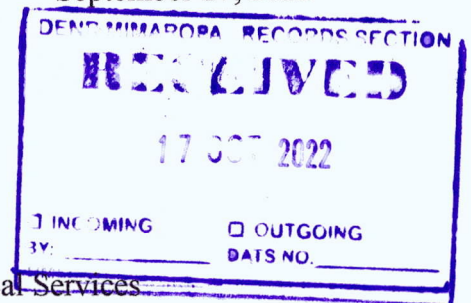

ACCOMPLISHMENT REPORT OF THE MARINDUQUE  
WILDLIFE RESCUE CENTER**

Submitted are the enumerated activities that were undertaken during the first quarter, to wit;

1. That the maintenance and protection of the Marinduque Wildlife Rescue Center (MWRC) is a continuing activity being undertaken through periodic monitoring and supervision.
2. That on July 13, 2022, a Spitting Cobra (*Naja philippinensis*) was turned-over to this Office through Forest Technician (FT) Corazon R. Pelaez by Mr. Eric Orea of Dawisland Resort, Dawis, Gasan, Marinduque. Accordingly, the snake was caught inside the swimming pool of the resort. After three days of custody, FT Pelaez transported the Cobra to the vicinity of Marinduque Wildlife Rescue Center (MWRC) for releasing. The released of Wildlife was assisted by Forester Bernadine I. Jasul of Monitoring and Enforcement Section (MES) as part of their wildlife monitoring activities.
3. That on August 10, 2022, Forest Technician (FT) Corazon R. Pelaez submitted a report regarding the soft releasing of the Brahminy kite from the Municipality of Sta. Cruz. Accordingly, the caretaker had took care of the wildlife for more than a month, feeding it with fresh fish catch daily, providing water for drinking and bath and training it to fly with adjusting perching pole. The wildlife had grown quite big and can flap its wings while making a good landing onto the ground when it flew from a higher point. As part of the soft releasing, the caretaker had left the cage open three weeks after the wildlife was turned-over to the rescue center. In addition, the wildlife would sometimes leave the cage but would comeback immediately within the day. On July 20, 2022, upon checking of FT Pelaez with the caretaker, the Brahminy Kite had already left its cage and not returned since then. It was concluded that the wildlife had already acclimatized with the outside environment. Finally, Forest Technician Pelaez advised the caretaker to check daily if the wildlife will return to the cage or within the vicinity of the rescue center.
4. That on August 31, 2022, Forest Technician (FT) Corazon R. Pelaez and Randy R. Pantoja submitted a report regarding the release of a Philippine Grass Owl from the Municipality of Sta. Cruz, Marinduque. Accordingly, the wildlife was accidentally captured in an installed net surrounding the rice field of Mr. Aristeo Rocha to trap "maya" or Tree Sparrow that fed on his crop in Barangay Taytay, Sta. Cruz. Mr. Rocha immediately surrendered the Owl to Sta. Cruz Municipal Police Station (MPS) and thereafter Sta. Cruz MPS informed the Conservation and Development Section (CDS) regarding this matter. Then, CDS instructed FT Pantoja to coordinate to the Sta. Cruz MPS to check the condition of the owl. Based on his observation, the wildlife was in good condition and it will not

need to undergo rehabilitation. Both parties agreed that the Grass owl be release in Barangay Taytay where it was captured to join with the other owls.

5. Food supplies were purchased and delivered to the Rescue Center. The caretaker had fed the monkeys regularly based on the schedule of feeding.

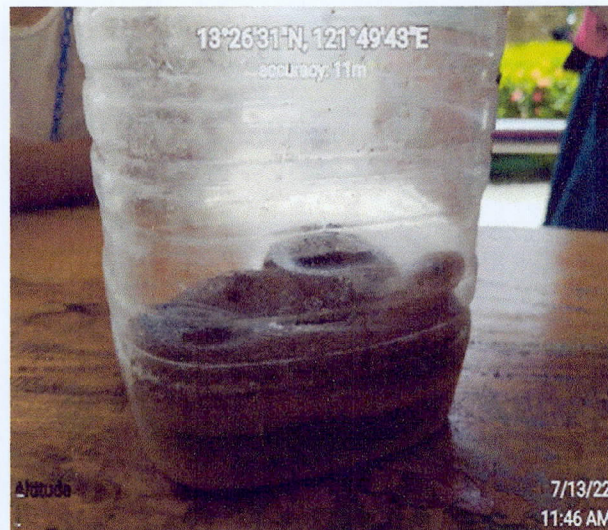

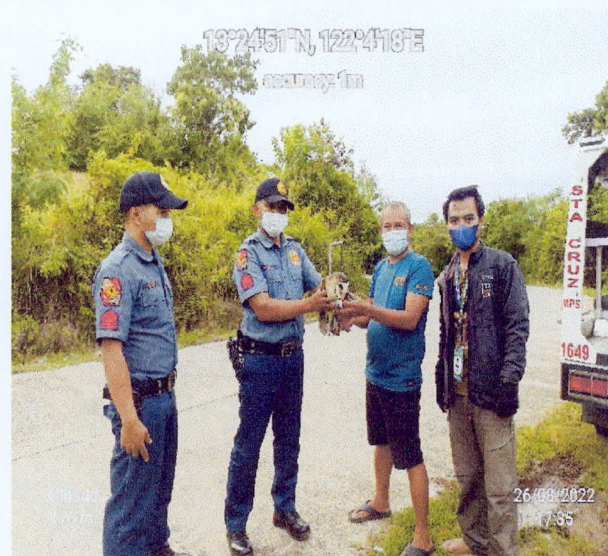




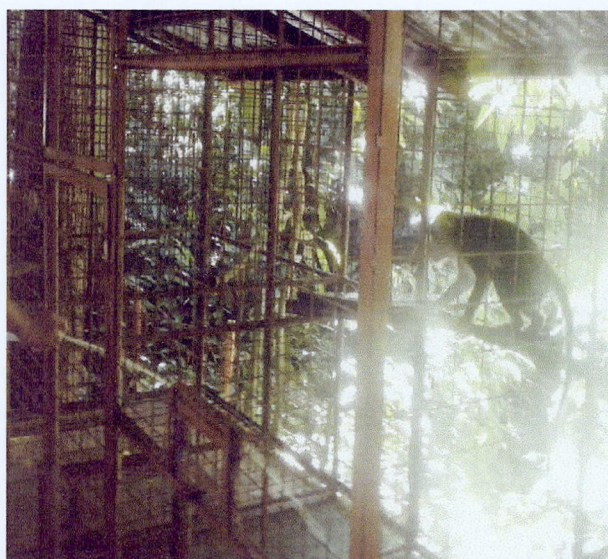
