

Respectfully submitting the report on the monitoring of marine turtle nesting sites within the jurisdiction of CENRO Socorro, Oriental Mindoro for the 2nd quarter of CY 2022. The monitoring covered the dates from March 21 – June 17, 2022. This is part of the regular target for *Protection and Conservation of Wildlife: Conservation of Threatened Species* under *Wildlife Resources Conservation Sub-Program*.

The activities undertaken this quarter include the following:

- 1. Coordination with the MENRO of Puerto Galera on March 28, 2022 and distribution of 40 pieces of Information, Education and Communication (IEC) campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds, forests, Marine Protected Area (MPA) and Biodiversity-Friendly Enterprise (BDFE);
- 2. Coordination with the MENRO and Municipal Planning and Development Office (MPDO) of Baco, Oriental Mindoro on April 19, 2022, and distribution of 15 pieces of IEC campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds and Philippine flora;
- 3. Monitoring of marine turtle nesting site on May 20, 2022, and coastal cleanup, IEC campaign and distribution of 29 pieces of IEC campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds, forests, MPA and BDFE in Barangay Lazareto, Calapan City, Oriental Mindoro in celebration of the Month of the Ocean 2022; and
- 4. Monitoring of marine turtle nesting site on June 10, 2022 in Barangay Tagumpay, Pola, Oriental Mindoro, and distribution of 30 pieces of IEC campaign materials to the Barangay LGU, MENRO and MPDO.



Respectfully submitting the report on the monitoring of marine turtle nesting sites within the jurisdiction of CENRO Socorro, Oriental Mindoro for the 2nd quarter of CY 2022. The monitoring covered the dates from March 21 – June 17, 2022. This is part of the regular target for *Protection and Conservation of Wildlife: Conservation of Threatened Species* under *Wildlife Resources Conservation Sub-Program*.

COORDINATION WITH THE MENRO OF PUERTO GALERA, ORIENTAL MINDORO

In response to the communication letter of the CENRO Socorro dated February 02, 2022, the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office (MENRO) of Puerto Galera through their electronic mail dated March 28, 2022 reported all occurrences and encounters of marine turtles within their area of jurisdiction.

Based on the report, the latest encounter for this year was on February 20, 2022 in Barangay Tabinay, Puerto Galera, Oriental Mindoro. With this, the personnel of Conservation and Development Section (CDS) coordinated and validated the emergence of marine turtle hatchlings on March 29, 2022 (see Figure 1).

No.: (043) 285 - 7068 Email: cenrosocorro@denr.gov.ph It was found out that the MENRO Puerto Galera facilitated the release of marine turtle hatchlings. Further, the MENRO conducted profiling (of eggs and hatchlings), and Information, Education and Communication (IEC) campaign to the Barangay LGU and community.

To assist the activities of LGU, a total of 40 pieces of IEC campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds, forests, Marine Protected Area (MPA) and Biodiversity-Friendly Enterprise (BDFE) were given to MENRO. This will aid in their IEC campaign and management of coastal and marine resources. Further, they were requested to coordinate again with the DENR for joint collaboration in saving the endangered marine turtles (see Figure 2).

COORDINATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF IEC CAMPAIGN MATERIALS WITH THE MUNICIPALITY OF BACO, ORIENTAL MINDORO

On April 19, 2022, the CDS personnel of CENRO Socorro coordinated with the MENRO and Municipal Planning and Development Office (MPDO) of Baco, Oriental Mindoro regarding marine turtles. The Municipality of Baco is among the coastal municipalities of the province (see Figure 3).

Despite being located within the Verde Island Passage (VIP), the Office has not yet received any report regarding marine turtles. The reason is probably the absence of sandy shore for the marine turtles to rest and nest. Nevertheless, the LGU was given a total of 15 pieces of IEC campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds and Philippine flora for their IEC campaign and management of coastal and marine resources of the municipality (see Figure 4).

MONITORING OF MARINE TURTLE NESTING SITE IN BARANGAY LAZARETO, CALAPAN CITY, ORIENTAL MINDORO

The CENRO Socorro personnel conducted monitoring of marine turtle nesting site on May 20, 2022 in Barangay Lazareto, Calapan City, Oriental Mindoro (see Figure 5). The recent marine turtle activity specifically emergence of hatchlings was last February 06, 2022. Further, the activity is complementary with the monitoring last February 11, 2022.

The CENRO Socorro personnel monitored the shoreline of Barangay Lazareto with approximately 405.37 m of distance patrolled. The site is composed of gray and black sand with some shells, coral rubbles and pebbles. The vegetation is composed primarily of coconut (*Cocos mucifera*) and beach forest vines. The threats observed include the presence of coastal

However, the LGU has forged strong linkage with the City ENRO, PG-ENRO and Blue Alliance (Non-Government Organization). Likewise, several *Bantay Dagat* were deployed to the municipal water of the area to conserve and protect the site.

Mr. Noel Aguirre, a local fisherfolk in the area and the respondent of the interview, showed the actual nesting site of the last emergence of marine turtle hatchlings. He stated that the City ENRO together with the Barangay LGU and other residents protected the eggs of marine turtles until the hatchlings emerged from the nest. The Office requested to report future similar events to the DENR (see Figure 6).

To further manage and protect the marine turtle nesting site, the celebration of the Month of the Ocean (MOO) 2022 was held in Barangay Lazareto. The other activities conducted in simultaneous to the activity include IEC campaign, distribution of IEC campaign materials and coastal clean-up (see Figure 7).

The topics discussed during the IEC campaign include the relevance of MOO, marine turtle conservation and solid waste management. A total of 29 pieces of IEC campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds, forests, MPA and BDFE were given to the Barangay

LGU for their IEC and programs/ activities/ projects related to coastal and marine ecosystems.

The clean-up was held after the IEC. This was conducted by group. The Volunteer Ocean Trash Data Form from Ocean Conservancy Organization was used to record and provide an organized classification of trash collected for analysis (see Figure 8).





Figure 9. Percentage of trash categories collected during the coastal clean-up.

After the clean-up, a total of 18 sacks of garbage weighing approximately 324 kilograms were collected in the coastal area of Barangay Lazareto, Calapan City, Oriental Mindoro. In the consolidated data from Volunteer Ocean Trash Data Form, the *Most Likely to Find Items* category has the most number and percentage of trash collected, with 436 pieces or 52.53%. This is followed by *Tiny Trash Less than 2.5 cm* with 197 pieces (23.73%), *Other Trash* with 81 pieces (9.76%), *Personal Hygiene* with 47 pieces (5.66%), *Fishing Gear* with 46 pieces (5.54%) and lastly by *Packaging Materials* with 23 pieces (2.77%) of trash collected. Fortunately, no injured nor dead animals were encountered during the event (see Table 1 and Figure 9).

The significance of the event in achieving the goal of the MOO 2022 was evaluated through a post-event evaluation survey. Out of the 103 participants, about 66 (64%) of which voluntarily took part of the survey. The comments of respondents for the MOO 2022, and the suggestions/ recommendations for the next MOO were recorded. The Office shall consider film showing and tree planting of mangroves in simultaneous and/ or series with other activities in different areas per the suggestions/ recommendations of respondents in the succeeding MOO.

The event was attended by 103 participants (66 male and 37 female) with age group ranging from 8-75 years old coming from National Government Agencies (CENRO Socorro, PENRO Oriental Mindoro, Philippine Army, PNP-Regional Maritime Unit), Local Government Unit of Barangay Lazareto and volunteers (Fraternity and residents) (see Figure 10).

MONITORING OF MARINE TURTLE NESTING SITE IN BARANGAY TAGUMPAY, POLA, ORIENTAL MINDORO




Figure 11. Monitoring of marine turtle nesting site.

The CENRO Socorro personnel monitored the shoreline of Barangay Tagumpay on June 10, 2022 with approximately 368.15 m of distance patrolled. The location site is a predominant white sand beach with some coral rubbles and sea shells. The vegetation is composed mainly of Talisay (*Terminalia catappa*) and Coconut (*C.nucifera*). About two (2) ephemeral stream with Nipa (*Nypa fruticans*) and Mangroves (*Rhizophora sp.*) are draining in the beach (see Figure 11).




Figure 13. Threats observed: Coastal development and commercialization.

The threats observed during the monitoring include erosion, coastal development, commercialization and improper solid waste disposal. Soil and coastal erosion were noted because some parts of the road of the barangay is excavated and there are presence of exposed root system of trees near the water (see Figure 12). Cottages were also constructed with on-going tourism activities (see Figure 13). Likewise, solid waste were seen in the inconspicuous area of the beach (see Figure 14). In the said threats, anthropogenic factors can be managed and controlled.

Despite the threats, the LGU has conservation and protection initiatives such as the establishment and maintenance of their Marine Protected Area (MPA); mobilization of *Bantay Dagat*; and closed coordination with other concerned offices.

The CENRO Socorro personnel also interviewed key informants from the Barangay LGU. The 1st respondent is Ms. Vilma Pedragao, a Barangay Health Worker. Ms. Pedragao cited that her *Bantay Dagat* brother-in-law, Mr. Ricky Sapungan, encountered a mature marine turtle last May around 7:00 pm. The species reached the court in search for suitable nesting site. The area is approximately 10 meters away from the shore. The marine turtle then retreated as the area is cemented.

The species tried to nest near the waterline where sand exist, but the shallow root system of Talisay trees prevented it to do so. With the unsuitable site condition and nearness to the sea water, the marine turtle withdrawn and departed back to water to nest to other area.

Aside from that, Ms. Pedragao shared that she and her *Bantay Dagat* husband, Mr. Robert Sapungan, have multiple sightings of marine turtles as well as dolphins swimming within their municipal waters. Their recent encounter was also last month.

The 2nd respondent for the interview was Mr. Rico Mendez, a *Bantay Dagat* from Municipal Agriculturist's Office. He annotated that his fellow *Bantay Dagat* regularly conducted patrolling at night to protect the MPA against perpetrators. They also assist in the operations of nearby barangay. Last year, they facilitated the release of 93 marine turtle hatchlings in the adjacent Barangay Misong, Pola in coordination with the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (MDRRMO) and Provincial Agriculturist's Office (PAgO). Meanwhile, five (5) of which are dead.

The barangay is absolutely a marine turtle nesting site. In this regard, the team requested the Barangay LGU to coordinate with the DENR-CENRO Socorro for possible nesting, emergence of hatchlings, stranding, injured, death and/ or poaching incidence with regards to marine turtles. The DENR through Executive Order No. 192 series of 1987 is mandated to be the primary agency responsible for conservation, management and protection of said animals. Further, the Republic Act No. 9147, otherwise known as the Wildlife Resources Conservation and Protection Act of 2001, has designated the department to have jurisdiction over the aforementioned endangered species.

The contact number and e-mail address of the Office were provided through letter dated June 08, 2022 for their reference. The information provided will serve as basis for the formulation and/ or implementation of programs/ activities/ projects with regards to the conservation, management and protection of marine turtles in the province.

Additionally, a total of 30 pieces of IEC campaign materials regarding marine turtles, birds, forests, MPA and Biodiversity-Friendly Enterprise (BDFE) were given to MENRO, MPDO and Barangay LGU to serve as reference in conservation, monitoring and enforcement activities. The barangay greatly appreciated and expressed their heartfelt gratitude for the IEC materials as these will help in their IEC and management of coastal and marine resources (see Figure 15-16).

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




