456 The Regional Land Use Committee (RLUC) MIMAROPA, during its second quarter meeting
457 on 17 May 2023, passed RLUC Resolution No. 01, s. 2023, creating the MIMAROPA RPFP
458 2021-2050 planning committees.

459
460 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution approving the creation of MIMAROPA Regional
461 Physical Framework Plan 2021-2050 Planning Committees was approved.

462
463 • **Amendment of EO 325, series of 1996**

465 RD Mendoza presented the proposed amendment of Executive Order No. 325, s. 1996,
466 *“Reorganization of the Regional Development Councils (RDCs)”*.

467
468 Article X Section 14 of the 1987 Constitution of the Republic of the Philippines provides that
469 the President shall create RDCs and other similar bodies composed of local government
470 officials, regional heads of departments and other government offices and representatives
471 from non-governmental organizations within the regions.

472
473 RDCs were created to decentralize the administration of the regions, strengthen the
474 autonomy of the local government units, and accelerate socio-economic development of the
475 regions.

476
477 The establishment of RDCs in all regions was through the Letter of Implementation No. 22
478 issued on 31 December 1972. Thereafter, several executive orders were issued to improve
479 the structure and functions of the RDCs. EO 325, s. 1996 was the latest issuance for the
480 reorganization of the RDCs.

481
482 The Regional Development Group (RDG) of the NEDA initiated the crafting of proposed
483 amendments as among the contents of a draft EO repealing EO 325, s. 1996. The proposed
484 amendment seeks to rationalize the structure and operations of the RDC relative to laws and
485 executive issuances issued after EO 325, s. 1996 and to further reorganize and strengthen
486 the RDCs.

487
488 The proposed amendments are the following: a) Section 1- (f) Regular Members, inclusion
489 of CHED, DOE, DOF-BLGF, DHSUD, DMW, CDA, NCIP and other agencies that the RDCs
490 deem critical to the development of their respective regions; b) Section 3.c, Provision of
491 Honoraria for the PSRs; c) Section 11, Creation of other Committees, as the RDC may deem
492 necessary or as may be prescribed by laws; d) Section 14- Meetings, the RDC may adopt its
493 own rules on constituting quorum; e) Section 21, Vacancy and Succession of the RDC
494 Chairperson and Co-Chairperson; e) Section 24, the IRR; f) Section 25, Manual of
495 Operations; and g) Section 7, Feedback Mechanism on RDC endorsed PAPs.

496
497 RD Mendoza said that the RDC sectoral committees, during the third quarter meetings held
498 on 03-04 August 2023, reviewed the proposed amendments of EO 325, s. 1996, and
499 favorably recommended RDC support.

500
501 RD Ricky L. Sanchez of Department of Budget and Management (DBM) MIMAROPA
502 suggested to seek the position of the DBM particularly on the provision of honoraria for the
503 private sector representatives.

504
505 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution supporting the proposed amendments of EO 325,
506 series of 1996 was approved.

507
508 • **PAMANA Projects of Occidental Mindoro**

509
510 The Payapa at Masaganang Pamayanan (PAMANA) program is the government’s peace and
511 development convergence program, which extends development interventions to
512 communities in isolated, hard-to-reach conflict-affected and conflict-vulnerable areas.

513
514 RD Mendoza reported that Mayor Walter B. Marquez of the Municipality of Sablayan in
515 Occidental Mindoro requested RDC endorsement of the following six proposed projects

516 amounting to PhP 136.8 million to the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace,
517 Reconciliation and Unity (OPAPRU) for funding under the PAMANA Program, namely: 1)
518 Concreting of Calamansian Farm to Market Road in Brgy. San Agustin, amounting to PhP
519 53.0 million; 2) Solar-Powered Potable Water System in Brgy. Batongbuhay, amounting to
520 PhP 5.30 million; 3) Solar-Powered Potable Water System in Brgy. Tuban, amounting to PhP
521 5.30 million; 4) Solar-Powered Potable Water Expansion in Brgy. Pag-asa, amounting to PhP
522 5.0 million; 5) Solar-Powered Irrigation System in Brgy. Burgos, amounting to PhP 35.0
523 million; and 6) Solar-Powered Irrigation System in Brgy. Ligaya, amounting to PhP 35.0
524 million.

525
526 The proposed projects are consistent with the strategies set in the Philippine Development
527 Plan 2023-2028 and MIMAROPA Regional Development Plan 2023-2028.

528
529 The Development Administration Committee, during its third quarter meeting held on 03
530 August 2023, reviewed the proposed projects of the municipality of Sablayan in Occidental
531 Mindoro and favorably recommended RDC endorsement to OPAPRU for funding under the
532 PAMANA Program.

533
534 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution favorably endorsing the proposed PAMANA projects
535 of the Municipality of Sablayan in Occidental Mindoro was approved.

536

537 • **MIMAROPA Top 30 Priority Programs and Projects**

538

539 Mr. Bernardino A. Atienza, Jr., Chief of the Project Development Investment Programming
540 and Budgeting Division (PDIPBD) of NEDA MIMAROPA, presented the region's top 30
541 priority programs and projects.

542

543 As a backgrounder, Mr. Atienza stated that on 13 June 2023, NEDA issued a memorandum
544 regarding the conduct of the Regional-National Investment Programming (RNIP) Dialogue.
545 The Dialogue aims to facilitate the alignment of priority regional programs and projects
546 (PAPs) to the national priorities, specifically, priority PAPs from the Regional Development
547 Investment Program (RDIP) will be included in the updated Public Investment Program (PIP).
548 The inclusion of priority PAPs in the PIP would strengthen its inclusion in the National
549 Expenditure Program (NEP), and subsequently to ensure budget allocation in the General
550 Appropriate Act (GAA).

551

552 A total of 35 priority PAPs were identified for the MIMAROPA region, 14 PAPs are for
553 regionwide implementation, and two PAPs will be implemented in the whole province of
554 Palawan. The 35 priority PAPs has a total investment requirements of PhP 70.73 billion. The
555 infrastructure sector got the highest investment requirements amounting to PhP 36.91 billion;
556 followed by the social sector with PhP 24.94 billion; economic sector with PhP 8.81 billion;
557 and the development administration sector with PhP 72.94 million.

558

559 Mr. Atienza mentioned that the top five agencies with the highest total investment
560 requirements are the following: a) DPWH, with eight PAPs, amounting to PhP 10.81 billion;
561 b) DSWD, with three PAPs, amounting to PhP 14.94 billion; c) DOTr, with two PAPs,
562 amounting to PhP 14.09 billion; d) DA, with five PAPs, amounting to PhP 8.16 billion; and e)
563 DepED, with three PAPs, amounting to PhP 6.36 billion.

564

565 He added that the EDC, during its third quarter meeting held on 03 August 2023, reviewed
566 and favorably recommended RDC endorsement of MIMAROPA Top 30 Priority Programs
567 and Projects.

568
569 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution favorably endorsing the top 30 priority programs
570 and projects of MIMAROPA region was approved.

571
572 • **Renewable Energy Exploration**

573
574 On behalf of the IDC Chairperson, Marinduque Governor Presbitero J. Velasco, Jr., the RDC
575 Vice Chairperson presented the proposed Renewable Energy Exploitation and Suitability
576 Assessment (REESA) Project for the MIMAROPA region.

577
578 RD Mendoza reported that the Romblon State University (RSU) through the Regional
579 Research, Development and Innovation Committee (RRDIC) submitted a project proposal
580 titled: "*Renewable Energy Resource Explorations and Suitability Assessment (REESA)*
581 *Project in MIMAROPA Region*".

582
583 The proposal intends to: a) analyze the topographical suitability characteristics of solar and
584 wind power resources using Geographical Information System-Multicriteria Decision Analysis
585 (GIS-MCDA) and Analytical Hierarchy Process (APH) Technique; and b) analyze the existing
586 power system and optimize available conventional and renewable resources using National
587 Renewable Energy Laboratory's (NREL) Hybrid Optimization of Multiple Energy Resources
588 (HOMER) Pro simulation software.

589
590 The estimated total project cost of the proposal is at Php 25.19 million, proposed for funding
591 through the Philippine Council for Industry, Energy, and Emerging Technology Research and
592 Development (PCCIERD) of the Department of Science and Technology, and target
593 implementation is within two years.

594
595 RD Mendoza stated that once the project is implemented, it would: a) evaluate the potential
596 for renewable energy generation in the region and helps determine the feasibility and
597 practicality of renewable energy projects; b) evaluate the physical characteristics and
598 features of the land surface to identify areas suitable for energy resource exploitation; c)
599 ensure that energy resources are optimally utilized; and d) determine the most suitable areas
600 for energy production.

601
602 He added that the project would also: a) increase capacity in renewable energy sources in
603 the region; b) reduce cost in the conduct of exploration and feasibility studies; c) increase
604 energy mix from mostly sourced diesel-fired power plants; and d) foster institutional
605 partnership that will facilitate investments and development of the renewable energy
606 resources.

607
608 The IDC, during its third quarter meeting held on 04 August 2023 in Quezon City, reviewed
609 the proposed REESA Project and favorably recommended RDC endorsement to the DOST-
610 Philippine Council for Industry, Energy and Emerging Technology Research and
611 Development (PCIEERD) for funding support.

612
613 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution approving and adopting Renewable Energy
614 Exploitation and Suitability Assessment (REESA) Project for MIMAROPA and favorably
615 endorsing it to DOST-PCIEERD for funding support was approved.

616
617 • **OPT Plus Implementation for High Prevalence Malnutrition**

618

619 The SDC Chairperson, Mayor Elegio A. Malaluan of Bongabong, Oriental Mindoro, presented
620 the proposal to enjoin local government units in MIMAROPA to provide the prescribed
621 anthropometric measurement tools for Operation Timbang (OPT) Plus and enhance the
622 capacity of barangay nutrition scholars and members of the OPT Plus Team.

623
624 Operation Timbang Plus (OPT+) is an annual program that measures the weight, height,
625 length, and mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) of all children aged 0 to 59 months in a
626 community. The OPT+ results are used to assess the: a) nutritional status of children; b)
627 identify families with malnourished children; c) determine priority areas for program planning;
628 and d) monitor nutrition trends. To ensure accuracy, trained OPT+ teams should measure
629 the anthropometric indicators.

630
631 Mayor Malaluan said that the National Nutrition Council (NNC) Governing Board has issued
632 guidelines on OPT+ implementation, including the fabrication, verification, and maintenance
633 of height boards. Anthropometric measurement tools should be calibrated every three years
634 and verified annually. LGUs are encouraged to allocate local funds for OPT+ and overall
635 nutrition improvement programs.

636
637 He further said that the recommended weighing scales and length/height boards for the
638 conduct of the OPT Plus are a) hanging infant weighing scale; b) hanging digital scale; c)
639 digital scale; d) digital taring scale; e) mechanical column scale; and f) length/height board.
640 The stadiometer, microtoise, mobile measuring mat, and MUAC tapes are also used to
641 measure the upper arm of children.

642
643 The RNC, during its joint meeting with the TWG, passed a resolution enjoining all the local
644 government units in MIMAROPA to provide prescribed anthropometric measurement tools
645 for use in the Operation Timbang Plus and capacitate the barangay nutrition scholars
646 including the members of the operation OPT plus team. Likewise, the SDC, during its third
647 quarter meeting held on 04 August 2023, reviewed the said proposal and favorably
648 recommended RDC approval on the passage of a parallel resolution.

649
650 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution enjoining local government units in MIMAROPA to
651 provide the prescribed anthropometric measurement tools for Operation Timbang (OPT) plus
652 and enhance the capacity of barangay nutrition scholars and members of the OPT plus team
653 was approved.

654
655 • **PNVSCA Key Programs, Activities and Projects (PAPs)**

656
657 The SDC Chairperson presented the Philippine National Volunteer Service Coordinating
658 Agency (PNVSCA) key programs, activities, and projects (PAPs) in the MIMAROPA region.

659
660 The PNVSCA is further mandated by the Volunteer Act of 2007 to be the government agency
661 responsible for promoting and coordinating volunteerism in the Philippines. It is one of the
662 agencies attached to the NEDA. The agency collaborates with government and non-
663 government organizations to ensure the alignment of volunteer efforts with national priorities,
664 prioritizing marginalized sectors and communities, and takes the lead in promoting and
665 recognizing the contributions of volunteers to nation-building and international cooperation.

666
667 Mayor Malaluan mentioned that among the notable programs and initiatives of PNVSCA are
668 the a) National Volunteer Month; b) Search for Outstanding Volunteers; c) designation of
669 volunteerism focal person in local government units; and d) Development Partnership Forum.
670 These programs and activities are designed to recognize the contributions of volunteers,

671 enhance the skills and knowledge of individuals and organizations, and facilitate partnerships
672 between volunteers and communities in need of their services.

673
674 He further stated that the SDC, during its third quarter meeting on 04 August 2023, reviewed
675 the key PAPs of PNVSCA and favorably recommended RDC approval to institutionalize
676 volunteerism as a development strategy by local government units, regional line agencies,
677 state universities and colleges, and stakeholders in the MIMAROPA region.

678
679 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution enjoining the local government units, regional line
680 agencies, state universities and colleges to institutionalize volunteerism as a development
681 strategy in the MIMAROPA region was approved.

682
683 • **Magna Carta for Child Development Workers**

684
685 The SDC Chairperson presented the proposed support to the Magna Carta of Child
686 Development Workers.

687
688 Article II, Section 13, of the 1987 Constitution mandates the State to promote and protect the
689 well-being of children. Several laws mandate the establishment of daycare centers and the
690 provision of consultative services for children. Daycare workers ensure the safety, health,
691 and well-being of young children in their care by implementing laws and regulations related
692 to childcare and creating nurturing environments for children.

693
694 Mayor Malaluan reported that RDC Region I, during its third quarter full council meeting held
695 on 28 September 2022, passed Resolution No. 70, s. 2022, supporting the immediate
696 approval of House Bill 6550, “An Act Instituting the Magna Carta of Day Care Workers and
697 Providing Funds Therefor.” He said that the daycare workers face several challenges,
698 including low salaries, lack of benefits, and limited opportunities for professional
699 development, especially those from the geographically isolated and disadvantage areas
700 (GIDAs).

701
702 He added that the Magna Carta of Day Care Workers aims to promote and protect the welfare
703 of day care workers, who play a critical role in providing early childhood care and education
704 to young children. Several key strategies in the MIMAROPA RDP 2023-2028 from both the
705 education and social protection chapters focus on the well-being of children, which the Magna
706 Carta of Day Care Workers would help address by recognizing the importance of providing
707 quality early childhood education to all children in the region.

708
709 The SDC, during its third quarter meeting on 04 August 2023, reviewed and favorably
710 recommended RDC support of the said proposal.

711
712 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution supporting the Magna Carta for Child Development
713 Workers was approved.

714
715 • **Chairperson of RGADC MIMAROPA**

716
717 The RDC Vice Chairperson presented the confirmation of the election of Regional Director
718 Marie Grace T. Pascua of the NCIP MIMAROPA as the Chairperson of the Regional Gender
719 and Development Committee (RGADC) MIMAROPA.

720
721 RD Mendoza stated that the RDC approved the creation of the RGADC through a resolution
722 during its first quarter full council meeting held on 20 March 2018. Furthermore, during its

723 third quarter meeting on 03 September 2021, the RDC passed a resolution confirming the
724 members of the RGADC pursuant to the Joint Memorandum Circular No. 2016-01 of NEDA
725 and the PCW in the selection of members of the RGADC MIMAROPA. Based on the JMC,
726 which provides for the guidelines for the creation, strengthening, and institutionalization of an
727 RGADC under the RDC, the Committee shall have a Chairperson and a Co-Chairperson as
728 officers.

729
730 The RGADC during its third quarter meeting held on 23 September 2022, Regional Director
731 Marie Grace T. Pascua of the NCIP MIMAROPA was elected as Chairperson of the RGADC
732 MIMAROPA and favorably recommended RDC confirmation.

733
734 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution confirming the election of Regional Director Marie
735 Grace T. Pascua of the NCIP MIMAROPA as the Chairperson of the RGADC MIMAROPA
736 was approved.

737
738 • **Co-Chairperson of RGADC MIMAROPA**

739
740 The RGADC Chairperson, NCIP MIMAROPA Regional Director Marie Grace T. Pascua,
741 presented the confirmation of the election of Regional Director Leonardo C. Reynoso of the
742 DSWD MIMAROPA as the Co-Chairperson of the RGADC MIMAROPA.

743
744 RD Pascua said that the RDC approved the creation of the RGADC through a resolution
745 during its first quarter full council meeting held on 20 March 2018. Furthermore, the RDC,
746 during its third quarter meeting on 03 September 2021, passed a resolution confirming the
747 members of the RGADC MIMAROPA pursuant to the Joint Memorandum Circular of NEDA
748 and the PCW in the selection of members of the RGADC MIMAROPA. Based on the JMC,
749 which provides for the guidelines for the creation, strengthening, and institutionalization of an
750 RGADC under the RDC, the Committee shall have a Chairperson and a Co-Chairperson as
751 officers.

752
753 She further cited that during the RGADC 3rd quarter meeting held on 23 September 2022,
754 WPU President Julie Hope Timotea P. Evina was elected as Co-Chairperson. However, the
755 position of RGADC Co-Chairperson was declared vacant upon the retirement of President
756 Evina on 01 June 2023.

757
758 She added that the RGADC during its special meeting held on 23 August 2023 via video
759 conference, Regional Director Leonardo C. Reynoso of the DSWD MIMAROPA was elected
760 as the new Co-Chairperson of the RGADC MIMAROPA and favorably recommended RDC
761 confirmation.

762
763 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution confirming the election of Regional Director
764 Leonardo C. Reynoso of the DSWD MIMAROPA as the Co-Chairperson of the RGADC
765 MIMAROPA was approved.

766
767 • **Chairperson of RPGRP Screening Committee**

768
769 The RGADC Chairperson presented the confirmation of the election of Regional Director
770 Reynaldo O. Wong of the CPD MIMAROPA (formerly POPCOM) as the Chairperson of the
771 Regional Pool of Gender and Development Resource Persons (RPGRP) Screening
772 Committee of the RGADC.

773

774 The Screening Committee of the RPGRP was created on 03 September 2021, through RDC
775 Resolution No. 2021-076-1015. The RPGRP Screening Committee leads the process of
776 application, shortlisting, and levelling session of applicants. The certification of the RPGRP
777 is one of the activities specified in the Strategic Plan 2020-2025 of the RGADC MIMAROPA
778 to address the issue on the limited number of GAD experts in the region.

779
780 RD Pascua said that upon the retirement of RPGRP Screening Committee Chairperson and
781 WPU President Julie Hope Timotea P. Evina, the position of RPGRP Screening Committee
782 Chairperson was vacant effective 01 June 2023.

783
784 She added that the RGADC during its special meeting held on 23 August 2023 via video
785 conference, Regional Director Reynaldo O. Wong of the Commission on Population and
786 Development (CPD) MIMAROPA was elected as Chairperson of the RPGRP Screening
787 Committee and favorably recommended RDC confirmation.

788
789 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution confirming the election of Regional Director
790 Reynaldo O. Wong of the CPD MIMAROPA as the Chairperson of the of the Regional Pool
791 of Gender and Development Resource Persons (RPGRP) Screening Committee of the
792 RGADC MIMAROPA was approved.

793
794 • **RGADC MIMAROPA and PCW Partnership Agreement**

795
796 The RGADC Chairperson presented the Partnership Agreement made and entered into by
797 and between the RGADC MIMAROPA and the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW).

798
799 As a backgrounder, the RDC approved the creation of the RGADC during its first quarter full
800 council meeting held on 20 March 2018. Furthermore, the RDC approved the partnership
801 agreement by and between the PCW and the RGADC MIMAROPA in the implementation of
802 gender and development mainstreaming activities in the region through an RDC resolution
803 on 06 September 2019. The three-year partnership agreement was approved to facilitate the
804 collaboration between PCW and RGADC MIMAROPA in promoting the region's GAD
805 mainstreaming efforts. The agreement expired on 27 December 2022.

806
807 On 25 May 2023, an assessment meeting was conducted to evaluate the possibility of
808 renewing the partnership between the parties and share learning experiences on the
809 implementation of the annual work plans. During the said meeting, the PCW also presented
810 the accomplishments and best practices of the RGADC MIMAROPA. The RGADC during its
811 third quarter meeting held on 28 July 2023 approved the partnership agreement by and
812 between the PCW and RGADC MIMAROPA and favorably recommended RDC confirmation
813 of the said agreement.

814
815 On a motion duly seconded, a resolution confirming the partnership agreement made and
816 entered into by and between the RGADC MIMAROPA and the PCW was approved.

817
818 • **2023 MIMAROPA Regional Development Report Guidelines**

819
820 Engr. Amalia F. Santiago, OIC-Chief of the Project Monitoring and Evaluation Division
821 (PMED) of NEDA MIMAROPA presented the 2023 MIMAROPA Regional Development
822 Report (RDR) Guidelines.

823
824 The MIMAROPA Regional Development Plan (RDP) 2023-2028 will be implemented through
825 policies, programs, projects and activities as contained in the Regional Development

826 Investment Program (RDIP) 2023-2028. The monitoring of the plan will be done annually
827 through the Regional Development Report (RDR). Results matrices in each chapter of the
828 RDP provides for the monitoring and evaluation of the plan in a given period. The indicators
829 with targets are assessed on how they contribute to the overall achievement of the Plan.
830

831 Engr. Santiago said that the MIMAROPA RDR together with the RPMES provides for the
832 monitoring and evaluation of the plan within its six-year implementation period. It also
833 provides strategic and policy direction to refocus priorities and/or catch-up with targets, as
834 may be necessary. The bases in the evaluation of the performance of the region for the
835 beginning of plan target and its transition to the current President Marcos administration are
836 the accomplishment reports and other sectoral inputs of agency regional offices (AROs),
837 state universities and colleges (SUCs), government owned and controlled corporations
838 (GOCCs), local government units (LGUs), and private sector representatives (PSRs).
839

840 The 2023 RDR preparation guidelines shall undergo early preparation to capture the latest
841 developments, trends, and data relevant to the region. It shall be prepared using the most
842 recent available data from the first three quarters of 2023. In the final/fourth quarter of 2023,
843 the report shall be vetted by relevant approving bodies for verification, validation, and
844 approval. Consistent with the Socio-Economic Report (SER) and the MIMAROPA RDP 2023-
845 2028, the 2023 MIMAROPA RDR shall contain 17 chapters. Inputs/reports from the agencies
846 concerned and stakeholders will also be used in the preparation of the RDR.
847

848 Engr. Santiago also presented the schedule of activities in preparation of the report which
849 includes: a) submission of inputs from the concerned agencies; b) conduct of technical
850 writeshop; c) presentation to the sectoral committee meetings for any additional
851 comments/inputs; and d) final draft for approval of the RDC on 01 December 2023. She
852 added that the target date for dissemination of the said report will be on February 2024 to
853 coincide with the Budget Review.
854

855 The sectoral committees of the RDC MIMAROPA during their third quarter meetings held on
856 03-04 August reviewed and favorably recommended RDC approval of the proposed
857 guidelines.
858

859 On a motion duly seconded, the 2023 Regional Development Report Preparation Guidelines
860 was approved.
861

862 **H. Matters for Information**

863 **• Effects of El Niño and its Mitigating Measures**

864 Engr. Maria Teresa B. Carido, representative of DA MIMAROPA Regional Director Maria
865 Christine C. Inting, briefly presented the strategies to mitigate the effects of El Niño in the
866 region.
867
868

869 For the vulnerable rice and corn areas, the following activities were conducted: a) reactivation
870 of El Niño Task Force; b) conduct of Regional Coordination Meetings; c) Information
871 Awareness Campaign; d) provision of water pumps and engines; and e) buffer stocking of
872 rice and corn seeds. To maximize the production in non-vulnerable areas, the following
873 activities were also conducted: a) provision of seeds and planting materials; b) provision of
874 fertilizers and soil ameliorants; c) provision of pumps and engine sets; and d) provision of
875 flower inducers.
876
877

878 Engr. Carido also reported the Fuel Assistance to Farmers (FAF) Project and the Rice
879 Farmers Financial Assistance (RFFA) of DA. The FAF project aims to provide fuel assistance
880 to eligible beneficiaries who own or rent agricultural machineries used for crop production.
881 Each farmer-recipient will receive a DA Intervention Monitoring Card with fuel assistance
882 amounting to PhP 3,000.00. The project will be implemented in partnership with the
883 Development Bank of the Philippine (DBP) and its accredited FinTech partners. On the other
884 hand, the RFFA aims to provide cash assistance to smallholder RSBSA-registered rice
885 farmers tilling rice lands of two hectares and below. Each eligible recipient will receive cash
886 assistance of PhP 5,000.00. This will be implemented together with the Development Bank
887 of the Philippines (DBP) and its conduit USMI (Western Union).
888

889 • **Regional Economic Situationer**

890
891 The RDC Vice Chairperson presented the 2023 Second Quarter Regional Economic
892 Situationer (QRES) of the region. The report aims to provide a comprehensive assessment
893 of the economic performance of the region. It serves as a valuable tool for policymakers,
894 government agencies, businesses, and other stakeholders in understanding the current state
895 of the region's economy.
896

897 The Second QRES report contains the following: a) macroeconomy; b) peace and order; c)
898 natural disasters and other calamities; d) agriculture and fisheries; e) industry; and f) services.
899

900 He reported that the region's economy grew to 6.3 percent in 2022, which translated to PhP
901 393 billion economic performance. MIMAROPA remains a service-oriented region. It is
902 envisioned to achieve economic growth at a steady 7% growth per annum from 2023 to 2028.
903 MIMAROPA's average inflation increased to 7.4 percent in the second quarter. All commodity
904 groups registered upward price movements, except transport, food, and non-alcoholic
905 beverages, education services, and financial services, compared to previous year's index
906 levels. Unemployment rate in the region is targeted to decline to 4.9% by 2028 in order to
907 bounce back from the highest recorded annual average estimate of 8.13% in 2020.
908

909 RD Mendoza mentioned that the full reopening of the economy and the lifting of the public
910 health emergency will positively impact MIMAROPA's economic performance in the coming
911 years. The implementation of key strategies, programs, and projects outlined in the
912 MIMAROPA Regional Development Plan (RDP) 2023-2028 will contribute to economic
913 growth and recovery from health crises and other challenges. Inflation rate in MIMAROPA is
914 expected to ease further in the next quarters, with the government focusing on managing
915 inflation and mitigating the effects of rising commodity prices. The employment rate in the
916 region is expected to increase as the economy fully reopens, contributing to a high growth
917 trajectory.
918

919 With regard to peace and order situation of the region, RD Mendoza further cited that there
920 was a significant decreased in total crime volume, cleared crimes, and solved crimes
921 compared to previous quarters. The average monthly crime rate in the region decreased by
922 2.51 percentage points during this period. The statistics indicate an improvement in public
923 safety and a decrease in criminal activities within the MIMAROPA region.
924

925 On natural disasters and other calamities, PAGASA's Advisory No. 2 indicates that a weak
926 El Niño is present and may strengthen to moderate to strong level. Climate models suggest
927 its persistence into early 2024. Marinduque, Romblon, and Palawan will experience a dry
928 spell, while Mindoro anticipates drought by January 2024. Agricultural production is set to be

929 significantly affected. MIMAROPA has distinct climatic conditions that contribute to its
930 agricultural resiliency.

931
932 On agriculture and fisheries, the region witnessed marginal growth in its agricultural and
933 fisheries production, reaching a total of 360,000 metric tons. This demonstrated an
934 improvement compared to the output recorded during the same period in 2022. There were
935 notable increases in livestock, poultry, and fisheries production during this quarter. The region
936 may also experience shortage in tilapia from third quarter of 2023 to the third quarter of 2024,
937 as tilapia production is expected to decline due to El Niño.

938
939 He added that the region is a rice-secure region with or without El Niño. The surplus of the
940 previous quarter can roll over several quarters. There will be a deficit in the third quarter of
941 2023, but since rice inventory is a product of rollover harvest, the region still has sufficient
942 rice supply. The region's population is projected to be around 3.39 million, but harvest can
943 feed 3.40 million people. If all will be sold in MIMAROPA, the inventory will be enough to feed
944 the population in 9 months, or three quarters.

945
946 RD Mendoza ended his report with the following recommendations for the agriculture sector:
947 a) expand irrigation coverage; b) diversify irrigation systems; c) use water-efficient
948 technologies; and d) practice crop diversification.

949
950 • **Project Monitoring Report**

951
952 Engr. Amalia F. Santiago of NEDA MIMAROPA presented the Second Quarter CY 2023
953 Project Monitoring Report.

954
955 The Regional Project Monitoring Committee (RPMC), as the monitoring arm of the RDC is
956 tasked to operationalize the Regional Project Monitoring System (RPMES) to expedite
957 project implementation and devolve project facilitation, problem-solving, monitoring and
958 evaluation to the regions, particularly to the provincial and municipal levels.

959
960 In terms of implementation status by cost, Engr. Santiago reported that of the total project
961 cost of PhP 32.4 billion, 5 percent or PhP 1.69 billion were completed; 4 percent or PhP 1.23
962 billion were on schedule; 39 percent or PhP 12.71 billion were ahead of schedule; and 52
963 percent or PhP 16.76 billion encountered problems in implementation. In terms of
964 implementation status by quantity, Engr. Santiago added that of the total 405 projects, 115
965 projects or 28.40 percent were completed; 64 projects or 40.49 percent were ahead of
966 schedule; 38 projects or 9.38 percent were on schedule; and 88 projects or 22 percent
967 encountered problems in implementation.

968
969 She said that some of the issues encountered in project implementation include right-of-way
970 acquisition, securing of environmental compliance certificate, delayed delivery of construction
971 materials, variation order and unworkable site due to inclement weather conditions. Among
972 the projects that faced implementation challenges are: a) Yolanda Housing Projects in
973 Palawan; b) Tablas Circumferential Road in Romblon; c) Mindoro Island Circumferential
974 Road; and d) Mindoro Cross Island Road.

975
976 The major infrastructure projects visited by the Regional Project Monitoring Team were the
977 following: a) Marinduque Airport Development Project, with a total project cost of PhP 220
978 million. The upgrading of the runway from 1,400 meters to 1,535 meters will service
979 turboprop aircraft (ATR 72). It will also improve the ride quality, reduce noise levels, and
980 reduce the full life cycle costs of the runway surface; b) Odiongan East West Road, with a

981 total project of PhP 98.42 million. The diversion and bypass road projects, once completed,
982 will shorten the travel time from Sta. Maria to Odiongan (vice versa) from 1 ½ hours to 20
983 minutes; and c) Construction of Balabac Military Runway, with a total project cost of PhP 1.1
984 billion. The project faced challenges on right-of-way acquisition due to land claimed as an
985 Islam Cemetery by the indigenous peoples. To address the issue, DPWH will collaborate with
986 the provincial government of Palawan, conduct information dissemination and project briefing
987 within the community.

988

989 **I. Other Matters**

990

991 The RDC secretariat shared on screen the following agenda items, under other matters of
992 the meeting, namely: a) Update on the status of establishment of additional emission testing
993 centers in Marinduque by LTO and DOTr; b) Update on the status of projects proposed by
994 indigenous peoples (IPs) of Occidental and Oriental Mindoro; and c) Update on the issue of
995 Batangas Port affecting passengers of Romblon, Oriental Mindoro, and Occidental Mindoro.

996

997 RD Mendoza reported that for the status of establishment of additional emission testing
998 centers in Marinduque by LTO and DOTr, which was raised during the PSR National
999 Convention, the said concern will be included in the agenda item of the next IDC meeting in
1000 November.

1001

1002 On the status of proposed IPs project in Occidental and Oriental Mindoro, which was
1003 submitted by PSR Gumal-in during the first quarter IDC meeting, he said that there was a
1004 bilateral meeting with President Levy B. Arago, Jr., of Mindoro State University (MinSU), PSR
1005 Juvelyn V. Gumal-in, and NEDA MIMAROPA Regional Director. The agreements during the
1006 meeting are: a) MinSU will prepare the project proposals; b) the funding of the proposal will
1007 be sourced from the Department of Energy (DOE) ER 1-94 under the Development Livelihood
1008 Fund (DLF); and c) coordination with the Community Relation Officers (CROs) of various
1009 power plants will be done to expedite the release of funds for the proposed projects.

1010

1011 For the update on the issue of Batangas Port affecting passengers of Romblon, Oriental
1012 Mindoro, and Occidental Mindoro, the said concern will be included in the agenda item of the
1013 Strong Republic Nautical Highway (SRNH) committee meeting in November.

1. RDC MIMAROPA, during its first quarter full council meeting held on 03 March 2017, created MIMAROPA Regional Government Center Management Committee (RGCMC) pursuant to Republic Act No. 10879, s. 2016 or the MIMAROPA Act.
2. RDC MIMAROPA, during its second quarter full council meeting held on 02 June 2017, approved the proposed MIMAROPA RGC site – a five-hectare land located at Brgy. Sta. Isabel in Calapan City owned by the Provincial Government of Oriental Mindoro – that will be used under a usufruct agreement.
3. RDC MIMAROPA, during its first quarter full council meeting held on 20 March 2018, approved the usufruct agreement between RDC MIMAROPA and Provincial Government of Oriental Mindoro for the establishment of MIMAROPA RGC in Calapan City, which shall apply for a period of 50 years and subject to automatic renewal without political intervention.
4. RDC MIMAROPA, during its fourth quarter full council meeting held on 06 December 2018, approved the MIMAROPA RGC Master Plan and Architectural Schematics.
5. Since the approval of the usufruct agreement, DPWH MIMAROPA has consistently requested funds for the preparation of Detailed Architectural and Engineering Design (DAED), backfilling, and construction of perimeter fence for the MIMAROPA RGC, which were all favorably endorsed by RDC MIMAROPA to DPWH Central Office.
6. The site development of the MIMAROPA RGC is currently ongoing (partial implementation) given the Php 50 million allocation for the backfilling and construction of perimeter fence under the FY 2022 GAA of DPWH MIMAROPA.
7. The required funds for the preparation of DAED and completion of the backfilling and construction of perimeter fence, however, was proposed for inclusion in the FY 2024 budget of DPWH.

10. In a letter to MIMAROPA RGCMC dated 18 October 2023, Oriental Mindoro Governor Humerlito A. Dolor requested the allocation of 5,000 square meters land covered by the usufruct agreement for the construction and establishment of Oriental Mindoro Integrated Transport Stop.

11. The proposed Mindoro Integrated Transport Stop will serve as pivotal hub for various modes of transportation and foster convenience and accessibility for employees in MIMAROPA RGC and other adjacent government offices.

12. Governor Dolor committed to provide additional land, approximately 15,000 square meters, in lieu of the requested 5,000 square meters and to present a revised MIMAROPA RGC site development plan that will reflect the proposed utilization of land.

13. MIMAROPA RGCMC, during its fourth quarter meeting held on 16 November 2023, reviewed the updated MIMAROPA RGC master plan prepared by the Provincial Government of Oriental Mindoro and favorably recommended RDC approval and adoption.

1. On August 11, 2020, House Bill No. 7348 entitled “An Act Institutionalizing the Revitalized Barangay Police Program of the Philippine National Police and Appropriating Funds Therefore” was filed before the 18th Congress.
2. The Regional Development Council (RDC) Region XI, during its fourth quarter full council meeting held on December 07, 2020, passed Resolution No. 145, s. 2020 supporting the passage of HB 7348.
3. The Development Administration Committee, during its third quarter meeting on 05 August 2021, reviewed the comments and recommendations of the concerned agencies regarding the institutionalization of Revitalized Barangay Police Program and recommended RDC support to RDC XI Resolution No. 145, s. 2020 supporting the passage of HB 7348.
4. The RDC MIMAROPA, during its third quarter full council meeting on 03 September 2021, passed Resolution No. 2021-076-1008 supporting HB 7348 entitled “An Act Institutionalizing the Revitalized Barangay Police Program of the Philippine National Police and Appropriating Funds Therefore.”
5. House Bill No. 7651, otherwise known as the “Revitalized Pulis Barangay Act,” was filed before the 19th Congress to reinforce HB 7348.
6. On 26 June 2023, RDC XI passed Resolution No. 74, s. 2023 supporting the passage of HB 7651 entitled “An Act Institutionalizing the Revitalized Police sa Barangay Program of the Philippine National Police and Appropriating Funds Therefor.”
7. The RDC XI, through a memorandum dated 12 July 2023, solicited support from all RDCs regarding the passage of HB 7651.
8. RDC II, RDC CAR, RDC IV-A, RDC CARAGA, and RDC X have issued resolutions supporting the passage of HB No. 7651.
9. The institutionalization of HB 7651 is deemed responsive to the government’s whole-of-nation approach in attaining inclusive and sustainable peace in the country.
10. The Development Administration Committee, during its fourth quarter meeting held on 09 November 2023 in Quezon City, favorably recommended RDC support to the passage of HB 7651.

BRIEF FROM THE RDC SECRETARIAT

Subject: Tamaraw Conservation and Management Action Plan 2021-2030

1. Presidential Proclamation No. 273, s. 2002 declares October of every year as a “Special Month for the Conservation and Protection of the Tamaraw in Mindoro”. The Proclamation urges all government offices, agencies, and instrumentalities in the whole island of Mindoro to implement activities relative to the conservation and protection of the Tamaraw (*Bubalus mindorensis*) and its habitats.
2. The Tamaraw, also known as dwarf water buffalo, is the largest native land mammal in the Philippines. The buffalo species is currently classified as critically endangered under the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Administrative Order No. 2004-151 and on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List of Threatened Species.
3. In 2021, the DENR, in collaboration with the IUCN Asian Wild Cattle Specialist Groups (AWCSG), crafted the Tamaraw Conservation and Management Action Plan (TCMAP) 2021-2030. The Plan serves as a guide in the implementation of the Tamaraw Conservation Program (TCP) aimed at protecting, conserving, and increasing the Tamaraw population in Mindoro.
4. The TCMAP 2021-2030 envisions that by 2050, Tamaraw are a source of national pride and a flagship for Mindoro’s natural and cultural heritage. It also envisions that Tamaraw thrive in well-managed habitats, in populations that co-exist with Indigenous Peoples, and are valued by local communities across Mindoro. Among the strategies identified under the plan include: a) increase space for Tamaraw in Mt. Iglit-Baco Natural Park; b) support growth in the Upper Amnay Tamaraw population; c) re-establish Aruyan-Malati as a Tamaraw site; and d) re-establish Mt. Calavite and/or other potential Tamaraw sites.
5. The Economic Development Committee (EDC), during its fourth quarter meeting on 09 November 2023, endorsed the TCMAP for RDC adoption.
6. The EDC Chairperson will present the salient features of the Plan including the issues and concerns on the conservation of Tamaraw.

System Project in Puerto Galera

BRIEF FROM THE RDC SECRETARIAT

Subject: Proposed Rehabilitation/Improvement of Water Supply System in Puerto Galera, Oriental Mindoro

1. Water has been one of the important resources and the basic necessity for community's survival. It is vital to support the economic and social development of the municipality as health, food, jobs and all other socio-economic services depend on it.
2. For the past decades, the Municipality of Puerto Galera has been experiencing intermittent supply of water brought by aggravating effect of El Nino, increase in local population and the influx of tourists. The increase in demand requires increase in basic services needed by the locality. As a tourism-dependent municipality, Puerto Galera is in dire need of water supply for its everyday operation , domestic needs, local business operations to name a few.
3. The existing water supply system in Puerto Galera provides an average of 3,100 cubic meters daily to 4,900 consumer connections.
4. To meet the growing demands of its residents and tourists, Puerto Galera will need 6,919 cubic meters of water by 2029 and 9,658 cubic meters by 2024.
5. The rehabilitation/improvement of the water system in Puerto Galera will provide adequate water supply in the years to come.
6. The Local Government of Puerto Galera has requested funding support from MIMAROPA Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) for the Rehabilitation/Improvement of Water Supply System with an initial amount of Php 150 million pesos out Php 250 million pesos total project cost.
7. The RDRRMC MIMAROPA during its third quarter meeting on 22 September 2023 passed Resolution No. 02, s. 2023 endorsing the request of the Municipality of Puerto Galera for the Construction of Deep Well System (Level II) to National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) and MIMAROPA Regional Development Council (RDC).
8. The Development Administration Committee (DAC) during its fourth quarter meeting on 09 November 2023 recommended the endorsement of the proposed project to the Infrastructure Development Committee

for review and recommendation for RDC endorsement for funding by appropriate agencies.

9. The IDC secretariat reviewed the proposal and provided the following recommendations for consideration of the proponent:
 - a. The Municipality of Puerto Galera to prepare a comprehensive water supply development plan taking into consideration the following:
 - Historical (past five years) and projected (next 20 years) demand
 - Current water supply sources
 - Identify future water sources including aquifer recharge rate, extraction capacity, and development timeline
 - Explore alternative sources of water (e.g., rain water harvesting, desalination, surface water, etc.)
 - b. The Municipality of Puerto Galera should comply with the regulatory requirements specified in the ***Amended Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Water Code of the Philippines***.
 - c. The Municipality of Puerto Galera should comply with the water supply operation requirements specified under Sec 3.3 and Sec. 3.4 of the ***Supplemental Implementing Rules and Regulations of Chapter II – “Water Supply” of The Code On Sanitation Of The Philippines (P.D. 856)***
 - d. The Municipality of Puerto Galera should establish the Local Drinking Water Quality Monitoring Committee as prescribed under Sec.3.5 of the ***Implementing Rules and Regulations of Chapter II – “Water Supply” of The Code On Sanitation Of The Philippines (P.D. 856)*** and Sec 3.7 of the ***Supplemental Implementing Rules and Regulations of Chapter II – “Water Supply” of The Code On Sanitation Of The Philippines (P.D. 856)***.
 - e. The Municipality of Puerto Galera should comply with the Water Code of the Philippines in the use of water for municipal purposes and secure the necessary permit/authority from the National Water Resources Board in the event of amendment of existing permit.
 - f. The Municipality of Puerto Galera as the distributor of the water supply is mandated to provide the sewerage facilities, coordinate with DPWH on the establishment of sewage and/or septage treatment facilities and raise funds for its operations and maintenance as stated in DAO2005-10-Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Philippine Clean Water Act of 2004 (RA No. 9275).

- g. The water supplied by the Municipality of Puerto Galera should conform with the ***Philippine National Standards for Drinking Water***.
 - h. The Municipality of Puerto Galera should comply with the testing requirements and sampling frequency for mandatory parameters as specified under DOH Administrative Order (AO) No. 2017-0010.
10. Action requested: RDC endorsement of the project to NDRRMC, DPWH, LWUA, and NWRB.

FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF DEEP WELL SYSTEM (LEVEL II) TO ADDRESS
THE CURRENT WATER CRISIS**

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Puerto Galera, located in the Northwestern part of the Province of Oriental Mindoro, is composed of 10,918 households, with a total population of 45,732 (based on the 2023 Projected Population of the Municipal Development and Planning Office);

WHEREAS, per DOST-PAGASA El Niño Southern Oscillation (ENSO) Alert System Status, El Niño is currently present in the tropical Pacific and will persist until the first quarter of 2024, showing signs of strengthening in the coming months;

WHEREAS, El Niño increases the likelihood of below-normal rainfall conditions, which could bring negative impacts, such as dry spell and drought;

WHEREAS, MIMAROPA Region is likely to experience below normal rainfall condition starting October of 2023;

WHEREAS, Section 5.1.7 of NDRRMC Memorandum Circular No. 110, s. 2021, dated 23 September 2021, states that the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Fund (NDRRMF) shall be used for projects which employs DRRM measures such as "Build Back Better" and shall contribute to building resilience of vulnerable communities, and for priority prevention, mitigation and preparedness projects which are directly linked to the achievement of the NDRRM Plan outcomes as identified by the NDRRMC;

WHEREAS, the said Municipality is currently suffering from insufficient water supply, which is expected to be exacerbated by the El Niño Southern Oscillation on the 4th Quarter of 2023 which will bring adverse impacts to the residents, and the tourism industry;

WHEREAS, based on the study conducted by the Local Government Unit of Puerto Galera, although there is sufficient water supply from January to February of 2023, there

is a significant increase in the demand and decrease in water supply during the months of March to May 2023, considering the number of local and projected tourist population, there will be a monthly shortage of 55,036.85 m³ in the Municipality;

WHEREAS, currently, there are 4,900 (63.92%) water supply connections, with an additional 2,766 (36.08%) connections required, to address the water supply demand in the said Municipality;

WHEREAS, the Local Government of Puerto Galera has taken several initiatives, including the installation of additional water lines, and water rationing in the Barangays, in coordination with the BFP, even with the abovementioned initiatives, there is still a need to identify and install additional water systems, to address the current water crisis;

WHEREAS, the Local Government of Puerto Galera has requested funding support from the Regional DRRM Council of MIMAROPA for the Construction of Deep Well System (Level II) to address the water crisis in the Municipality, amounting to One Hundred and Fifty Million Pesos (P150,000,000.00);







BRIEF FROM THE RDC SECRETARIAT

Subject: Regional Share of Energy Regulations (ER) No. 1-94 Fund

1. Section 5 (i) of Republic Act No. 7638 (R.A. No. 7638), otherwise known as the "Department of Energy Act of 1992" mandates the Department of Energy (DOE) to devise ways and means of giving direct benefits to the province, city or municipality, especially the community and people affected and equitable and preferential to the region that hosts the energy resource and/or the energy-generating facility.
2. Energy Regulation No. 1-94 (ER 1-94) was promulgated by the DOE on 01 August 1994 to operationalize the implementation of section 5 (i) of R.A. No. 7638, which provides the granting of financial benefits to the host communities of the energy-generation company and/or energy resources.
3. Section 66 of R. A. No. 9136, otherwise known as the "Electric Power Industry Reform Act of 2001" and Rule 29(A) of its Implementing Rules and Regulations (EPIRA-IRR) require all energy generation companies (GenCos) and/or energy resource developers (ERDs) to provide financial benefits equivalent to one centavo per kilowatt-hour (P0.01/kwh) of the total electricity sales of the generation facility to the region, province, city or municipality and barangay that hosts the generation facility and energy resource facility, as well as the establishment of corresponding trust accounts and the administration thereof by the DOE.
4. The collected funds can then be used by local government units (LGUs) for various projects such as development and livelihood, reforestation, watershed management, and health and environment enhancement.
5. On 07 August 2018, DOE issued DC2018-08-0021 entitled, "Providing for the Amendments to Rule 29 Part (A) of the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of Republic Act (RA) No. 9136" or "Benefits to Host Communities, where in Section 6.2 of the said DC states that

For the regional share, the Regional Development Council (RDC) shall identify its Beneficiaries, which may be a Host or non-Host LGU, within the region. The allocated share for the identified Beneficiary shall then be remitted by the Genco and/or Energy Resource Developer to the trust or general account/s of the identified LGU.

6. Section C.5 of the 2nd Advisory for The Implementation of DC2018-08-0021 and its Supplemental Policy Issuances states that a MOA between the concerned RDC and GenCo and/or ERD will be executed to establish an agreement on the procedures to facilitate the allocation and remittance of the Regional Share to the identified LGUs.
7. Section 13 of Executive Order No. 325, s. 1996 provides that the NEDA Regional Director shall manage the technical, administrative and financial operations of the RDC and shall be accountable for the funds and properties of the RDC.
8. The IDC during its fourth quarter meeting held on 10 November 2023 passed a resolution recommending RDC to authorize NEDA Regional Director and RDC Vice Chairperson Agustin C. Mendoza to enter into and sign a Memorandum of Agreement with concerned GenCos to establish an agreement on the procedures to facilitate the allocation and remittance of the Regional Share to the identified beneficiaries.
9. Action requested. RDC to authorize NEDA Regional Director and RDC Vice Chairperson Agustin C. Mendoza to enter into and sign a Memorandum of Agreement with concerned GenCos.

WHEREAS, Energy Regulation No. 1-94 (ER 1-94) was promulgated by the DOE on 01 August 1994 to operationalize the implementation of section 5 (i) of R.A. No. 7638, which provides the granting of financial benefits to the host communities of the energy-generation company and/or energy resources;

WHEREAS, Section 66 of R. A. No. 9136, otherwise known as the "Electric Power Industry Reform Act of 2001" and Rule 29(A) of its Implementing Rules and Regulations (EPIRA-IRR) require all energy generation companies (GenCos) and/or energy resource developers (ERDs) to provide financial benefits equivalent to one centavo per kilowatt-hour (P0.01/kwh) of the total electricity sales of the generation facility to the region, province, city or municipality and barangay that hosts the generation facility and energy resource facility, as well as the establishment of corresponding trust accounts and the administration thereof by the DOE;

WHEREAS, the collected funds can then be used by local government units (LGUs) for various projects such as development and livelihood,

reforestation, watershed management, and health and environment enhancement;

WHEREAS, On 07 August 2018, DOE issued DC2018-08-0021 entitled, "Providing for the Amendments to Rule 29 Part (A) of the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of Republic Act (RA) No. 9136" or "Benefits to Host Communities, where in Section 6.2 of the said DC states that, "For the regional share, the Regional Development Council (RDC) shall identify its Beneficiaries, which may be a Host or non-Host LGU, within the region. The allocated share for the identified Beneficiary shall then be remitted by the Genco and/or Energy Resource Developer to the trust or general account/s of the identified LGU";

WHEREAS, Section C.5 of the 2nd Advisory for The Implementation of DC2018-08-0021 and its Supplemental Policy Issuances states that a MOA between the concerned RDC and GenCo and/or ERD will be executed to establish an agreement on the procedures to facilitate the allocation and remittance of the Regional Share to the identified LGUs;

WHEREAS, Section 13 of Executive Order No. 325, s. 1996 provides that the NEDA Regional Director shall manage the technical, administrative and financial operations of the RDC and shall be accountable for the funds and properties of the RDC;

WHEREAS, the Infrastructure Development Committee during its fourth quarter meeting held on 10 November 2023 passed a resolution recommending RDC to authorize NEDA Regional Director and RDC Vice Chairperson Agustin C. Mendoza to enter into and sign a Memorandum of Agreement with concerned GenCos to establish an agreement on the procedures to facilitate the allocation and remittance of the Regional Share to the identified beneficiaries;

NOW, THEREFORE, ON A MOTION DULY SECONDED, be it

RESOLVED, AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, That the RDC authorizes RDC Vice Chairperson and NEDA Regional Director Agustin C. Mendoza to enter into and sign a Memorandum of Agreement with concerned GenCos on the ER 1-94 Regional Share of Funds;

1. Executive Order (EO) No. 525 s. 1979 designated the Philippine Estates Authority (PEA) as the agency primarily responsible for integrating, directing and coordinating all reclamation projects for and on behalf of the National Government and mandated that all reclamation projects shall be approved by the President upon the recommendation of the PEA.

2. EO No. 153 s. 1999 authorizes the utilization of offshore areas not covered by approved mining permits and contracts as sources of dredgefill materials for government reclamation projects and for other purposes. The EO was promulgated to properly delineate the functions and responsibilities of the government agencies to conform with RA No. 7942¹. PRA shall be responsible for the approval of bids or awards for contracts of work for Government Reclamation Projects and shall also be responsible for the identification of borrow areas as sources of dredgefill materials for all government reclamation projects. All related mining operations in borrow areas of PRA shall be subject to monitoring by the DENR, for compliance with RA No. 7942, PD No. 1152², PD No. 1586³, RA No. 7586⁴, United Nations Convention on the Law of Sea and all their implementing rules and regulations.

3. EO No. 380-A s. 2006 renamed the PEA as the Philippine Reclamation Authority (PRA), and EO No. 543 s. 2006 delegated to the PRA, through its Governing Board, the President’s power to approve reclamation projects.

4. EO No. 74 was issued on 01 February 2019, repealing EO No. 798 (s.2009) and EO 146 (s. 2013), transferring the PRA to the Office of the President, delegating to the PRA Governing Board the power of the President to approve reclamation projects, and for other purposes.
5. Section 7 of EO 74 states that PRA, in coordination with the DENR, NEDA and affected local government units (LGUs), shall craft a National and/or Regional Reclamation and Development Plan (RDP) which take into consideration environmental, social and economic impacts of proposed reclamation projects. All RDPs shall undergo public consultation and shall be consistent with the greater public interest.
6. Presidential Directive No. 2022-016 titled “Deferring Acceptance of New Applications for Reclamation Projects” was issued. The directive states that “the President directed the DENR and PRA to put on hold the acceptance of all new applications for reclamation projects in the country; and ensure that the pending applications strictly comply with all legal requirements”.
7. During the fourth quarter MIMAROPA Infrastructure Development Committee (IDC) meeting held on 10 November 2023, the PRA presented its National and Regional Reclamation Development Plan (RDP) and the status of reclamation projects in the MIMAROPA region, and appealed support for their development undertakings.
8. The IDC concurred with the reclamation projects being proposed and implemented in the region and agreed to request the Office of the President to review and/or repeal the Presidential Directive 2022-016. The IDC also acknowledged the need for the government to proceed with its acceptance of reclamation project proposals subject for review and compliance with legal requirements, permits and clearances being issued by the State.

Subject: Amendment of Section 488 (A) of Republic Act No. 7160, or the “The Local Government Code of 1991,” to mandate the establishment of population offices in all provinces, cities, and municipalities

1. The Department of Budget and Management (DBM) approved the Devolution Transition Plan (DTP) of the Commission on Population and Development (CPD) to devolve functions, services, facilities, program projects, and activities along three basic services: responsible parenthood-family planning, population and development, and program for the welfare of children and adolescents.
2. The DTP prescribes the establishment of the structure in all LGUs, which shall be known as Local Population and Development Office (LPDO), to assume and continue the provision of quality services and information.
3. However, despite the prioritization of these basic services, a majority of LGUs are reluctant to establish population offices due to the provision in the Local Government Code (LGC) that such office is optional.
4. The establishment of Population Offices at the local level has been included in the Seal of Local Good Governance starting CY 2023. Therefore, amending Republic Act No. 7160 to mandate all provinces, cities, and municipalities to establish a Population Office in their localities will lead to the realization of the tasks and visions for the provision of population and development and the achievement of the goal of the Philippine Population and Development Plan of Action (PPD-POA), which is to optimize demographic opportunities and address persistent population issues and challenges to reap demographic dividends and accelerate sustainable and inclusive development at all levels
5. For the plan of action to be actualized on the ground, strong and appropriately funded structures need to be established, including the mandatory establishment of LPDOs and the institutionalization of Barangay Population Workers (BPWs).
6. The Regional Population Executive Board (RPEB) Caraga passed Resolution No. 05, series of 2023, “Requesting the Amendment of Section 488 (A) of Republic Act No. 7160, Otherwise Known as the Local Government Code of 1991, to mandate the establishment of population offices in all provinces, cities, and municipalities,” during its meeting on 14 September 2023 in Butuan City, Caraga Region.

Subject: Confirmation of the Members of the MIMAROPA Regional Pool of Gender and Development Resource Persons

1. The certification of the MIMAROPA RPGRP is one of the activities specified in the Strategic Plan 2020-2025 of the Regional Gender and Development Committee (RGADC) MIMAROPA and addresses the issue of the limited number of GAD experts in the region.
2. The Regional Development Council (RDC), during its first quarter meeting on 05 March 2021, via video conference, passed RDC Resolution No. 2021-074-987, approving and adopting the guidelines on the certification of the Regional Pool of Gender and Development Resource Persons (RPGRP).
3. Brief from the RDC Secretariat

Subject: MIMAROPA Power and Energy Summit

1. The Regional Development Council (RDC) MIMAROPA passed Resolution No. 2022-079-1095, approving the Creation of the MIMAROPA Infrastructure Development Committee (IDC) Power and Energy Technical Working Group (TWG) on 03 June 2022. Consequently, on 02 December 2022, the MIMAROPA RDC endorsed the conduct of MIMAROPA Multi-Sectoral Energy Summit through RDC Resolution No. 2022-080-1114.
2. The conduct of the Power and Energy Summit is a vital initiative by the MIMAROPA Regional Development Council to address the immediate and long-term challenges while harnessing the region's potential for sustainable energy development.
3. The NEDA MIMAROPA in partnership with the Department of Energy (DOE) and National Electrification Administration (NEA) conducted the first ever MIMAROPA Power and Energy Summit on 14 November 2023 in Quezon City. With the theme, "Affordable, Accessible, and Reliable Energy for MIMAROPAns", the summit aims to bring together key stakeholders, experts, and decision-makers to discuss and collaborate on strategies and priority investments on power and energy.
4. The Summit was attended by key government power sector agencies, local government units, electric cooperatives, power distribution utilities, power producers, civil society organization, and the academe.
5. The MIMAROPA Power and Energy Summit underscored the engagement of participants in constructive and informative dialogue and shared perspectives to champion resilient energy landscape in the region. The strategic conference catalyzed partnership, knowledge exchange, and actionable solutions on the most pressing challenges in MIMAROPA region's power and energy security.

MIMAROPA Power and Energy Summit

14 November 2024 Quezon City

The power and energy sector is a fundamental enabler of economic growth for MIMAROPA region as it fuels businesses, strengthens the delivery of public services, and ushers the initiatives towards sustainable development, poverty reduction and even climate action.

The MIMAROPA region has immense potential for power and energy development with its abundant natural resources and growing energy demand. However, there are challenges related to sustainable energy generation, distribution, and utilization. Adequate, affordable, and reliable power supply in the region remains a major concern due to generation cost and frequent power outages being experienced in the MIMAROPA provinces.

As response to these challenges, and to strengthen collaboration among the energy agencies and players in the region, the Regional Development Council (RDC) MIMAROPA passed Resolution No. 2022-079-1095, approving the Creation of the MIMAROPA Infrastructure Development Committee (IDC) Power and Energy Technical Working Group (TWG) on 03 June 2022. Consequently, on 02 December 2022, the MIMAROPA RDC endorsed the conduct of MIMAROPA Multi-Sectoral Energy Summit through RDC Resolution No. 2022-080-1114.

The conduct of the Power and Energy Summit is a vital initiative by the MIMAROPA Regional Development Council to address the immediate and long-term challenges while harnessing the region's potential for sustainable energy development.

The NEDA MIMAROPA together with the Department of Energy conducted the initial coordination meeting on the preparation for the conduct of the summit. It was followed by series of meeting with the key stakeholders such as with the National Electrification Administration (NEA), Electric Cooperatives (ECs), National Power Corporation (NPC), Transmission Corporation (TransCo), and PNOC Renewables Corporation, in April, May, and July, 2023.

A two-day focus group discussion (FGD) was conducted on 17-18 October to discuss the plans, projects, and challenges that the Electric Cooperatives (ECs) in the Region are facing. The output and recommendations of the concluded FGDs were presented during the summit conducted on 14 November 2023 in NEA Auditorium, Quezon City.

The first ever MIMAROPA Power and Energy Summit was conducted in partnership with the DOE and NEA on 14 November 2023 in NEA Auditorium, Quezon City. With the theme, “Affordable, Accessible, and Reliable Energy for MIMAROPAns”, the summit brought

together the NEA Administrator, DOE Assistant Secretary, Directors and representatives of Regional Line Agencies, Local Government Units (LGUs), General Managers of Electric Cooperatives (ECs), technology providers and investors, and Private Sector Representative (PSR) in the region.

Infrastructure Development Committee (IDC) MIMAROPA Chairperson and Governor of Province of Marinduque, Gov. Presbitero J. Velasco, Jr. emphasized that the summit is a crucial response to the increasing demand in energy sector. He asserted that through the initiative of the Regional Development Council (RDC), strategies are crafted in transforming MIMAROPA's energy landscape through exploration of potential investments and asserting Renewable Energy (RE) as sustainable energy source.

Assistant Secretary Mario C. Marasigan of DOE highlighted that sufficiency, reliability, and affordability of energy supply remained the major concern for MIMAROPA; hence, the summit is a well-timed opportunity to forge collaborative and reinforced modernization and hybridization programs, confront issues head on, and identify action plan and interventions crucial to securing the regions energy future.

As a national agency commissioned to promote sustainable development in the rural areas through electrification, NEA Administrator Antonio Mariano C. Almeda professed that the agency's ambitious target of total electrification by 2028 would entail an investment of Php 70 Billion. He encouraged all Electric Cooperatives to prepare an efficient planning program on Renewable Energy (RE) as rural electrification is transitioning to a clean energy. Further, Administrator Almeda assured that NEA will be at the forefront of much deserved energy service that consumers in MIMAROPA, as an area of windows of tourism development, deserves.

RDC Vice-Chairperson and NRO MIMAROPA Regional Director Agustin C. Mendoza accentuated the power and energy strategy framework designed to connect MIMAROPA region with the main Luzon power grid. RD Mendoza stressed the pivotal role of stabilizing power interconnection projects and RE development as permanent solutions to the power crisis among the island provinces of the region.

Updates on the major transmission projects in the region was reported by the National Grid Corporation in the Philippines (NGCP). Primarily, the Batangas – Mindoro interconnection project which is targeted to be completed by September of 2027 will be fast-tracked until the last quarter of 2025, as DOE suggested to NGCP. Similarly, NGCP expressed that upon completion of the 230kv line from Calapan City, Oriental Mindoro to San Jose, Occidental Mindoro will reduce dependency of the Province of Occidental Mindoro to voltage regulated power plants.

As mandated by DOE to serve as the Off-grid System Operator (SO) in Mindoro and Palawan provinces as the two provinces are not yet connected to Luzon main grid, the National Transmission Corporation (TransCo) presented its activities in the harmonization and fine-tuning of its dispatch program, and the finalization of procedures and protocols in both provinces to improve the quality of electricity service in both island provinces. TransCo stated its commitment to carry out Protection Assessments and SCADA Monitoring for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 in both provinces, and set to establish Automated System Operation in Mindoro province for FY 2025.

Policies for off-grid power development was featured by DOE, highlighting the Philippine off-grid power system and missionary electrification, and the rationalization of Universal Charge for Missionary Electrification (UCME) graduation.

The Energy Regulatory Commission (ERC), as key regulatory agency deliberated on the guidelines and policies in the competitive selection process (CSP), and the status of Power Supply Agreements (PSA). The ERC presented the UCME subsidy applications as well as the pending petitions filed before the Commission and enumerated numerous Energy Projects Applications of ECs in the region.

DOE set forth its commitment in developing renewable energy (RE) as a major key towards resilient and sustainable energy systems. Expounding on the massive impact of RE to climate change mitigation activities, and as a viable solution to supply 24/7 of electricity in off-grid areas, DOE also advocates RE as mechanism to the eventual graduation to UCME subsidies as the cost of electricity will reduce in competitive and reasonable level.

In addition, considering MIMAROPA region has a potentially huge resource base for renewable energy, DOE exhibited their readily assistance to ECs in their proposals for hydroelectric and wind turbine projects, as well as, in the procurement of embedded generation from renewable sources.

Further, the National Power Corporation (NPC) discussed its modernization and accelerated hybridization programs via installation of solar plants with energy storage system which will operate in parallel to diesel gensets. For the next four years, NPC stated that 14 hybridization projects will be implemented in the island provinces of the region which are intended to accelerate development of RE in off-grid areas.

The MIMAROPA Power and Energy Summit underscored the engagement of participants in constructive and informative dialogue and shared perspectives to champion resilient energy landscape in the region. The strategic conference catalyzed partnership, knowledge exchange, and actionable solutions on the most pressing challenges in MIMAROPA region's power and energy security.

Subject: CY 2023 Third Quarter Regional Economic Situationer (QRES)

1. The MIMAROPA Quarterly Regional Economic Situationer is a report that aims to provide a comprehensive assessment of the economic performance of the region. It serves as a valuable tool for policymakers, government agencies, businesses, and other stakeholders in understanding the current state of the region's economy.
2. Inflation in MIMAROPA eased to 6.2 percent in July to September from previous year's 7.3 percent. Further, all commodity groups registered upward price movements, except transport, compared to previous year's index levels.
3. The region's employment rate increased from 94.8 percent in July 2022 to 95.7 percent in July 2023, while the unemployment rate of 4.3 percent was lower than the national average unemployment rate of 4.8 percent.
4. The total agriculture and fisheries production of the region improved by almost 11 percent, from 272,984.18 metric tons (MT) in the third quarter of 2022 to 302,146.28 MT in the same period of 2023. Increases in livestock, poultry, and fisheries production were recorded during the quarter.
5. The total value of minerals produced and/or processed within the MIMAROPA region expanded by 15.33 percent during the third quarter of 2023 compared to the same period last year.
6. There was a significant growth in the number of MSMEs assisted and registered businesses, with increases of 31.47 percent and 57.35 percent, respectively. However, MSMEs experienced a decline in employment generation (26.12%), investments received (59.45%), and sales generated (57.14%).
7. Tourism in the region experienced significant year-on-year growth, with increases in tourist arrivals (39.74%), tourism receipts (39.71%), the number of hotel rooms (15.19%), and hotel occupancy rates (40.91%).
8. The number of registered motor vehicles in the region increased by 31 percent in the third quarter of 2023. Similarly, passenger traffic (24.75%), container port traffic (24.41%), cargo throughput

(20.96%), and RORO traffic (7.54%) witnessed year-on-year growth. Aircraft movements (18.62%), passenger traffic (30.65%), and air cargoes (25.93%) showed year-on-year increase in the third quarter of 2023.

9. Total crime volume in MIMAROPA decreased by 36.15 percent in July to September 2023 from previous year's 1,126 incidents to 719 incidents.

1. The Regional Project Monitoring Committee (RPMC), as the monitoring arm of the RDC is tasked to operationalize the Regional Project Monitoring System (RPMES) to expedite project implementation and devolve project facilitation, problem-solving, monitoring and evaluation to the regions, particularly to the provincial and municipal levels.
2. Project monitoring is conducted in support of good governance, transparency, accountability, and evidence-based decision-making throughout a program/project's life cycle. Its goal is to keep track of the critical variables that could influence how successfully a project or program is implemented, and to provide reporting systems that enable timely correction or avoidance of implementation bottlenecks.
3. Out of the total 323 projects in the third quarter CY 2023 RPMES report, 45 (13.93 percent) were Major Capital Projects amounting to Php 12.203 billion, and 278 (86.07 percent) were Non-Major Capital Projects amounting to Php 5.997 billion.
