**MINUTES OF INFORMATION EDUCATION CAMPAIGN
WITH FOREST OCCUPANTS**

February 23, 2023

Barangay Mahabang, Naujan, Oriental Mindoro

I. OPENING PROGRAM

The IEC was conducted by Monitoring and Enforcement Section (MES) led by the Chief, Monitoring and Enforcement Section (MES), Ricardo R. Natividad together with other MES personnel. The invited participants were Sitio Leaders, Barangay Officials and selected Forest Occupants. A total of 41 participants (19 male and 22 female) had attended the said meeting. The Municipal Environment and Natural Resources (MENRO) Melvin Bacay and representatives from the Naujan Municipal Police Station had also attended. The meeting started at 9:00 o'clock in the morning with an opening prayer followed by singing of Philippine National Anthem and roll call of the participants. Part of the IEC is the distribution of IEC materials such as flyers, posters and signboards containing some relevant information and services of this office.

a. Welcome Remarks

Barangay Captain, Andy Kalaw welcomed the participants as well as the DENR personnel, MENRO and the PNP personnel in their Barangay. He was very happy for choosing their Barangay for such IEC meeting to bring awareness among the communities on the importance of the Forest and how to protect it.

b. Message

Chief MES, Ricardo R. Natividad expressed his gratitude to all the participants for attending the IEC meeting and he hopes for a better partnership with the Barangay officials in terms of Environmental Protection.

MENRO Melvin Bacay also expressed his gratitude to the DENR for inviting and involving the LGU in such IEC activities. He said that the office of the MENRO will do their best they could contribute in the Environmental Protection.

PLT Julian Cuarteros also expressed his gratitude in behalf of their PNP Chief for inviting them and had the opportunity to discuss the Republic Act 9262 or the Anti-Violence against Women and their Children.

II. OBJECTIVES

- a. To educate Sitio Leaders, Barangay Officials and selected Forest Occupants on selected ENR Laws.**

III. PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION

a. State of the Philippine Forest

Forester II, Leonida Mindaros presented and discussed the State of the Philippine Forest and the scenario in Oriental Mindoro. She discussed what is Forest and its importance. She said that Forest is the main source of food especially for the Indigenous Peoples, source of water not only for the upland communities but also for the lowland and this water can also generate electricity thru construction of hydro power. She mentioned that there are two (2) hydropower under the jurisdiction of CENRO-Socorro: (1) Catuiran Hydro power located at Barangays of Banuton, Malvar and Balite in the municipality of Naujan and (2) Ormin Power in San Teodoro. She also said that Forest serves as carbon sink. It absorbs greenhouse gases in the atmosphere.

Forester Mindaros mentioned that the Philippine Forest is among the most diverse in the world but also among the most endangered (nanganganib). She presented those biodiversity that can only be seen in the country (endemic).

She presented the map showing the rapid loss of Forest cover from 1900 to 2010. She mentioned the top causes of Deforestation in our country such as corporate large scale mining, massive forest conversion, illegal logging by legal licensees and non-licensees and unsustainable forest management. She said that the declining trend on forest cover is very alarming that needs immediate and long-term solution that encompasses from ridge-to reef approach. She said that their IEC activity is part of the solution that brings awareness to the communities on the status of our Forest and how to take care for this natural resources. She encourage the participants to take part of the solution.

Forester Mindaros also discussed some Government actions on the massive Forest Deforestation:

1. Declaring a moratorium on the cutting and harvesting of timber in the natural and residual forests and creating the anti-illegal logging task force (EO 23). Total ban on the cutting and harvesting in natural and residual forests throughout the country. She mentioned that they had organized and created Oriental Mindoro Sagip Kalikasan Task Force (SAKAL) in support to the Governments call to protect our remaining forest. She mentioned the members of the task force are NBI, PNP, Philippine Army, MENRO and ABC president of the municipality under the jurisdiction of CENRO Socorro.
2. Continuous apprehension of illegally cut/transported forest products, filling of case and closure of wood processing plants. She said that the PNP are very active when it comes to apprehension of illegal lumbers.
3. Implementation of National Greening Program (EO 26 and 193). She encourage the Barangay to conduct tree planting activities in the public land or even in the riverbanks in support to the greening program.

She also presented the scenario in Oriental Mindoro. She presented the land classification, Forestland distribution, Forest cover in area, Forest condition and the causes of Deforestation. She mentioned the major causes of deforestation in

Oriental Mindoro such as timber poaching, charcoal making, forest fire and slash and burn agriculture and being the primary government agency in protecting and conserving our natural resources she urged the participants to help them in their mandate.

b. Revised Forestry Code of the Philippines as amended by EO 277 and further amended by RA 7161

Legal Researcher, Sherlyn A. Layesa presented and discussed the Presidential Decree P.D. 705 its purpose, rationale and amendments as well as the criminal offenses, penalties and some related laws.

She presented and discussed in details the following offenses and its penalties:

- 1) Cutting, Gathering and/or Collecting Timber, or Other Forest Products Without License [includes illegal possession of forest products] (Section 77);
- 2) Unlawful Occupation or Destruction of Forest Lands and Grazing Lands [includes kaingin making] (Section 78);
- 3) Pasturing Livestock Without Authority in Forest Lands, Grazing Lands, and Undisposed Alienable and Disposable Lands (Section 79);
- 4) Illegal Occupation of National Parks Systems and Recreation Areas and Vandalism Therein (Section 80);
- 5) Destruction of Wildlife Resources (Section 81);
- 6) Survey by Unauthorized Person (Section 82);
- 7) Misclassification and Survey by Government Official or Employee (Section 83);
- 8) Issuance of Tax Declaration by any Public Officer or Employee without a Certification from the Director of Forest Development and Director of Lands (Section 84);
- 9) Coercion and Influence of Public Officer or Employee (section 85);
- 10) Unlawful Possession of Implements and Devices Used by Forest Officers (Section 86);
- 11) Failure or Refusal to Pay, Collect or Remit Forest Charges (Section 87);
- 12) Sale of Wood Products without Compliance to Grading Rules and Standards (Section 88).

She also discussed the meaning of Forest Products and the term Permit as defined in PD 705 as well as the general rule in the issuance of tree cutting permit which states that Tree Cutting Permit is required prior to cutting and possession of timber/lumber from any public or private land. Otherwise, she said that the act is illegal under PD 705, as amended but there are also exceptions like on the following circumstances:

1. Cutting of trees/timber found within a duly registered private tree plantation (CTPO/PLTP) pursuant to DENR Memorandum Circular 97-09;
2. Trimming, pruning, cutting, or clearing activities for tall growing plants within the power line corridor – the owner or operator of the power lines need not secure prior clearance or permit from DENR but must give due notice to DENR or PCA, as the case may be, concerned LGUs, and other relevant government agencies pursuant to Section 7 in relation to

Section 12, RA 11361 or "Anti-Obstruction of Power Lines Act", but see FMB Technical Bulletin for 69 kV to 500 kV, cutting permit is required); and

3. Indigenous people with similar factual circumstances pursuant to Diosdado Sama Y Hinupas and Bandy Masanglay Y Aceveda, Petitioners v. People of the Philippines, Respondent, G.R. No. 224469, 05 January 2021. Lazaro-Javier, J. En Banc. She further explained by presenting the facts, the issue and the ruling of this case.

She further discussed the prohibition on the issuance cutting permit in the following:

1. Mangroves (Section 43, PD 705 in relation to DENR administrative Order No. 15-90); and
2. Naturally growing or planted trees of any kind, flowering or ornamental plants and shrubs, or plants of scenic, aesthetic and ecological values, along public roads, in plazas, parks other than national parks, school premises or in any other public ground or place, or on banks of rivers or creeks, or along roads in land subdivisions or areas therein for the common use of the owners of lots therein, or any species of vegetation or forest cover found therein shall, be punished with imprisonment for not less than six months and not more than two years, or a fine of not less than five hundred pesos and not more than five thousand pesos, or with both such imprisonment and fine at the discretion of the court; Except when public safety requires but with prior approval from DENR. (Section 3, PD 953 or "Requiring the Planting of Trees in Certain Places and Penalizing Unauthorized Cutting, Destruction, Damaging and Injuring of Certain Trees, Plants and Vegetation")

In addition, she elaborated the classification of lands of the public domain pursuant to Section 3, Article XII of 1987 constitution and further explained Forest Lands, Public Forest, Permanent Forest or Forest Reserves and Forest Reservations pursuant to PD 705.

c. Chainsaw Act

Legal Researcher, Sherlyn A. Layesa presented and discussed R.A. 9175 "Chainsaw Act of 2002" He explained the following:

- Basic Policy of the State and Objectives
- Overview of the Process
- Definition of Chainsaw
- Permit to Purchase
- Permit to Sell, Re-sell, Dispose, Distribute, or Transfer
- Authority to Lease, Rent, or Lend
- Certificate of Registration and Renewal
- Penal Provisions
- Confiscation of Chainsaw
- Revocation or Recall of Registration, Permit, or Authority
- Reward

She discussed who are the persons authorized to manufacture, sell and import chainsaws, persons authorized to purchase, transfer the ownership, import, manufacture, distribute, and/or sell, re-sell chainsaws and persons authorized to own, possess and use chainsaws. She also enumerated and discussed in details the requirements in securing permit to purchase, permit to sell, re-sell, dispose, distribute or transfer ownership and in securing Certificate of Registration as well as the requirements for renewal of Certificate of Registration.

She also discussed the some penal provisions under this law:

In Section 12.1 "*Selling, purchasing, reselling, transferring, distribution or possessing a chainsaw without a proper permit*" the penalty is imprisonment of four (4) years, two (2) months and one (1) day to six (6) years, fine of not less than 15,000.00 to 30,000.00 depends on the discretion of the court and the Chainsaw will be confiscated in favor of the government.

In Section 12.2 "*unlawful importation or manufacturing of chainsaw*" the penalty is imprisonment of not less than one (1) month but not more than six (6) months and fine not less than 1,000.00 to 4,000.00.

In Section 12.3 "*Tampering of Engine Serial number*" Imprisonment of not less than one (1) month nor more than six (6) months and fine of not less than Php 1,000.00 nor more than Php 4,000.00.

In Section 12.4 "*Actual Unlawful use of Chainsaw*" Any person who is found to be in possession of a chainsaw and uses the same to cut trees and timber in forest land or elsewhere except as authorized by the Department shall be penalized with imprisonment of six (6) years and one (1) day to eight (8) years or a fine of not less than Thirty Thousand Pesos (P30,000.00) but not more than Fifty Thousand Pesos (P50,000.00) or both at the discretion of the court without prejudice to being prosecuted for a separate offense that may have been simultaneously committed. The chainsaw unlawfully used shall likewise be confiscated in favor of the government.

She also discussed those Chainsaw subject for confiscation (Judicial and Administrative) pursuant to Section 13 and 14. She also mentioned of the Reward under Section 15 but as of the date, there are no individuals claimed a reward to CENRO Socorro. She encouraged the participants to buy Chainsaws only in authorized dealer of DENR to register their chainsaw easily.

d. Guidelines for the Issuance of Tree Cutting Permit

Forester Kevin L. Corpuz, presented and discussed the DAO 2021-11 also known as "Guidelines in the processing and issuance of permits for the cutting, removal and relocation of naturally growing trees". He explained some terms such as Development Plan, Earth-balling Permit, Forest Charges, Forest Lands, Naturally-Grown trees, Planted Trees, Private Land, Special/Private Land Timber Permit (S/PLTP), Special Tree Cutting Permit (STCP), Special Tree Cutting and/or Earth-Balling Permit (STC/EP, Tree Inventory and Utilization plan.

He also discussed the requirements for the issuance of Tree Cutting Permit for Naturally Grown Trees within private lands and for the Naturally Grown tree/s within

Public or Forest Lands. He reiterated the Issuing authority pursuant to Section 6 of DAO 2021-11 and the duration of the tree cutting permit which shall not exceed to one (1) year.

He explained the objectives of DAO 2020-18 also known as “Promoting tree plantation development and liberalizing harvesting and transport of planted trees and tree derivatives for inclusive growth and sustainable development”.

He further explained Section 6 of the said DAO. *“Planted Trees in Private Land”*, Private landowner shall follow these harvesting and transportation guidelines:

- 1) When private landowner will engage in tree plantation, he/ she shall register said plantation to the nearest CENRO Office. No fees shall be collected by the CENRO;
- 2) No tree cutting permit and Self-Monitoring Form (SMF) are required in harvesting and transporting harvested logs from registered plantations. Only Certification is issued;
- 3) For ease of transport, the logs and tree derivatives shall be accompanied by the original copy of Certification stating that the products are from the landowner’s private property. The Certification shall be displayed prominently in the vehicle where the log and derivatives will be carried;
- 4) When the logs and tree derivatives will only be used inside the landowner’s private property, no Certification shall be needed.

Forester Kevin mentioned the private tree plantation to be register are newly established plantation, established plantation and even those matured plantation.

He also mentioned the requirements for the registration of private tree plantation such as:

1. Letter request of the landowner of his/her intension address to CENRO Rodel M. Boyles;
2. BLGU and MLGU Certification stating “that there are planted trees in the said private titled property;
3. Authenticated copy of title (Register of Deeds). If title is awarded by the Department of Agrarian reform (DAR), secure certification from DAR;
4. Tax Declaration.

Kaya iniencouraga naming ang mga may tanim na mga puno na iparehistro po sa opisina para mas madali ang pagharvest ng mga ito. Hindi na kelangan ng cutting permit. Inotify lng ang aming opisina kapag mgpuputol na para from time to time mamonitor naming kung doon talaga sa pinarehistro ang mga pinuputol.


Bakit po kelangan ng Titulo sa pag-apply ng cutting permit?	Para malaman naming kung ang mga puno na nirerequest niyo ay sa tituladong lupa niyo talaga.
Magkano po ang bayad sa pagpapapermit ng naturally grown trees sa loob ng tituladong lupa?	Ito ay may Forest Charges depende sa kahoy na puputulin at kung gaano karami ang volume nito. Halimbawa ang Narra ay 3,000.00 pesos per board feet. Ang Forest Charges na binabayaran ay pumapasok sa cavan ng bayan. May resibo po ito at sa opisina lng po kayo magbabayad.
Paano kung ang punong puputulin ay nagdudulot ng pangamba sa siguridad at buhay ng tao, kinakailangan pa rin bang kumuha ng tree cutting permit?	Opo, kailangan pa rin. Pero kung andiyan na talaga yung panganib, urgent, <i>at wala nang pagkakataon na makipagugnayan sa DENR</i> , i-document nang maayos ang sitwasyon at pagkatapos ay agad mag-report sa DENR. Bilang paglilinaw, kailangan talaga ng tree cutting permit kahit na ang punong puputulin ay nagdudulot ng pangamba sa siguridad at buhay ng tao dahil as much as possible, gusto munang tingan ng mga personnel ng DENR ang estado ng puno bago ito payagang putulin dahil kung may iba naman na solusyon bukod sa pagputol ng puno, yon ang mas pipiliin.
Paano kung ang chainsaw ay i-dinonate sa barangay, pwede ba itong ma-irehistro ng barangay?	Opo, pwede. Base sa DAO 2003-24, isa ang mga ahensya ng gobyerno sa maaring magkaroon at magparehistro ng chainsaw. Pero dapat siguraduhin na ang chainsaw na tatanggapin ng barangay ay well documented o may kaukulang permiso mula sa DENR ang bumili at pinagbilhan nito. Dahil para makapag-apply ng Certificate of Registration of Chainsaw, ang mga dokumentong ito ay required o hinihingi ng aming opisina.
Gaano po karaming puno ang kinakailangan para ma-rehistro ang lupain bilang tree plantation?	At least fifty (50) pong puno. Kasama po sa bilang o kinokonsider ang mga bagong tanim maging fruit-bearing trees.
Paano po kung yung mga puno ay matatagpuan sa iab't ibang lupain na pagmamay-ari ng iisang tao? Paano po ang pag-paparehistro noon?	Kada-isang titulo po ay isang Certificate of Tree Plantation Ownership o Private Timber Land Permit ang iniisyu ng aming opisina. Pero kung magkakalapit po ang mga lupa o adjacent to each other, isang registration fee lamang po ang kinakailangang bayaran.

VIII. CLOSING PROGRAM



The IEC meeting was ended at around 3:00 PM.



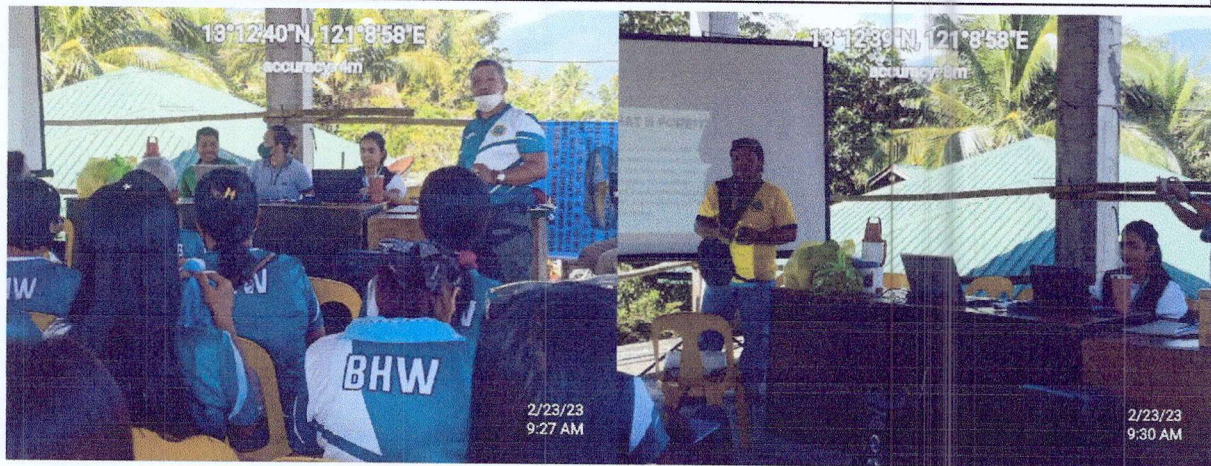
