- Republic Act No. 8550 "Philippine Fisheries Code of the 1998 amended by Republic Act No. 10654;
- Marine Biodiversity and Conservation;
- Conservation of Ocean and Marine Turtles;
- Revised Forestry Code of the Philippines as amended by EO 277 and further amended by RA 7161;
- Republic Act 9175 "Chainsaw Act of 2002";
- Guidelines for the Issuance of Tree Cutting Permit.

**MINUTES OF INFORMATION EDUCATION CAMPAIGN**  
**June 22, 2023**  
**Barangay Masaging, Naujan, Oriental Mindoro**

**I. OPENING PROGRAM**

The IEC meeting was conducted by Monitoring and Enforcement Section (MES) on June 22, 2023 at Barangay Masaging, Naujan, Oriental Mindoro. The invited participants were Barangay Officials, Bantay Dagat and fisher folks (member of Sting bee honey production in Brgy. Masaging) of Barangay Masaging, Montemayor and Herera. A total of 70 participants (27 female and 43 male, 47 in Brgy. Masaging, 7 in Brgy. Montemayor and 8 in Brgy. Herera) had attended the said IEC campaign. The meeting started at 9:00 o'clock in the morning with an opening prayer led by Bantay Dagat Verni Fizalbon followed by singing of Philippine National Anthem and roll call of the participants. Part of the IEC is the distribution of IEC materials such as flyers, posters and signboards containing some relevant information and services of this office.

a. Welcome Remarks

**Barangay Chairma Edsel Fiedacan** of Masaging welcomed the participants came from Barangay Montemayor and Herera as well as the DENR and LGU personnel. He requested the participants to listen carefully and whatever the speakers may discuss it will surely for our goodness, he added.

**II. OBJECTIVES**

- a. To educate Barangay Officials, Bantay Dagat and fisher folks of Barangay Masaging, Montemayor and Herera in Naujan, Oriental Mindoro on selected ENR Laws especially on coastal and marine protection and conservation.

**III. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION**

- a. **Republic Act No. 8550 "Philippine Fisheries Code of the 1998 amended by Republic Act No. 10654**

Mrs. Maria Marlene A. Asinas, Fishery Management Officer of LGU Naujan presented some programs/activities of LGU Naujan particularly their office. Their activity is focused in Coastal Resource Management Program of which they implement the following:

- a. Protection and Management of the three (3) Marine Protected Areas (MPA) located in Brgy. Montemayor, Masaging and Herera. In Brgy.

Herera they protect and maintain the Tuod Fish Sanctuary with a total of 55 hectares pursuant to Municipal Ordinance 54 series of 2010, 16 hectares in Brgy. Masaging Fish Sanctuary pursuant to Municipal Ordinance 61 series of 2011 and 72 hectares Fish Sanctuary in Bulok Bulok Cove Marine Protected Area in Brgy. Montemayor pursuant to Municipal Ordinance No. 102 series of 2017. The three (3) MPAs are under the direct supervision of the Management Councils, 28 Bantay Dagat and volunteers with honoraria. They were instructed to conduct patrolling within the three (3) MPAs 24/7.

- b. Mrs. Asinas also mentioned about their livelihood program in Brgy. Masaging which provides additional source of income of some Fisherfolks and Bantay Dagat. They sustain the stingless bee honey production.
- c. They also require the registration of Fishing paraphernalia including their fishing boats yearly pursuant to Municipal Ordinance.
- d. Mangrove rehabilitation and protection program.
- e. Butas River Rehabilitation program.

She also discussed some highlights Republic Act No. 8550 "Philippine Fisheries Code of the 1998 amended by Republic Act No. 10654 and the Municipal Ordinance on Fisheries No. 39 series of 2005. The Ordinance is under revision/amendments of the SB members until now, she added.

**b. Conservation of Ocean and Marine turtles**

**Forester I, Mackaley P. Martinez** mentioned that there are five (5) Ocean basins in the world which includes Arctic, Atlantic, Pacific, Indian and Southern Ocean. He discussed some services that we can get from Ocean which includes food, production of oxygen, water cycling, habitat for wildlife, aesthetic, recreational and educational purposes and cultural services.

He explained some threats to the Ocean such as the following:

- a. Siltation
- b. Illegal trade
- c. Over-exploitation
- d. Pollution
- e. Climate Change

He also discussed some activities that would help in conserving and protecting our Ocean. One of the most important activity is to participate in the protection of Ocean such as clean-up drive (lakeshore, coastal and underwater) as well as reporting of illegal activities to the concerned agencies.

Because the three (3) Barangays serves as forage areas of Marine Turtles, Forester Martinez discussed the conservation of Marine Turtles. He mentioned that in the 7,000 islands of our country, there are different Biodiversity therein including the Marine Turtles. He differentiated Marine Turtle to Tortoise and Terrapin. He expounded and presented the following:

- a. Parts of Marine turtles

- b. Philippine Sea Turtles
- c. Importance of Marine Turtles
- d. Life stages of Marine Turtles
- e. Conservation status of Marine turtles- Hawksbill turtle is facing extremely high risk of extinction in the wild as the Conservation Status is critically endangered.
- f. Threats to Marine Turtles
- g. Conservation efforts of DENR
- h. Laws and Policies
- i. Handling of Marine Turtles when caught alive in fishing net, when turtles are wounded and sick, when turtles lay eggs and when the eggs hatches.

**c. Marine Biodiversity and Conservation**

**Forester Leonida A. Mindaros** mentioned that the Philippines is one of the 17 Mega-diversity in the world which have 2/3 Biological resources. She presented the Philippine Biodiversity which ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> for fishes, 5<sup>th</sup> for plants, trees and mammals and 8<sup>th</sup> for reptiles. She mentioned that Philippine Forests are among of the most diverse in the world but also among the most endangered. She also mentioned that the Philippines is located in the Coral triangle of which has the most diverse Marine Environment along with the country of Malaysia, Indonesia, Timor Leste, Papua New Geunea and Solomon Island. 1<sup>st</sup> district of Oriental Mindoro covering Puerto Galera, San Teodoro, Baco, Calapan City, Naujan, Socorro and Pola are located in Verde Island Passage (VIP) of which the center of center for Marine Shore Fish Diversity, she added.

Forester Mindaros discussed and differentiate the six (6) types of Forest in the Philippines. She emphasized the Mangrove and Beach Forest and discussed some of their differences as these are part of the Marine Biodiversity. She presented most common species of Mangrove and Beach forest, economic and ecological benefits of Mangrove Forest, threats to Mangrove Forest and the regulations governing Mangrove Resources or the DAO No. 15 series of 1990.

She also explained and differentiate Sea Grass, Sea Weeds and Coral Reef and presented pictures of different types of sea grass and sea weeds. She discussed their importance to Marine life.

**d. Revised Forestry Code of the Philippines as amended by EO 277 and further amended by RA 7161**

**Legal Researcher, Sherlyn A. Layesa** presented and discussed the Presidential Decree P.D. 705 its purpose, rationale and amendments as well as the criminal offenses, penalties and some related laws. She also explained the objectives of PD 705.

She presented and discussed in details the following criminal offenses and its penalties:

- 1) Cutting, Gathering and/or Collecting Timber, or Other Forest Products Without License [includes illegal possession of forest products] (Section 77);

- 2) Unlawful Occupation or Destruction of Forest Lands and Grazing Lands [includes kaingin making] (Section 78);
- 3) Pasturing Livestock Without Authority in Forest Lands, Grazing Lands, and Undisposed Alienable and Disposable Lands (Section 79);
- 4) Illegal Occupation of National Parks Systems and Recreation Areas and Vandalism Therein (Section 80);
- 5) Destruction of Wildlife Resources (Section 81);
- 6) Survey by Unauthorized Person (Section 82);
- 7) Misclassification and Survey by Government Official or Employee (Section 83);
- 8) Issuance of Tax Declaration by any Public Officer or Employee without a Certification from the Director of Forest Development and Director of Lands (Section 84);
- 9) Coercion and Influence of Public Officer or Employee (section 85);
- 10) Unlawful Possession of Implements and Devices Used by Forest Officers (Section 86);
- 11) Failure or Refusal to Pay, Collect or Remit Forest Charges (Section 87);
- 12) Sale of Wood Products without Compliance to Grading Rules and Standards (Section 88).

She also discussed the meaning of Forest Products and the term Permit as defined in PD 705 as well as the general rule in the issuance of tree cutting permit which states that Tree Cutting Permit is required prior to cutting and possession of timber/lumber from any public or private land. Otherwise, she said that the act is illegal under PD 705, as amended but there are also exceptions like on the following circumstances:

1. Cutting of trees/timber found within a duly registered private tree plantation (CTPO/PLTP) pursuant to DENR Memorandum Circular 97-09;
2. Trimming, pruning, cutting, or clearing activities for tall growing plants within the power line corridor – the owner or operator of the power lines need not secure prior clearance or permit from DENR but must give due notice to DENR or PCA, as the case may be, concerned LGUs, and other relevant government agencies pursuant to Section 7 in relation to Section 12, RA 11361 or "Anti-Obstruction of Power Lines Act", but see FMB Technical Bulletin for 69 kV to 500 kV, cutting permit is required); and
3. Indigenous people with similar factual circumstances pursuant to Diosdado Sama Y Hinupas and Bandy Masanglay Y Aceveda, Petitioners v. People of the Philippines, Respondent, G.R. No. 224469, 05 January 2021. Lazaro-Javier, J. En Banc. She further explained by presenting the facts, the issue and the ruling of this case.

She further discussed the prohibition on the issuance cutting permit in the following:

1. Mangroves (Section 43, PD 705 in relation to DENR administrative Order No. 15-90); and
2. Naturally growing or planted trees of any kind, flowering or ornamental plants and shrubs, or plants of scenic, aesthetic and ecological values, along public roads, in plazas, parks other than national parks, school

premises or in any other public ground or place, or on banks of rivers or creeks, or along roads in land subdivisions or areas therein for the common use of the owners of lots therein, or any species of vegetation or forest cover found therein shall, be punished with imprisonment for not less than six months and not more than two years, or a fine of not less than five hundred pesos and not more than five thousand pesos, or with both such imprisonment and fine at the discretion of the court; Except when public safety requires but with prior approval from DENR. (Section 3, PD 953 or "Requiring the Planting of Trees in Certain Places and Penalizing Unauthorized Cutting, Destruction, Damaging and Injuring of Certain Trees, Plants and Vegetation"

In addition, she elaborated the classification of lands of the public domain pursuant to Section 3, Article XII of 1987 constitution and further explained Forest Lands, Public Forest, Permanent Forest or Forest Reserves and Forest Reservations pursuant to PD 705.

#### e. Chainsaw Act

**Legal Researcher, Sherlyn A. Layesa** presented and discussed R.A. 9175 "Chainsaw Act of 2002" He explained the following:

- Basic Policy of the State and Objectives
- Overview of the Process
- Definition of Chainsaw
- Permit to Purchase
- Permit to Sell, Re-sell, Dispose, Distribute, or Transfer
- Authority to Lease, Rent, or Lend
- Certificate of Registration and Renewal
- Penal Provisions
- Confiscation of Chainsaw
- Revocation or Recall of Registration, Permit, or Authority
- Reward

She discussed who are the persons authorized to manufacture, sell and import chainsaws, persons authorized to purchase, transfer the ownership, import, manufacture, distribute, and/or sell, re-sell chainsaws and persons authorized to own, possess and use chainsaws. She enumerated and discussed in details the requirements in securing permit to purchase, permit to sell, re-sell, dispose, distribute or transfer ownership and in securing Certificate of Registration as well as the requirements for renewal of Certificate of Registration. She also discussed the procedure in the renewal of Chainsaw Registration as well as the requirements in renewal.

She also discussed the some penal provisions under this law:

In Section 12.1 "*Selling, purchasing, reselling, transferring, distribution or possessing a chainsaw without a proper permit*" the penalty is imprisonment of four (4) years, two (2) months and one (1) day to six (6) years, fine of not less than 15,000.00 to 30,000.00 depends on the discretion of the court and the Chainsaw will be confiscated in favor of the government.

In Section 12.2 *“unlawful importation or manufacturing of chainsaw”* the penalty is imprisonment of not less than one (1) month but not more than six (6) months and fine not less than 1,000.00 to 4,000.00.

In Section 12.3 *“Tampering of Engine Serial number”* Imprisonment of not less than one (1) month nor more than six (6) months and fine of not less than Php 1,000.00 nor more than Php 4,000.00.

In Section 12.4 *“Actual Unlawful use of Chainsaw”* Any person who is found to be in possession of a chainsaw and uses the same to cut trees and timber in forest land or elsewhere except as authorized by the Department shall be penalized with imprisonment of six (6) years and one (1) day to eight (8) years or a fine of not less than Thirty Thousand Pesos (P30,000.00) but not more than Fifty Thousand Pesos (P50,000.00) or both at the discretion of the court without prejudice to being prosecuted for a separate offense that may have been simultaneously committed. The chainsaw unlawfully used shall likewise be confiscated in favor of the government.

She also discussed those Chainsaw subject for confiscation (Judicial and Administrative) pursuant to Section 13 and 14. She further elaborated about the revocation or recall of registration permit, or authority. She encouraged the participants to buy Chainsaws only in authorized dealer of DENR to register their chainsaw easily. She mentioned the registered dealer in Oriental Mindoro are Coolot and Powersaw in Calapan City.

#### **f. Guidelines for the Issuance of Tree Cutting Permit**

**Forester Kevin Corpuz**, presented and discussed DAO 2021-11 “Guidelines in the processing and issuance of permits for the cutting, removal and relocation of naturally growing trees. He explained Section 1: Scope and Coverage, Section 2: Objectives, Section 3: some important definition of terms, Section 4: Application requirements for the issuance of Tree Cutting Permit for Naturally Grown Trees within private lands and issuance of Tree Cutting Permit for the Naturally Grown tree/s within Public or Forest Lands. He also mentioned the issuing authority for new applications and requests for extension of Tree Cutting and Earth-balling permits for naturally grown trees shall be the concerned DENR Regional Executive Director, except cutting for public purposes of National Government Agencies which includes the DPWH, DOTr, DepEd, DA, DOH, CHED, and NIA pursuant to DAO No. 2020-06, which shall be issued by the concerned CENR Officer/Implementing PENR Officer. In addition, he mentioned the duration of the tree cutting permit which shall not exceed one (1) year upon receipt.

He also explained the objectives of DAO 2020-18 also known as “Promoting tree plantation development and liberalizing harvesting and transport of planted trees and tree derivatives for inclusive growth and sustainable development”.

He further explained Section 6 of the said DAO. *“Planted Trees in Private Land”*, Private landowner shall follow these harvesting and transportation guidelines:

- 1) When private landowner will engage in tree plantation, he/ she shall register said plantation to the nearest CENR Office. No fees shall be collected by the CENRO;



- 2) No tree cutting permit and Self-Monitoring Form (SMF) are required in harvesting and transporting harvested logs from registered plantations. Only Certification is issued;
- 3) For ease of transport, the logs and tree derivatives shall be accompanied by the original copy of Certification stating that the products are from the landowner's private property. The Certification shall be displayed prominently in the vehicle where the log and derivatives will be carried;
- 4) When the logs and tree derivatives will only be used inside the landowner's private property, no Certification shall be needed.

He also mentioned the private tree plantation to be register are newly established plantation, established plantation and even those matured plantation and discussed the requirements for the registration of private tree plantation. He reiterated that having a plantation is one of the requirements in securing a Certificate of Registration for Chainsaw.



## V. CLOSING PROGRAM


