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Report on the attended Fisheries Management Area (FMA) 5 Planning Workshop and Management Board Meeting on August 22-26, 2022 at A&A Hotel, Puerto Princesa City

Fisheries Management Area (FMA) 5 Planning Workshop

The planning workshop was attended by representatives from NGAs, LGUs, NGOs, Academe, and fisherfolk from all FMA 5 Provinces, including Occidental Mindoro, Antique, Aklan, Mapun, Tawi-tawi, and Palawan. The workshop was organized by DA-BFAR MIMAROPA, which was directed by Director Elizer S. Salilig.

The participants were divided into three groups based on their functions and specializations: governance, human well-being, and ecological well-being. And the undersigned were assigned to the ecological well-being group. These groups collaborated to develop the FMA 5 vision, goals, and objectives. Each group also defined its Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats. Indicators and benchmarks relevant to the defined objectives were developed, as well as management action plans to achieve these objectives.

Outputs on the workshop:

Vision

• A sustainably manage fisheries supporting gender-responsive, economically stable and climate-resilient community through holistic, science-based and transparent governance.

Goals

- Reduced Illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing:
- Improved and sustained fisheries management;
- Improved economic security and welfare of coastal community;
- Mainstreamed equitable access to economic opportunities; and
- Increased fish catch rate.

Objectives

- Increased fish catch rate by 5% per annum for 5 years in FMA 5;
- Reduction of fishing effort by 20% for 5 years;
- Increased aquaculture production by 20% per annum for 5 years;
- Reduced catching of immature fish sizes by 10% in 5 years;
- Activate MPA network to 100% in 5 years;
- Continue the 100% implementation of close season for round scad in 5 years;



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- 25% increased income of at least 25% registered fisherfolk living below poverty threshold in FMA by 2027;
- By 2027 at least 25% of registered fisherfolk received livelihood support;
- By 2027 at least 5 types of fishing livelihood support provided to 25% of registered fisherfolk;
- To strengthen collaboration of national government agencies and all LGUs concerned on fishery law enforcement by 2023;
- Reduced number of municipalities without MFO by 50% on year 3 and 100% by year 5;
- Update data base system of 25 LGUs by year 2 and all remaining LGUs by year 5; and
- Allocate 20% increase of LGUs budget for fisheries management by year 2.
